

TV Steel Hour Gets Solid Jobs

New York — (UPI) — The nails, glue and sealing wax that held together a suspense play on CBS-TV's Steel Hour Wednesday night couldn't stop the solid acting jobs by Colleen Dewhurst, Mark Richman and Teresa Wright, in that order of effectiveness.

Miss Dewhurst portrayed a kookie lady who believed the Richman-Wright infant was really her's and was prepared to murder for the child. Every stock device was used to build the suspense to the "sock" finish — darkness; mysterious, detached talk; clairvoyance and padding around in shadowy corridors — but I thought a few less stunts, unreal effects and more rational behavior by the parents in the play could have made it more effective.

Jack Carter, who ordinarily rushes his comedy lines on the Ed Sullivan show, played a bachelor in this play. Again, he rushed his lines.

County Court Gets Flags in Room

Flags of the United States and Oregon graced the Jackson county court's room this week.

The flags were delivered to the court Tuesday by Otto Ewaldsen of Swem's gift store, Medford. They are of nylon fabric. The U.S. flag, trimmed in gold fringe, has 49 stars.

Following directions in a booklet accompanying the flags, the court members have placed the U.S. flag behind them on their left—their audience's right—and the Oregon flag behind them on the other side.

The court members explained that to their knowledge this is the first time flags have been placed in the room.

Honshu Island Feels Earthquake

Kofu, Japan — (UPI) — A severe earthquake jolted Honshu Island on a 200-mile front today but no major damage or casualties were reported.

"I think the people were more frightened than anything else," a police spokesman said. He said many rushed out of their homes when the tremor hit.

The heaviest shocks were reported in this capital city at Yamashiro prefecture between Mt. Fuji and the southern Japanese Alps.

FALSE ALARM
New York — (UPI) — Police went into action Wednesday when they received a report that three youths carrying guns and knives were seen on a rooftop. Expecting another outbreak of juvenile violence, police rushed to the scene, bounded to the roof and found three 14-year-old boys playing cowboys and Indians with toy weapons.

Eugene Physician Urges X-Rays to Find Lung Cancer

Dr. Glenn M. Gordon, Eugene, told delegates at the 85th annual meeting of the Oregon State Medical Society here yesterday afternoon that x-ray examinations of the chest are the most important diagnostic procedures in finding lung cancer.

He said "it is necessary to diagnose cancer before it causes symptoms" when it is in the advanced stage. X-ray examinations, he said, are about the surest way of finding cancer in the stage which is curable.

Dr. Gordon urged society physicians to encourage all their patients over 40 years old to have annual chest x-rays.

Lung cancer, he said, was the No. 1 cause of cancer deaths among men last year, and was the No. 10 cause of cancer deaths among women. Cancer is the No. 2 cause of death in the nation, Dr. Gordon noted.

The incidence of lung cancer, Dr. Gordon noted, is increasing. The increase, however, is not because of the increased population or improved methods of diagnosing cancer.

Due to Factors
The increase could be due to many factors, he said. Among possible causes are continuously excessive smoking, a person's chemical makeup, irritable particles in the air or other factors relatively unknown today. He noted that smoking as a cause is still undetermined, although he believed it is thought to be a factor.

In his lecture, Dr. Gordon said surgery is the only sure way of curing lung cancer. He said that of 71 cancer patients at Sacred Heart hospital in Eugene, 43 of them had surgery. The survival rate of the 71 patients, he said, shows that present forms of treatment is not too effective.

Of the 71 patients with cancer, 31 per cent, or 22 of them, were incurable, he said, while another 12, or 17 per cent, were treated with x-rays.

Dr. Gordon said x-rays will relieve cancer, and perhaps prolong the individual's life, but relatively few cases throughout the country have been cured by x-rays.

Use of X-rays
X-rays are used in connection with surgery cases, he said, and added that the degree to which x-rays are effective depends on many factors.

Commenting on x-rays being a possible cause for cancer, Dr. Gordon said the x-ray

diagnosis of lung cancer lies with the first attending physician, Dr. Gordon said he believed. The first attending physician, he said, can encourage his patients over 40 years old to have annual chest x-rays.

"It is vital to find cancer as soon as possible," he said. When symptoms of lung cancer become apparent, he added, the chances of curing it become less.

Dr. Gordon said such clinics as the one sponsored by the Jackson County Tuberculosis and Health association at Sacred Heart hospital are a help in finding cancer in its early stage.

He noted, however, that small x-ray slides sometimes do not show a small questionable growth as well as a large negative.

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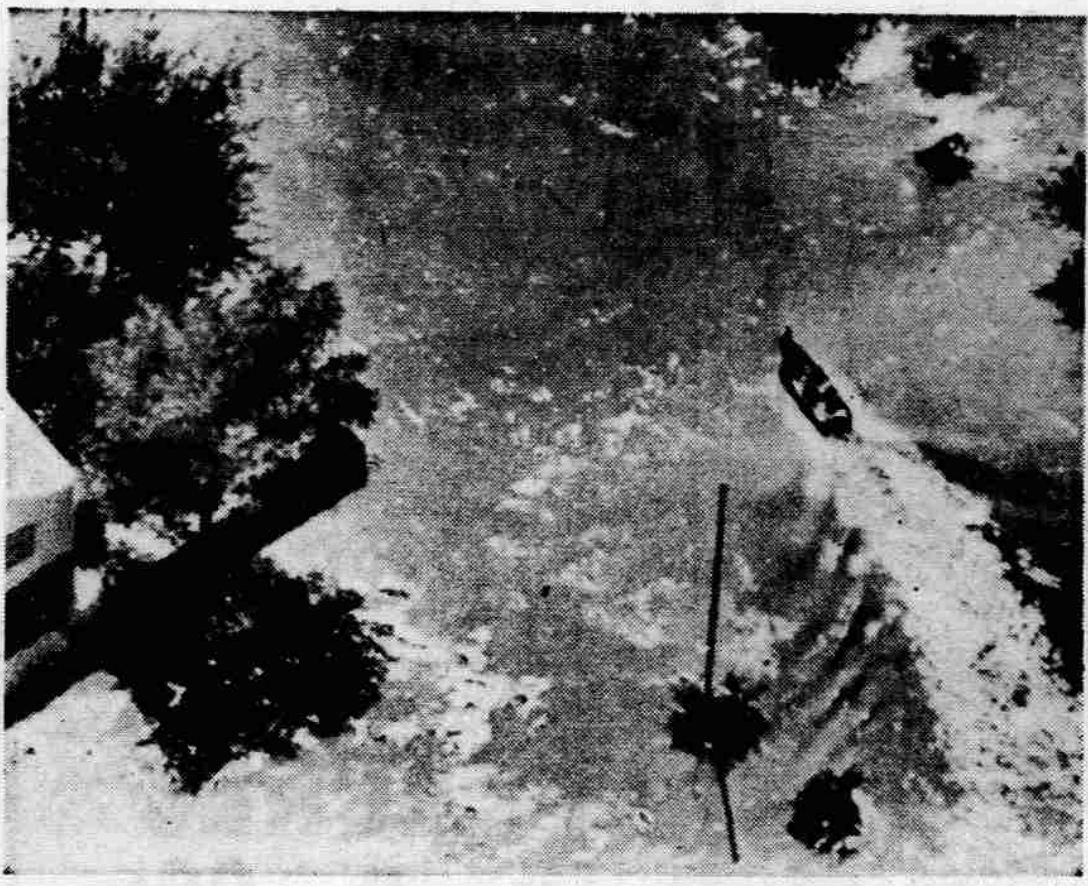

Wall Street Chatter

New York — (UPI) — Wall Street's attempt to find a scapegoat for the decline has focused on professional liquidation, says Sidney Lurie of Josephthal & Co.

But, he points out, redemption of mutual fund shares tends to dry up in a declining market, since the funds are bought as long-term savings plans rather than temporary vehicles.

"We've been through other difficult market periods where fund liquidation was not a factor in the decline," he notes. He says mutual funds tend to be over-exaggerated as a market factor.
