Fancy Foods on Market For Coming Party Season

New York—(UPI)—Prediction for the 1959-1960 social season: More parties but less work for hostesses.

New snacks at the fifth annual National Fancy Food and Confection Show emphasized convenience of preparation and serving.

One snack manufacturer, apparently influenced by a Chinese fortune cookie baker, showed thumbprint-size snacks in fortune cookie shapes in three flavors—onion, garlic and savory (a spice mixture). Cocktail bows, also garlic-flavored, resemble miniature bowties.

Inch-square party crisps and, short, pencil-thin party sticks—both potato products—are designed for nibbling or dipping.

Pretzels have gone high hat, both in flavor and shape. Thumbprint-size oval pretzels are available in plain, caraway, and a mild cheese flavor. Hush puppy snacks, about the same size, are made with a meal base and a smoky, onion flavor.

From Canada come French-style bread sticks in plain, salted, onion, and cheese flavors.

New ready-to-eat dips range from the simple—tuna or olive or an anchovy-ripe olive blend—to such rich combinations as lobster or clams with sherry, fish and cheese, curry, bleu cheese with a cream cheese base, and a smoky fish dip whose distributor claims, "Men love it, women hate it."

Smoked mullet and smoked mackerel spreads also are recommended for dipping.

Packaged party dips come in 3 flavors—toasted onion, cheddar cheese and bleu cheese. They can be reconstituted with either milk or sour cream.

Two marmalades made news. The American product is flavored with an orange liqueur, (Cointreau), and the other, made from an Old Scots recipe, is matured for five years in whiskey casks before being bottled.

Got a few minutes to spend making canapés? Squeeze eel and salmon pates, salmon with mayonnaise, and hot horseradish, all Danish, from tube containers directly onto bread or crackers.

Jar-packed pates include crab-lobster, cocktail savory (an anchovy-mushroom blend), smoked rainbow trout, game, Scotch grouse and Pacific prawn.

Soup in Bars

New soups come in bars as well as familiar cans and foil packages. Candy bar-shaped soup concentrates are available in six flavors—chicken, vegetable, tomato, mushroom, celery and oxtail. Each bar is scored into double serving portions.

The Oriental influence appears in Hawaiian coffee, hearty but light; Chinese hot salad oil, red pepper in peanut oil; Filipino patis sauce, an amber-colored anchovy-flavored liquid; Chinese black bean spice; and seasoned seaweed. The latter looks like two-inch squares of burned paper and has a salty, fishy flavor. Crumbled, it is used as a garnish on Oriental food.

Guava catsup and sweet and sour guava relish are new products designed for barbecue use.

The container's the thing with garlic oil and liquid barbecue seasoning, both in roll-on bottles, and horseradish and garlic-flavored whips in aerosol cans. The aerosol products are spicy oil and vinegar mixtures with a creamy consistency.

But the ultimate in packaging was reached by a Chicago manufacturer (Reese). For about \$300, he will deliver in any of the 50 states a live donkey loaded with wicker hampers of fancy foods.

Cost of High Living Strain on the Budget

Washington—(UPI)—It's the cost of high living—even more than the high cost of living—that puts a strain on family budgets these days.

That diagnosis of America's pocketbook pains comes from Dr. Ewan Clague, commissioner of labor statistics in the Labor department, the custodian of the government's famous Consumer Price Index.

The index has gone up about 25 per cent in the past decade. But the average family's actual outlay for food, clothing, housing, entertainment and other items has gone up more than 50 per cent in the same period.

"In other words," Clague said in an interview, "less than half of the increase in living costs which the average family has experienced since 1949 can be blamed on higher prices. The rest comes from higher living standards."

Clague explained that the Consumer Price Index, which erroneously has been nicknamed the "living cost index," does not attempt to measure

changes in living standards. It simply measures month-to-month fluctuations in the retail prices of certain standard items that nearly every family buys.

For example, if beefsteak goes up from 69 to 79 cents a pound, that fact will be registered in the index. But if a family that used to eat steak once a week begins eating steak twice a week, that won't show.

Living Expensive
Today's better—but expensive—living is due partly to the increase in home ownership. Only 40 per cent of America's families owned their own homes a decade ago but about 60 per cent do so today.

But even if you buy a house on which the monthly mortgage payments are roughly equivalent to what you have been paying in rent—as many families try to do—the extra costs of taxes, utilities, appliances, tools, repairs, and improvements almost certainly will bring a sizeable jump in your total outlay for shelter.

The mass movement to the suburbs also has brought substantial boosts in transportation costs.

Food budgets are higher, too—not merely because some prices have increased, but also because the average family is eating more expensive foods.

Many foods which housewives used to wash, peel, shell, shuck and cook at home now come in neat "ready-to-

All employed women interested in program are invited to attend.

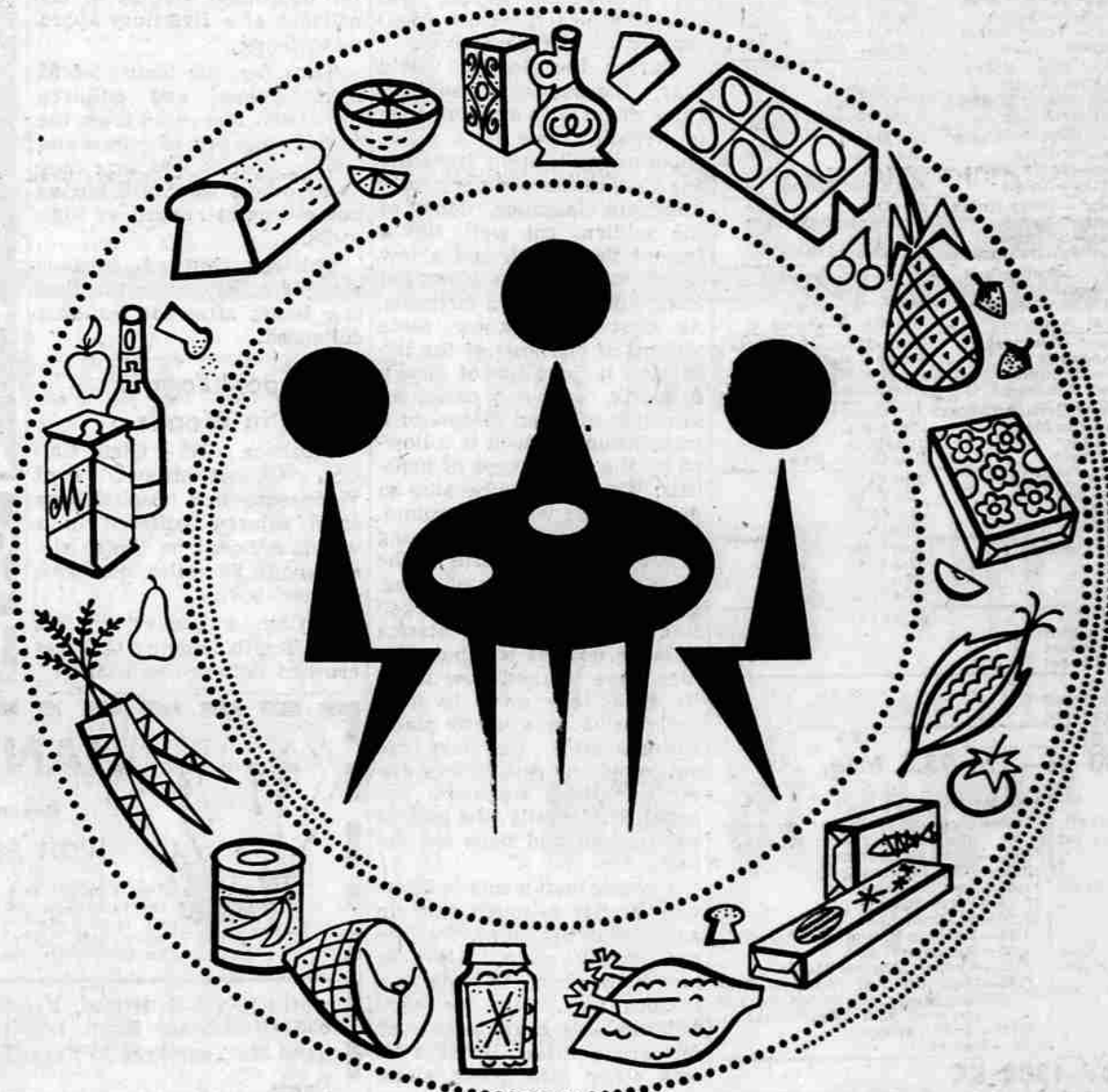

Navy Has Need For Dietitians

The need for dietitians in the Navy Medical Service corps has induced the Navy to assist women candidates in that field. Qualified senior students may apply for a commission as ensign while completing internship it was announced by the Navy Recruiting Station today.

To qualify the candidate must have at least a baccalaureate degree with a major in foods and nutrition or institutional management. She must be enrolled in, or have been accepted for enrollment in, a dietetic internship at an approved hospital. The candidate must be at least 21 and under 32 years of age at time of application, meet certain mental and moral standards and be accepted by the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

The successful applicant will be appointed to the rank of ensign, with full pay and al-
