

McLoughlin Aggregation Subdues KF

After a slow first half which saw them leading by just six points, the McLoughlin Junior high ninth grade footballers came growling out in the second half to score 20 points and down the Klamath Falls freshmen 26 to 0 yesterday at the Medford stadium.

McLoughlin hit pay dirt in the first quarter for the only tally in the initial half. Jack Lowery circled end on a reverse on a 14-yard run to reach the Pelican goal.

Klamath's deepest penetration in the half was to the Bulldog 22-yard line. That was also the closest the Pels came to scoring during the afternoon.

Early in the third quarter Ronnie Caulkins took a hand-off from Mike Neathamer on a crossback and scampered 55 yards to the end zone. Lowery split the uprights with his extra point kick for 13 to 0 advantage. A Bulldog drive then followed and Caulkins went the last nine yards around end. A pass by Neathamer got the conversion counter.

Punt Blocked
Bulldog Lee Kramer blocked a punt on the Klamath 19 in the third period but McLoughlin was unable to make the break pay off. For three plays later the ball was fumbled and Klamath gained possession on its 15.

Keith Dalbec tabulated for the Bulldogs in the final quarter, running eight yards on a reverse.

Summing up the Bulldog action, mentor Cy Perkins said that his club has several rough spots which will have to be smoothed before McLoughlin plays again. He felt that after a sluggish first half that his defensive team did a fine job. He cited Ronnie Caulkins and Keith Dalbec for fine offensive games. McLoughlin led in first downs with 12 to the Pelican eight.

In the third quarter Bill Penticost ran the last four yards of a 53-yard push then carried over the extra. Larry Goosey rounded out the totals with a 12-yard touchdown run on a reverse and he also bucked the bonus point.

Archer averaged 6.2 yards per carry in the game and Goosey 8.3.

Glendale had 12 to five advantage in first downs and 211 to 180 yards margin in scrimmage. Rogue River was helped by two pass interceptions and two recoveries of fumbles. Hard blocking and tackling by both teams marked the game.

Football Takes Odd Hops On National Grid Scene; Auburn Win Streak Ended

The football took a lot of funny bounces Saturday and some of the surprises included Tennessee ending the nation's longest major college winning streak by beating Auburn, 3-0, and Northwestern's crushing 45-13 victory over second-ranked Oklahoma.

Upsets were more the rule rather than the exception, with Georgia Tech licking Southern Methodist, 16-12; Texas A.M. defeating Michigan State, 9-7; Missouri tumbling Michigan, 20-7, and Rutgers topping Princeton, 8-6.

Cotton Letner's 2-yard field goal in the second period gave Tennessee its triumph over seventh-ranked Auburn at Knoxville, Tenn. The victory by the out-weighted Volunteers snapped Auburn's winning streak at 24 games. Blocking back Ken Sadler set up the winning field goal by recovering a fumble on the Auburn 45.

Northwestern recovered five of 11 Oklahoma fumbles to manhandle the Sooners in the nationally televised game of the day at Evanston, Ill.

Halfback Ron Burton led the Wildcats with two touchdowns, one of them being a 62-yard run. Apparently recovered from food poisoning which laid half the squad low on Thursday night, the Sooners suffered their worst defeat since 1945 when they were beaten 47-0 by the Oklahoma Aggies.

Place Kicker Helps
Georgia Tech's margin of victory over Southern Meth-

odist was placekicker specialist Tommy Wells' second period conversion and 28-yard fourth period field goal. SMU's Don Meredith and Tech's Fred Braselton each threw two touchdown passes, but the Georgians insured their victory in the last two minutes when guard Jack Moss intercepted a Meredith pass to halt a Mustang touchdown bid.

Quarterback Charley Milstead was the guiding force in Texas A.M.'s win over 14-point favored Michigan State. Milstead set up the Aggies' only touchdown with a quick kick from his own 22 in the first period and then scored himself on a one-yard plunge.

Randy Sims supplied the clincher with a field goal from the 21 in the second quarter.

Second-string quarterback Bob Haas scored the winning touchdown for Missouri against Michigan when he

bulled over from the one yard line with two seconds left to play at Ann Arbor, Mich. Michigan had taken a 15-14 lead less than three minutes previously on a 22-yard field goal by end John Halstead.

Rutgers struck quickly against Princeton in college football's oldest football rivalry dating back to 1869. Rutgers' tailback Bill Wolff connected on a 34-yard touchdown pass in 13 plays after the opening whistle, then tossed to Bob Clark for a two-point conversion.

Notre Dame, Army and Navy all had little difficulty. The Irish, playing their first game under new coach

Using Same Rules
SOTA officials stated the meet will be conducted by the same rules and regulations as other drag races held on the Camp White drag strip this summer. Trophies will go to all class winners, for top time of the meet, and to little and top eliminator.

Time trials are scheduled to open at 9 a.m. with the eliminations being run-off after lunch. Concessions will be available at the track it was announced.

The SOTA drag strip is located in west Camp White seven miles north of Medford off the Crater Lake highway. The public is invited to view the action and signs will be posted from the "Y" in north Medford to the scene of the races.

Billy Hunter Beats Miteff
Syracuse, N. Y. (UPI) - Billy Hunter, unranked, unheralded and a decided underdog, sliced big Alex Miteff down to size Friday night and showed that fineness with a sharp left jab can overcome many obstacles, even a 23-pound weight advantage.

Hunter, a stablemate of Sugar Ray Robinson, whose style he likes to use, employed his very precise left jabs to badly cut Miteff's eyes and come away with a blood drenched win.

The Argentine's face was a bloody mess when Dr. Charles E. Bender stopped the fight after the seventh round, giving the 26-year-old Detroit eight-round knockout over seventh-ranked Miteff. The cuts, however, were not serious-just bloody.

Hunter, whose record now stands at 13-6-2, was a 12-5 underdog.

Sophomore Fred Brown scored one touchdown and set up another to lead Georgia to a 21-6 win over Vanderbilt, and halfback Tom Matte's 23-yard touchdown pass with less than two minutes to play gave favored Ohio State a 14-13 victory over Duke. Kicking specialist Dave Kilgore added the decisive extra point.

Elsewhere around the nation, Syracuse defeated Kansas, 35-21; Buffalo began defense of its Lambert Cup for small eastern colleges with a 23-14 victory over Temple; Yale beat Connecticut, 20-0; Pennsylvania licked Lafayette, 26-0; Wake Forest topped Virginia Tech, 27-18; Florida squeaked by Mississippi State 14-13; Indiana defeated Illinois, 20-0; Nebraska downed Minnesota, 32-12, and Washington State humbled San Jose State, 30-6.

Iowa Pulverizes California 42-12

Berkeley, Calif. - (UPI) - Iowa's Hawkeyes gave up a quick touchdown to California Saturday, then handled the Golden Bears more easily than they did last New Year's Day in the Rose Bowl by pulverizing them, 42-12.

California just about shot its wad before the game was a minute old when halfback Grover Garvin scored from 11 yards out after quarterback Larry Parque electrified a crowd of 45,000 by hitting Bob Wills with a 46-yard pass.

Then the Hawkeyes, who bounced California 38-12 last New Year's Day in Pasadena, went to work and spread the scoring around most impartially.

Iowa went ahead to stay with seven minutes left in the first period when Don Horn tallied from six yards out to cap a 71 yard drive and Tom Moore added the conversion.

Horn, a tough fullback, powered over for another tally during the carnage and made a third possible by clearing the way for Bob Jeter with a key block.

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Olen Treadway, finally getting a chance to play first string quarterback for Iowa with the departure of Randy Duncan, clicked on eight of his 12 passes for a total of 127 yards.

The Hawkeyes disdained ever going for the two point conversion and Moore showed they had a good reason. He made good on all six of his placements for the old-fashioned one pointer.

Aside from a 36-yard touchdown run by Crow and Garvin's early score, the game was strictly the property of Coach Forest Evashevskies ham-handed charges. California dashed itself to bits against a massive forward wall which was manned by such linemen as Mark Manders—the son of pro football's

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
