

Council Member Urges More Interest In City

Stanley Stark, Medford city councilman, told Jackson County club, Republican Women's Federation of Oregon, yesterday noon that not enough women are interested in city government and that the city "needs the woman's viewpoint." Mr. Stark's talk was the first of a series on the operation of governmental units planned by the club.

Mr. Stark urged his listeners to "know your city's affairs, read your newspaper stories about city government, attend council meetings, talk city affairs among your friends, volunteer for committees, run for city office."

Explaining the operation of Medford's government, Councilman Stark explained that about five years ago it was changed from a mayor-council system to a council-city manager system. He stated that the council now operates only as a policy-making body, with the city manager relieving the mayor of many of his heavier duties and serving as the administrative branch of the city government.

The speaker said that the city's laws are arrived at by way of a four-point process. These are: 1 - determine what is needed; 2 - determine the will of the people; 3 - determine what can be done; 4 - take action. He stated that ordinances cover the permanent and far-reaching needs of the city, and resolutions are used to cover action which is less important and less permanent in nature.

Councilman Stark stated that only 30 cents of the citizen's local tax dollar goes to the city.

The speaker praised Robert A. Duff, city manager, for his efficiency and good management, and added that "few in this city realize what a fine job Mayor John Snider does." He declared that Medford is known throughout the state and the nation for its excellent government and administration.

Councilman Stark said that while Mayor Snider had been criticized at first for his rule that there should be no reappointments to committees and commissions, it was now believed this system resulted in more and fresher ideas for city government.

During a lengthy question and answer period, the women and speaker discussed the problem of ordinances governing dogs, the matter of revision of outmoded ordinances and laws, the city planning commission, zoning regulations, wages for city employees, the duties of the city manager, traffic and parking meters and the need for more sidewalks.

Councilman Stark said that the city now had no ordinance governing dogs, and that regulated by county officials. He praised the men and women who have been members of the planning commission and said that many excellent ideas have come from that body.

Councilman Stark said more than once that city officials are concerned over the ever-increasing cost of city government, and that many projects

are not undertaken primarily because there are no funds.

Mr. Stark was introduced by Mrs. Murray Gardiner, president, who presided for a business meeting. She announced a leadership workshop for Republicans to be held in Salem in early October. Thruston Morton, national chairman of the Republican party, will speak at a banquet during the workshop.

Russians Go Shopping

Khrushchev, meanwhile, toured the San Jose plant of International Business Machines, manufacturer of computers, adding machines and other electronic equipment.

Mrs. Khrushchev's shopping expedition was her first in the United States. Accompanied by her two daughters, Mrs. Andrei Gromyko, an interpreter and three American women, the wife of the Soviet premier went to a Sears, Roebuck and company store in a suburban district here after visiting an elementary school. The spur-of-the-moment tour was so unplanned that the women arrived at Sears before the store opened.

When the party finally got in, Mrs. Khrushchev found a clerk who spoke Russian and proceeded to buy baby clothes and toys to take to her grandchildren in Russia. She also bought some nylon stockings and was presented with two copies of the Sears and Roebuck catalogue.

Mrs. Khrushchev said some of the items she bought were for grandchildren who have not yet been born.

Second Loper Style Show Is Kindergarten Benefit

Medford Junior Service league and Burelson's store marked another milestone in fashion show history in Medford Saturday night when the store staged its second annual Don Loper show as a benefit for the League's kindergarten for hard-of-hearing children. For the second consecutive year the Loper fall collection was flown from Hollywood to Medford and shown at Rogue Valley Country club with League members as models.

Mr. Loper, who designs clothes for movie stars, seems also to keep in mind the needs of west coast women who lead the multiple lives of mother, club worker, social butterfly and business woman. His clothes are elegant, wearable, and "well mannered," if that is what is needed; they are also luxurious, sophisticated and exciting if that is what the customer wants.

The suits and street dresses which opened the show featured sheer wools, mohair and worsted. Some were trimmed with such fashionable furs as fox, or broadtail, and some had large, interesting collars of the same material.

This west coast designer and his assistants dramatize the designs with ear-catching names—Mrs. David Holmes modeled an afternoon suit of imported plaid which Mr. Loper calls "The Prince of Wales" and Mrs. Jack Edson wore a walking suit named "Tilly Ho" of imported broadcloth, lavishly trimmed with American broadtail.

Mrs. Carl E. Wimberly Jr., modeled "Palm Court," a suit of broadcloth with huge shawl collar of silver fox, and Mrs. Edward Collins appeared in a theater suit of silk satin combined with re-embroidered lace which Mr. Loper calls "Polo Lounge."

As was noted last year, the Loper collection is always carefully accessorized. Several of the suits and coats were accented by the use of Eisenberg pins. Mrs. W. Berthold Barnum Jr., modeled a theater coat with big cape collar and the largest imaginable lapel pin—from a distance it resembled a star fish and was almost as large. Another pin was in "brown smoke."

Much of the Loper collection was in black, but when he goes into color, it is worth noting. Mrs. Billy Blackstone appeared in a satin formal gown of an exciting blue called Mandarin. Some of the more beautiful gowns were of chiffon, and one worn by Mrs. Edson was of Figaro pink, a luscious deep shade.

For one of her trips along the fashion runway Mrs. Floyd Hart Jr., wore a handsome cut velvet gown which Mr. Loper calls "Midnight."

In the coat line, Mr. Loper designs both in wearable tweed or such luxurious material as angora. Mrs. Robert Taylor modeled a brocade evening coat in zinnia tones, this garment being typical of the Loper evening or theater coats.

One of the ensembles worn by Mrs. Houston R. Pitts was "St. Regis," a town suit of silk and wool tweed set off with a hat of black beaver with ostrich feather trim, an original by Ruby Art.

One of the most dramatic of the evening gowns was a long, slim sheath of handsome brocade subtly draped, the model being Mrs. C. H. Buffington.

The show closed with a fabulous dress and matching coat of gold lame brocade modeled by Mrs. Frank Hopewell. This ensemble topped the collection in more ways than one—the price ticket runs into four figures.

Accessories for the collection included several models of DeLiso Deb pumps and slippers. Some were in black or grey suede, others in such interesting leathers and materials as burnt bronze porcelain, grey luster, red or black Kimmel, gold thongs or clear vinylite. Mrs. Holmes wore a pair of pumps with the "light up" heels which twinkle like fireflies when the wearer walks.

Mrs. Margery Green of Burelson's was commentator for the show, and Mrs. Harvey Field provided music.

INDIVIDUAL SALMON CUPS

(Makes 4 to 6 servings)

2 cups (1-pound can) salmon

1/2 cup undiluted MORNING MILK

1 egg

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1 tablespoon grated onion

1/2 cup finely chopped celery

1/4 cup sweet pickle relish

1 teaspoon pepper

1 cup coarsely crushed potato chips

Place salmon in mixing bowl. Add remaining ingredients. Mix well. Spoon into 6 buttered custard cups. Place extra pieces of potato chips around edges of each custard cup as garnish. Place custard cups on cookie sheet or in shallow pan. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 35 to 40 minutes. Remove from oven. Cool on rack for 5 minutes. Remove from custard cups and serve on platter garnished with tomato and lemon wedges.
