The following quotation is from the Monday story of Kenn Hess, sports editor of the Coos Bay World:

"Just exactly 'what happen' may never be ascertained precisely, but it's been a long, long time since the Marshfield Pirates have been drawn and quartered the way Medford's Black Tornado applied the butcher knife Saturday night.

"Coach Fred Spiegelberg's Pear city juggernaut looked every bit potential state A-1 champions . . . en route to a free scoring victory.

"There was simply no stopping the black-clad knights who swarmed like a plague of locusts over the Coos Bay stadium turf. Time and again they slashed the Marshfield line to ribbons for sizable chunks of yardage. And when they so elected, they took to the air to riddle the Pirate's porous pass defense.

"The loss was the worst pinned on one of Coach Pete Susick's teams since Grants Pass' 1951 state champions hung a 25-13 defeat on the Pirates.

"When speedsters Mike Hood, Skip Bennett and Danny Sieg weren't darting through truck-and-trailer holes or skirting the ends behind excellent interference, quarterback Dick Ragsdale unlimbered his passing arm.

"Although the Pirates scored three times themselves, they had much more difficulty doing it."

SPEED AND AGILITY

Coach Susick had this comment to make Monday to the Coos Bay Quarterback club:

"We just got the 'H' kicked out of us."

"The Pirate mentor said, 'We still don't know exactly what really happened and we won't until we get the pictures back.' Concerning Medford, he declared that the Black Tornado has a real fine team with good speed and line agility. Susick said that in the years Marshfield has played Fred Spiegelberg's Medford teams, they have never run the multiple offense as well as they did last Saturday. He praised the passing of Dick Ragsdale, said that the Tornado has excellent receivers and pointed out that Medford backs have real good speed.

LINE AMAZES

Susick said that the Buccaneers were somewhat amazed that the Tornado line moved out some of the Marshfield

Coach Feels Pittsburgh Has Chance

Pittsburgh — (UPI) — Coach Buddy Parker has never been recklessly optimistic but he believes his Pittsburgh Steelers have a good chance to win the National Football league championship this season.

But Parker quickly seized on the prerogative of all coaches and added a qualifier. "There is an element of luck, of course," he said. "Freedom from injuries." Injuries threatened Parker's hopes in the third exhibition game when Jimmy Orr and Jack McClairne, the club's top offensive ends, suffered knee injuries on consecutive plays against the Chicago Bears.

RESERVE STRENGTH ROLE

Black Tornado reserve strength had its role in the contest, Susick brought out. He said that a few of the Pirates were tired out by the fourth quarter because of the matter of 13 or 14 playing most of the time against 22 or 25. "I don't think you'll find a better 25-man squad than Medford has right now."

FUMBLE TURNING POINT

To Susick, the psychological turning point of the game came when the ball popped out of the arm of Pirate Dick Shanley on about the 20-yard line. Lowell Dean caught the fumble in the air. Eventually, he latered to Ken Durkee and Medford got a touchdown on the play. The mentor also mentioned the kick-off fumble that Medford turned into a touchdown as another demoralizing break against Marshfield. "And, we've always maintained the good teams make their own breaks," Susick added.

SWITCH NOTED

Hess of the World reported that the game marked the first time since 1947 that six touchdowns have been scored on Marshfield. Ashland won that game 40 to 12. Tony Korieva, Marshfield jayvee mentor, said that the Tornado set the Pirates up by running Ray Konopasek at quarterback with the T against Beaverton then coming back with Ragsdale at QB in the single wing.

Aging Vets Could Mean Difference for LA Rams

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Can two great but aging football veterans mean the difference between a second-place club and a championship team in the National Football league?

The Los Angeles Rams are gambling that the answer to that question is "yes" as far as they are concerned with fullback Ollie Matson, 29, and end Gene Brito, 33.

The Rams tied the Chicago Bears for second place last season in the league's Western division. They had to give up

eight men and a draft choice for the speedy Matson and only one man for Brito who was headed into retirement after seven years as a defensive star for the Washington Redskins.

In Brito's case, the question is whether he can stand up at 33, under the terrific punishment a defensive end must take in this league.

Has Physical Equipment
In Matson's case, he appears to have the physical equipment — he's a magnificent specimen at 210 pounds, standing 6 feet 2 inches—but can he fit into coach Sid Gillman's system.

Matson had his pre-season troubles, playing at fullback and flanker back and halfback. Gillman wants his backs to know several positions so they can fit in if injuries crop up. Matson thus has the job of learning three assignments in what is to him a new system.

If Matson runs at fullback during the regular season, Gillman will use Jon Arnett, the league's leading punt-

Has Another Backfield

Gillman has another backfield he will use frequently. This puts Del Shofner, normally an end but an elusive ball-carrier as well, into the slot-back position. Red Phillips moves up to fill in at end for Shofner with Lamar Lundy or Leon Carke, fine pass-catches, at the other end. Offensive tackles are the agile, 238-pound veteran, Bob Fry, and Charley Bradshaw, a 265-pound second year man. Duane Putnam, one of the league's best blockers, and John Houser, are set at offensive guards with steady John Morow.

Bird Hunting Regulation Book Now Available

Portland — Hunters are advised that the 1959 upland game bird and waterfowl rule book is now available at all license agencies. The regulations synopsis covers seasons, bag limits, and open areas for the taking of all species of upland birds and waterfowl. Rules covering the public shooting grounds are also included in the synopsis.

Hunters will note that the shooting time table included in the synopsis has been rounded out to the nearest five-minute mark instead of the odd minutes as in the past. This system should make it much easier for hunters to determine the proper shooting time for each day's hunt.

In addition, attention is brought to the opening of the waterfowl season on Oct. 7, when shooting time will begin at noon, and the opening of the upland game bird season on Oct. 10, when the shooting time will begin at 8 a.m. The Oct. 10, 8 a.m. shooting time applies to waterfowl hunters as well as upland game bird gunners.

Trapping regulations for the 1959-1960 winter season are also available for distribution.
