

Stevenson Sees Nikita Willing To Negotiate

Chicago (UPI)—Adlai E. Stevenson said today he believes Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is willing to negotiate for an inspection program for world disarmament.

Stevenson had a farmyard chat with Khrushchev at Coon Rapids, Iowa, Wednesday, a conference which brought the first hint that a turning point might have been reached in the Premier's U.S. tour and that he would be willing to take part in negotiations for a disarmament inspection program.

Believed Serious
In a brief statement today, Stevenson said he thought Khrushchev "is serious and wants to reduce the burdened nature of armaments step by step with simultaneous inspection and control appropriate to each step."

"At least his proposals should be carefully considered and not dismissed as propaganda," Stevenson, twice Democratic candidate for president, talked with Khrushchev in the relaxed atmosphere of a farm lunch party. He told newsmen later he was more encouraged at the possibility of arms agreement than at any time since his talk with the Russian leader in Moscow a year ago.

Proposed Total Disarmament
Khrushchev proposed in a United Nations speech last week that the world proceed to disband all its armies, navies and air forces in the next four years. Western statesmen immediately raised the question of international inspection—not touched on in Khrushchev's address but considered by the United States as essential to any disarmament agreement.

Stevenson said he believed Khrushchev was ready to try to reach agreement.

Divorcee's Death Probe Closed

New York (UPI)—Boston police closed their New York investigation today of the death at sea of Boston heiress Lynn Kauffman, a mystery that apparently never will be solved.

Murder, suicide or accident?
The findings of Boston Homicide Chief Joseph B. Fallon were inconclusive, although he leaned toward the accidental death theory.

"As of now, I believe her death was accidental, based on the fact that she complained of illness during the day of her death and it's possible she went out in the evening, she might have vomited and might have gone over the railing," he said.

"However, while I lean toward accident, I am not overlooking the suicide angle and we will complete our investigation in Boston."

Only Wednesday, Fallon had said he did not believe it was possible for the petite 23-year-old divorcee to have stumbled over the four-and-a-half foot railing of the Dutch freighter *Utrecht* in Boston harbor last Friday night. Mrs. Kauffman's closest companions insisted that she had been murdered.

Mrs. Kauffman's badly battered body, clad only in shorts and slippers, was found early Saturday morning on Spectacle Island in Boston harbor. According to an autopsy report the beautiful young woman died of internal injuries and had suffered injuries and bruises "consistent with beating by a man's fists."

Salem Girl Saves Friend From Train

Salem (UPI)—A 12-year-old Salem girl was hit by a freight train here as she pushed a smaller girl from its path, police said today. Neither girl was seriously hurt.

The heroine was Yvonne Gibson. She and Ver-Jean Labox, 6, were treated for shock and bruises.

Police said Ver-Jean was on the tracks when the freight neared the Hazel ave. crossing and Yvonne rushed and pulled the first-grader clear. In doing so, Yvonne lost her balance and received a glancing blow.
