

LA Dodgers, Braves Play Off Tie For National League Pennant

Attendance Rise Noted In Majors

Major league attendance—sparked by the rise of the White Sox and Indians in the American league and the three-cornered pennant fight in the National—rose 9.1 per cent this year to top the 19-million mark.

The two-league total of 19,063,568 was 1,602,938 more than the total of 17,460,630 for the 1958 season.

The American league, its fans delighted at the astonishing collapse of the New York Yankees, experienced a 25.1 per cent rise from 7,296,034 to 9,121,100. The Indians experienced an amazing rise of 834,171 admissions to 1,497,976 and the White Sox rose 597,627 to 1,395,078.

Every other club except the Red Sox gained over 1958 and the Yankees themselves totaled 1,552,030—a rise of 123,592 for their highest total since 1952.

National league attendance totaled 9,942,468 for the third largest total in its history even though it represented a 2.1 per cent drop from the near-record total of 10,164,596 in 1958.

The Los Angeles Dodgers easily topped both leagues with a season total of 2,037,284 admissions. The Braves ranked second at 1,730,815 and the Yankees were third.

Central Point—Mike Glines ran for two touchdowns and passed for another Friday as the Crater high defeated Ashland in a ninth grade grid encounter.

The running of Glines, McCalvey and Wald, the line play of Willie Jones, Dean Purdy and Ken Stewart and the line backing of Hal Allen were Comet features.

Clubs Clash In Opener Of 2 of 3

Milwaukee—(UPI)—It was to be Carlton Willey against Danny McDevitt—the old pro against the young fireballer—today when the Milwaukee Braves and Los Angeles opened a best-of-three game playoff to resolve one of the most fantastic pennant races in National league history.

All even after winning Sunday's final game of the regular 154-game NL tournament, the defending champion Braves and rags-to-riches Dodgers squared off here.

The Braves were made a 6-5 favorite to win the first game of the vital three-game set. The Dodgers, however, have been listed as 6-5 favorites to take the series and give Los Angeles its first major league flag because the second and third games are scheduled for their massive 90,000-seat home park.

Wasted No Time
The World Series—almost anti-climactic for the third time in 14 years as far as the National league's representative is concerned—will open in Chicago's Comiskey Park, home of the American league champion White Sox on either Thursday or Friday depending upon whether the play-off goes two or three games.

The National league team has been promised a one-day layoff between the end of the playoff and the start of the World Series.

Manager Fred Haney of the Braves wasted no time naming Burdette as his playoff starter after the Braves climactic 6-2 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies Sunday but manager Walt Alston of the Dodgers hedged somewhat when he named Koufax after Los Angeles' 7-1 triumph over the Chicago Cubs. He listed southpaw Johnny Podres or Danny McDevitt as the other possibilities if he changes his mind overnight.

Winner Take All
Burdette has a 2-0 record against the Dodgers this year while Koufax stands 2-1 against the Braves.

The playoff actually throws more pressure on the players than the World Series because it's a case of "winner take all." The winner's share of a Milwaukee-White Sox series would be about \$9,000 while the winner's share of a Los Angeles-White Sox series might surpass \$11,000 per man. The playoff loser would collect only the regular second-place team's share of the spoils.

Craig, Buhl Hurl Triumphs To Ascertain Flag Deadlock

Roger Craig and Bob Buhl, who a year ago wondered if they had any future at all in baseball, scored the most important victories of their careers in the closing hours of the National league pennant race.

But, even so, they were forced to share the headlines with 34-year-old Sam Jones, who pitched one of the greatest "Money" games of all time in vain.

Craig, a 28-year-old right-hander from Durham, N. C., pitched a six-hitter to beat the Chicago Cubs, 7-1, and insure the Los Angeles Dodgers a tie for the flag, while Buhl, bushy-browed fireballer from Saginaw, Mich., received credit two hours later for the Milwaukee Braves' 5-2 triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

Craig Won 11th
Craig, who had made only two hits in 51 previous at bats, singled home the first two Los Angeles runs in the second in-

ning and it was a walkaway thereafter as Charlie Neal and John Roseboro iced the cake with two-run homers. Craig, who didn't join the Dodgers until June, won his 11th game while striking out two batters and walking two.

Buhl, aided by Don McMahon in the eighth and ninth innings after departing for a pinch-hitter, gained credit for his 15th victory. He battled Jim Owens on a 1-1 basis until the seventh inning when the Braves shoved across three runs on two singles, a walk, an error, a balk and an infield out. McMahon, making his 58th appearance of the year, yielded three hits but was touched for only a ninth-inning run.

Jones answered his critics once and for all Saturday night with his seven-inning no-hit, 4-0 victory over the Cardinals. It was all in vain for hard-luck Sam—who finished with a 21-15 record—because his no-hitter won't be counted officially and his victory was wasted when the

Giants blew their Sunday doubleheader to the Cardinals, 2-1, and 14-8.

Shaw Won 18th
Bob Shaw, 24-year-old right-hander, tuned up for a likely World Series starting assignment by winning his 18th game as the American league champion White Sox beat the Detroit Tigers, 6-4.

Harmon Killebrew tied Rocky Colavito for the AL home run crown by hitting his 42nd although the Washington Senators lost to the Boston Red Sox, 6-2, the Baltimore Orioles beat the New York Yankees, 3-1, and the Kansas City Athletics shaded the Cleveland Indians, 6-5, in other AL games. The Cincinnati Reds beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-7, in the other NL game.
