Hatfield Cites Own Administration as Victory Assurance

Portland—(UPI)—Gov. Mark Hatfield, in a "brass tacks" talk to Republicans Wednesday, set the keynote for the party's 1960 campaign—the record of his own administration.

He claimed that last year's campaign promises either were fulfilled or were on their way to being fulfilled, and that the record should provide ammunition for a GOP victory next year.

Hatfield said his administration had tried to strike "certain basic keynotes" instead of moving from crisis to crisis. He said these included cooperation, industrial development, and objective labor-management relations.

He also said government economies would make it possible to live with the present budget and without a special session of the Legislature, despite the loss of some \$10 million incurred when the income tax bill was referred to the voters.

Dunes Mentioned

He said the employment service for example, cut 65 persons from its staff when it was reorganized by David Cameron, and that 75 to 100 employees can be eliminated from the income tax division when the new simplified forms go into use next year.

"We're doing these things without diminishing service or efficiency," he said.

Speaking of cooperation, he said, "we're never against anything just to be against it." He added that in recommending against an Oregon Dunes National Park his administration praised the idea of a national seashore and suggested an alternate site in Clatsop county.

He said the Republican party believes in cooperating with local government, and he did so by mobilizing state agencies to help Roseburg after its Aug. 7 explosion disaster, and by a new approach to the labor problem in Medford's pear harvest.

"These communities appreciated not only the help itself, but the way it was given," he said. "We cooperated with them, we didn't impose our help upon them."

Economy Said Sounder

Hatfield said Oregon was at a peak record of employment and that the general economy was sounder than a year ago, "partly because of things we have done to stimulate a rising economy."

He said it was the administration's aim to attract industry by cutting the cost of doing business, not by giving outright concessions.

"The type of industry we want doesn't want concessions, but only a fair shake," he said.

State To Use Centennial Fence

Salem—(UPI)—Inmates from the state correctional institution today were removing the wire fence around the Centennial Exposition grounds in Portland.

The State Emergency Board, in a telephone poll, authorized removal of the fence for use by the state government. Speed was needed because all property remaining when the Pacific International Livestock Exposition takes possession next month becomes the property of the P-I.

The fence is wanted for use as a second barrier around the correctional institution. However, the Emergency Board has not yet given approval for such use. This will be decided at its next meeting Oct. 2.

Salmon Arriving At Oxbow Dam

Oxbow, Idaho—(UPI)—The fall run of upstream-bound salmon and steelhead is beginning to arrive at the Idaho Power Company's Oxbow dam fish facility here.

But Wendell E. Smith, company fish biologist, predicted that the 1959 migration "will be about 40-50 per cent smaller than the 1958 movement." He based his forecast on reports from McNary dam, the last counting station before Oxbow for migrants headed up the main stem of the Columbia or the Snake river to spawn.

Smith, a veteran of 16 years with the Washington state fisheries department, blamed the decrease on columnaris, a bacterial disease which preys on migrants from the time they enter the mouth of the Columbia river.

New York—(UPI)—Adam Styka, 69, last of a famed family of painters, died Wednesday night.

He said a committee has been set up to study the advance of technical education as part of a program to develop science and technology and attract industries in these fields.

A group of electronic industry executives he addressed recently in San Francisco "were not just impressed but completely intrigued with the possibilities in Oregon," he said. "But they wanted to know about our education resources."

Milton-Freewater Man Electrocutted

Milton-Freewater—(UPI)—A 34-year-old city employee was electrocuted Wednesday at the Don Harper ranch just east of here while a crew was setting up a new power pole.

The victim was Carl Akins, a foreman.

Police said the pole to be installed was tied to the boom of a truck and a ground wire was on the pole. Akins was leaning against the truck when the ground wire came in contact with an overhead line, shocking him and burning his right shoulder and foot. A witness, Alvin Hansen, applied artificial respiration.

As Akins fell he struck his head on a tractor blade, police said. But cause of death was the electric contact.

Atlas Explosion Delays Moon Shot

Cape Canaveral, Fla.—(UPI)—An Atlas-Able rocket being prepared for a shot at the moon early next month blew up on the cape this morning.

The four-stage combination exploded during a static test. Officials said there were no injuries.

The accident apparently eliminated any chance that a moon shot would be made from here early in October, when the lunar body makes another close approach to the earth of about 219,000 miles.

The Air Force said cause of the explosion was being investigated.

Budget Bureau Shows Increase

Washington—(UPI)—The Budget Bureau said today that the Democratic-controlled Congress didn't cut the President's budget after all but actually increased government spending.

The bureau said the law-makers added \$597 million in the current fiscal year and \$1,500,000,000 for future years.

The report by Budget Director Maurice H. Stans was the administration's answer to claims by Democratic leaders that they had trimmed the President's appropriations requests by \$1,881,000,000 and knocked another \$700 million off his planned "backdoor" financing.

In the report, requested annually by the President, Stans said the Democrats failed to take into account a number of "modifying factors" in compiling their version of congressional action on Eisenhower's narrowly-balanced \$77 billion spending program.

For one thing, he said, Congress failed to grant the President's requests for action that would have increased government income by \$498 million. This included his proposal for a \$350 million increase in postal rates.

Station Attendant Robbed Via Phone

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A 41-year-old service station attendant was robbed of \$250 via telephone Wednesday.

William Elrod told police he received this telephone call:

"Listen carefully. This is very important. I have a rifle trained on your back. Take all the money from your cash boxes and safe and put it in the trash can in the rest room of the drive-in next door."

"You have your foot on the bench," added the bandit, just to let Elrod know he was being observed even if Elrod couldn't see the bandit. Elrod said he carefully followed the instructions, then called police. They checked the trash can and the money was gone.

Guidance Director At SOC Receives Doctor's Degree

Ashland—Southern Oregon college guidance director, Harold A. Cloer, has received the advanced degree of doctor of education from Stanford university with the acceptance of his thesis, "A Scaling of Vocational Goal-Certainty," by the university graduate study committee.

Dr. Cloer explained that the purpose of the study was to investigate a technique for measuring the validity of a student's expressed opinion of his vocational plans for the future, saying that a definite body of evidence respecting such "goal certainties" would prove of great value in guidance work.

Samplings for the research study consisted of the 179 men and 192 women who entered SOC as freshmen at the beginning of the fall term, 1956-57. A pilot study had been previously conducted in 1956 to standardize the techniques and procedures needed to complete the project.

For those remaining in attendance during the year, the three-part "Vocational Planning Questionnaire" was administered four times, twice at the beginning of the fall term, one week before the end of the term, and one week before the end of the spring term.

Also obtained at the beginning of the fall term was information concerning the scoring of self-ratings, the scholastic aptitude of the students, and the pattern of interest indicated for each. To obtain a measure of "general concerns," a problems checklist was administered at the end of the fall term to the 88 per cent of the sample who attended classes.

Near the end of the sophomore year in 1958, a group was identified whose majors had not changed since entering college. A second group whose plans had definitely been changed during the same two years was also identified. Upon evaluation of the data accumulated throughout the course of the study, it was found that there was definite evidence that those students who had expressed their "goal-certainties" showed a

marked tendency to persist in their goals until they achieved them.

Such factors as age differences, scholastic aptitude, military service status, women's grades, and interest patterns showed no significant relationship between them and the expression of goals by the students tested, although it was found that the scores of female subjects remained relatively unchanged over the year, while those of the men dropped greatly and then recovered slightly during the freshman year.

Score Higher

Married male subjects scored considerably higher in the vocational goal-certainty scores, Dr. Cloer found, in comparison with the unmarried males. Small negative relationships were found between men's scores in the study and achieved grades, and a comparison between both men and women students with those in non-vocational concerns also disclosed a small negative correlation.

Dr. Cloer, a member of the SOC teaching staff since 1952, received his bachelor of science degree at the University of Oklahoma and his master of science degree at Stanford. Formerly director of the radio department at Eastern Arizona Junior college, he later served in the Stanford counseling and testing center prior to his joining the staff at SOC.

In addition to his counseling and psychology teaching duties, Dr. Cloer is active in the Ashland Elks; Phi Delta Kappa, a professional organization for educators; the Ashland Men's Garden club, and serves on a number of campus committees.
