Lack of Purpose Seen Great Danger

Portland—(UPI)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told the Western Christian Social Relations briefing conference here Wednesday evening that lack of purpose, not weapons or armies, may be the greatest danger to U. S. security.

He said this nation's drive for higher productivity has "taken on a life of its own."

"It has become for many a force greater than the demand which presumably sustains it."

The Oregon Democrat referred to Admiral Hyman Rickover's recent comment that "We no longer produce to supply what we need; we now consume in order to clear away what the machine produces — a topsy-turvy state of affairs."

Reports Scheduled On Suggestions Of Society Groups

Reference committees to tomorrow morning will report to the house of delegates of the Oregon State Medical Society on several committee recommendations and reports which were referred to it at the opening sessions Tuesday night and Wednesday morning.

The house of delegates Friday morning will take final action on all recommendations and reports by committees.

Several recommendations by committees regarding problems relating to health care of the aged, particularly those in the low income brackets. Committees on aging and prepaid medicine recommended low cost prepaid medical-surgical programs for persons over 65 years with modest incomes and resources.

The committee on charitable medical care advised the dele-

gates that it has been working closely with the medical department of the state public welfare commission, seeking solutions to a multiplicity of problems which have arisen in this area of medical care during recent months.

The committee listed these objectives:

1. To keep the welfare patient in his home surroundings, with his own physician and out of institutions where possible;

2. A definition of welfare medical care;

3. A definition of the drugs for which welfare will pay and the conditions under which welfare will pay;

4. Health services for public assistance recipients which are qualitatively and quantitatively "minimum adequate";

5. Development of a sound patient-doctor relationship as an essential element in the therapeutic and rehabilitative process;

6. As little interference as possible with the clinical handling of health problems, and

7. Establishment of a plan which is consistent with the closed end budget of the welfare commission.

In other action: The committee, on public health recommended that the Oregon State Medical Society accept the invitation of the Oregon state board of health to participate in a study of public health programs and needs in Oregon.

Emergency Service The committee on emergency medical service recommended that an appeal be made to Gov. Mark Hatfield and the state legislature for funds to finance the continuation of a full-time physician and staff in the state's civil defense agency, and that the shelter program be studied, encouraged and urged to all.

The committee also recommended that physicians set an example by building shelters for their families.

The committee on child health recommended that each component society of the state organization which has not already done so establish a committee on school health to work with school administrators and public health officers in the development of an effective school health program, including the health supervision of participants in interschool athletic contests.

Officers of the Auxiliary to the Society were guests at a delegates breakfast, and Mrs. Frank Gastineau of Indianapolis, president of the Women's Auxiliary to the American Medical association, spoke briefly.

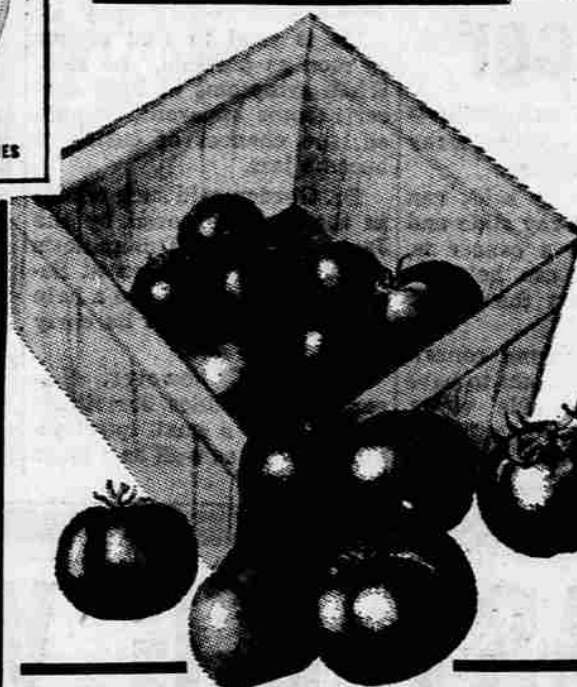

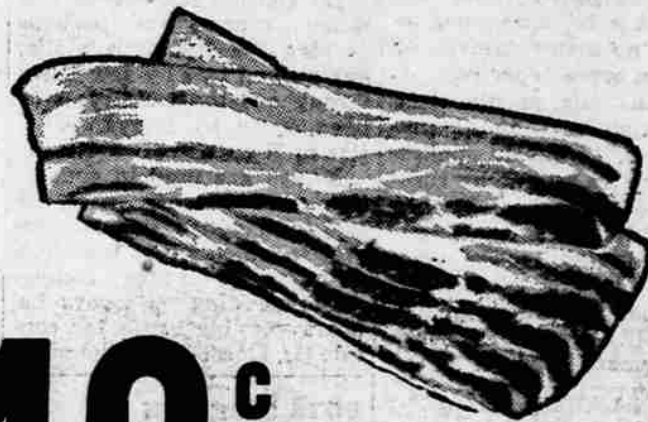
