Mrs. Budd is a daughter of Col. and Mrs. Charles Stafford, 1914 Westerlund drive. Her husband is also a student at Pomona college.

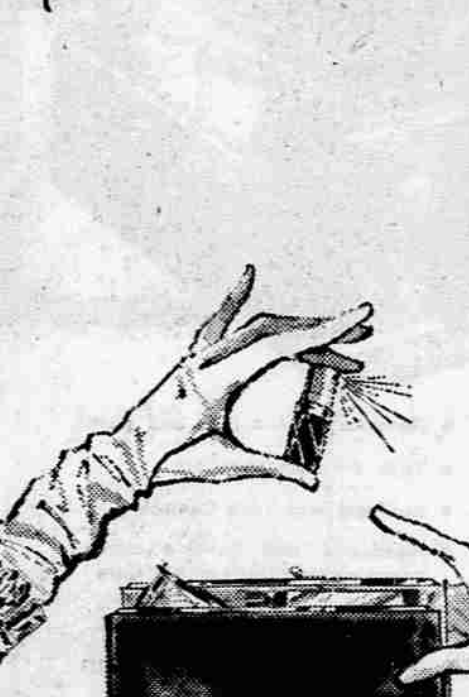
## Gideons Honored At Housewarming
