Compulsory Alcohol Tests Get Approval

Salem (UP)—Oregon Highway Lifesavers Tuesday voted unanimously for compulsory alcohol tests for the state's drivers.

With only two dissenting votes, they favored allowing officers or civilians to make arrests at accident scenes for "probable cause."

About 60 persons attended the meeting which was opened by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Hatfield favored broadening the alcohol tests and asked for what he called "hard-nosed" enforcement of all traffic laws.

The governor also was in favor of adding a speed limit to Oregon's basic speed rule. This also is favored by Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

Written consent of the driver is now required under Oregon law before an alcohol test can be administered.

Female Hand in Politics Said Heavy

Sweet Home (UP)—The female hand in politics in Oregon is a comparatively heavy one, according to Beulah Hand, acting chairman of the Oregon Democratic party.

Rep. Hand, the only woman acting state chairman in the nation, told the Jane Jefferson club here that Oregon Democratic women lead the U. S. in participation "in practical politics."

She said there are more women acting as county chairmen in Oregon than in any other state, and Oregon's ratio of women in the Legislature is among the top four.

She said although there is no state-wide federation of women's clubs, there are "probably more women involved directly in a campaign in Oregon than in any other state."

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TV Camera Shows Ice Forms in Plane Engine Dayton, Ohio, (Science Service)—A television camera mounted on the outside of one of the turboprops of a giant C-133 cargo aircraft shows pictures of the ice forming within the plane's engine. A tanker plane flies ahead of the C-133 and sprays water into the cold air. The C-133 flies into the spray, which soon forms ice. Inside the C-133, engineers can watch on the closed circuit television screen as the falling pieces of ice tumble into the engine. The television camera can be installed in areas where shock and vibration are too severe for normal camera operation. The tests are being made by engineers at the Wright Air Development Center here.

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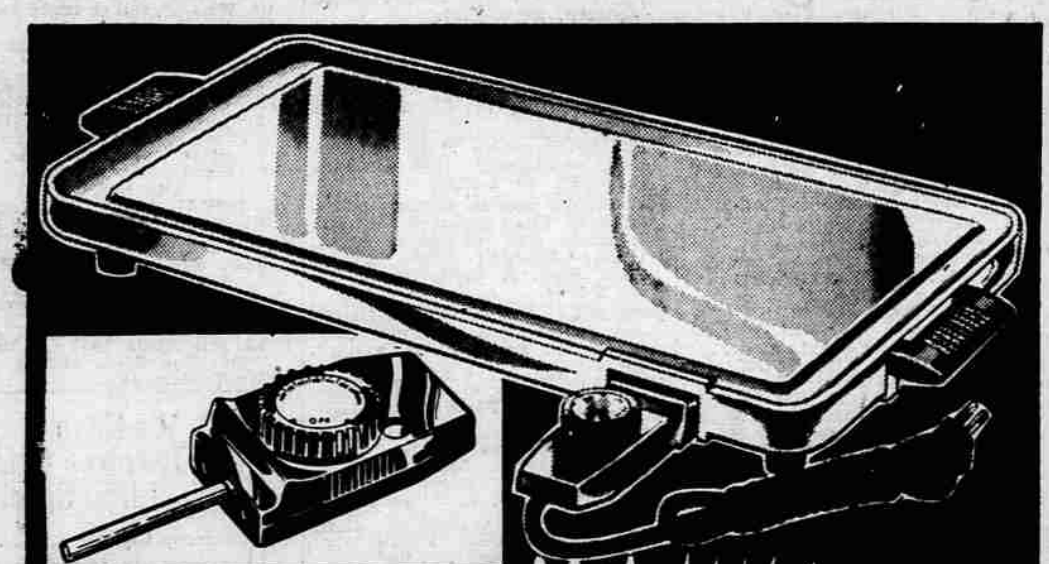
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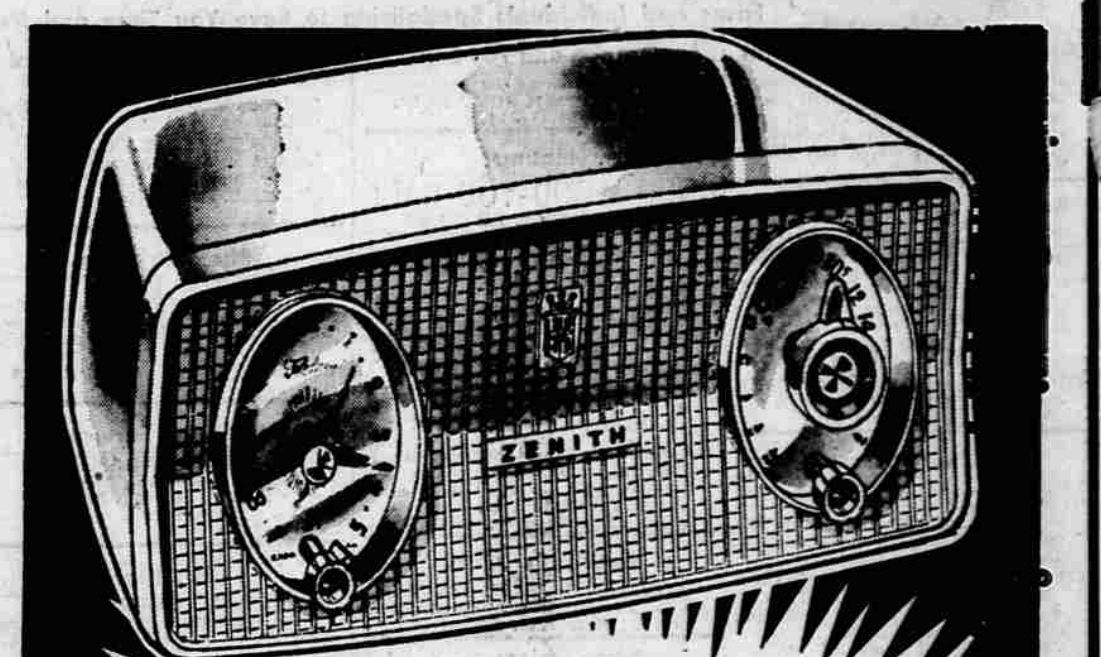
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
