Civic Music Board Books Norway Festival Group

The Festival Company of Norway, sponsored by the Bergen International Festival of Music, Drama and Folklore, will appear in Medford next year under the auspices of the Jackson County Civic Music association.

The Festival company gives an annual international festival during May and June in Bergen. The event attracts the world's outstanding orchestras and concert artists.

Among the persons performing with the Festival Company of Norway is a complement of Hardanger fiddlers. The Hardanger Fiddle may well be called the national instrument, though Norway is rich in both stringed and wind instruments native to its provinces. The Hardanger Fiddle looks like a conventional violin with gaily elaborate inlaid designs. There the resemblance ends. It has four upper strings, which can be tuned at least 20 different ways, and five lower strings which act as "drones." The bridge is rather flat, permitting unusual double- and even treble-stop effects. The tone of the Hardanger Fiddle affects the listener deeply with its haunting expressive qualities.

The dances, from many districts of Norway, from mountain and fell, meadow and seashore, are performed by

groups, in ancestral costumes, carefully observing the traditional steps and rude and wild evolutions.

The remaining three or four Civic Music season attractions will be chosen by the board of directors of the association after the close of the annual drive, which opens Monday, September 28.

First event of the campaign will be a dinner at the Jackson hotel Monday at 6:30 p.m. Miss Rae Sinclair, representative of Civic Music on the national level, is expected Monday afternoon. She will speak at the dinner, and will assist association workers with the campaign.

The dinner is being planned by Mrs. Lyle Schoppert and Ray Lewis. Seth M. Bullis, association chairman, will preside. Mrs. John Dellenback is general chairman. Headquarters have been established at Purucker Music house.

The young man is a graduate of Stanford university. He spent three weeks this summer traveling in western Europe.



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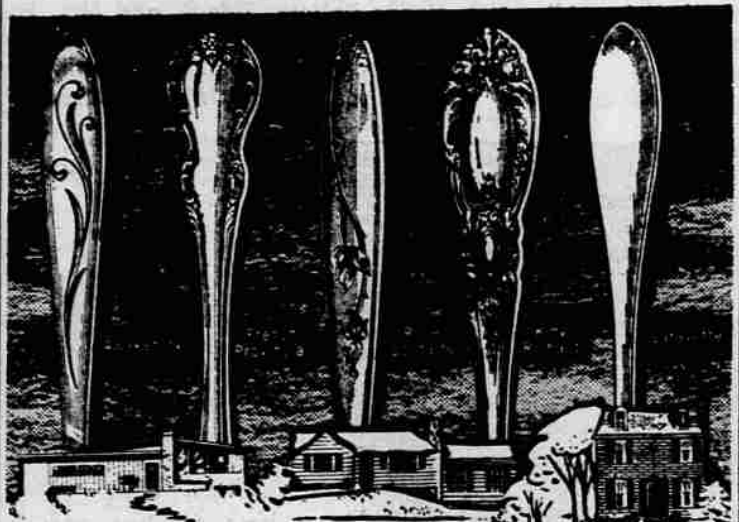
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
