earned victories, but Lombardi's Packers and the Layne-inspired Steelers stole the opening week end show by upsetting two of the other title favorites.

Green Bay, which had the worst season (1-10-1) in its history in 1958, shocked the Bears Sunday, 9-6. It was a tremendous opening triumph for Lombardi, who became head coach and general manager of the Packers this year after five seasons as offensive coach for the Giants. It was scored before a capacity crowd of 32,150 victory-starved Packer fans at Green Bay.

Cleveland, seeking its eighth Eastern crown in 10 tries, was upset by Pittsburgh, 17-7. The Steelers haven't lost since Layne began clicking after joining them during the 1958 campaign. He fired two touchdown passes and kicked a field goal and two extra points to erase a 7-0 Cleveland lead Saturday night and boost Pittsburgh's unbeaten string to eight games.

The Colts, defending league champions, trailed the Lions, 9-0, late in the third period but rallied for a 21-9 victory. While their defense throttled the Lions before a record Baltimore opening day crowd of 55,558 the Colts won on Alan Ameche's scoring plunge and two touchdown passes from Johnny Unitas to Ray Berry and Jim Mutscheller.

New York, defending Eastern Division champion, frittered away a 17-0 lead Saturday night in the Los Angeles Coliseum, then stunned 71-297 Ram rooters by rallying to win, 23-21. The Giants won on two Pat Summerall field goals in the final period, the decisive boot traveling 18 yards with only 1:58 remaining.

In Sunday's other openers, Bobby Joe Conrad of the Chicago Cardinals scored 25 points on three touchdowns and seven conversions to spark a 49-21 triumph over the Washington Redskins and a pair of fancy-dan punt returns by Abe Woodson and rookie Eddie Dove set up touchdowns for the winners.

San Francisco marched 70 yards in the second period for its second score with Joe Perry whirling over from five yards out.

Norm Van Brocklin, Philadelphia's great quarterback, passed for two fourth-quarter touchdowns and had the Eagles on the one-yard line when the final gun sounded. Field Goal Provides Cushion

Tommy Davis provided San Francisco's cushion before a crowd of 41,697 at Kezar stadium when he booted a 43-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

The winners outgained the Eagles, 291-288. Van Brocklin connected on 21 of 40 passes for 174 yards, while Y. A. Tittle flipped 10 of 18 for 121 yards.

Teamsters Ready Political Fight

Washington - (UPI) - Leaders of the Teamsters Union were reported ready today to approve a new, multi-million dollar political action program to fight their congressional enemies at the polls.

The program was one of a number of issues listed for discussion at the fall meeting of the union's general executive board starting this afternoon.

It envisions a national political fund of from \$1 to \$2 million, volunteered by rank-and-file members, for lobbying and election campaign contributions. Similar funds would be established at the state and local level by Teamsters' locals and joint councils.

The anticipated plunge into politics was a reaction to the stiff new labor reform law approved by Congress over the bitter opposition of Teamsters' President James R. Hoffa.

EX-ITALY DEPUTY DIES

Trieste, Italy - (UPI) - Antonio Ferrarese, former Italian parliamentary deputy and mayor of Trieste, died here today at 71.

Chico State Whips SOC Raiders 34-6

Ashland - To show that mere statistics are no reflection of what happens in many a football game, Chico State college romped to a 34-6 win over Southern Oregon college last Saturday night in Chico.

Southern Oregon was ahead in every department of the black and white facts except for the punting yardage and fumbles lost—and the scoring.

The Red Raiders had 177 total yards with 60 coming in the air and 117 on the ground. Chico, on the other hand, gained 52 through the air and 92 on the turf for a 144 total. SOC hit eight of 22 aerials to the winners' three of 11, and the Raiders amassed 13 first downs to Chico's six.

Where the statistics fail, the actual game excelled as the Raiders spent most of the evening in their own territory on both offense and defense.

Four intercepted passes and numerous short punts kept the Raiders back on their heels. Two of the interceptions were converted to touchdowns for the Wildcats. They scored 43 yards on one and were sustained for three plays on the other before they crossed the six point chalk mark.

Chico took the kickoff and fumbled its first of three miscues three plays later only to have the Raiders fumble a field goal try from the Chico 27 back to the 36.

From there the Wildcats marched over land and through the air in four quick plays to the Raider goal line. A 21 yard run by Keith Calkins and a 31 yard pass play from Jim Ray to Mose Mastelotto covered most of the distance.

Gene Furr packed the mail the final 10 yards and Frank Enos added two extra points on a three yard run with six minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The two teams traded punts and SOC had the ball on their own 34 when Mike Miller picked off Jack Brown's screen pass and returned it to the 16. Three plays later Enos ran 11 yards into the end zone and the second quarter was five seconds old.

Bobble Again

Again the Raiders bobbed the ball around when Chico kicked off and when the whistle blew the Raiders had the ball on their own seven-yard marker. Two plays got the ball to the 15 but their another miscue gave the ball to the eager Wildcats who scored after a trio of plays.

Marshall Kreuter flipped a pass to Bill Morris from 13 yards out with only 12:00 remaining in the first half. Again the run for the extra points was no good and the score stood 20-0 through half-time.

The second half started a little different when Jess Munyon recovered a Chico fumble in the early minutes but one of the quartet of interceptions stopped the Raiders hopes cold.

Francis Scores

This time it was Lance Locke faking the look-in pass and throwing to Punk Bidington in the flat only to have Morris intercept on the Raider 43 and race untouched to the goal line. Enos was successful on the run and scoreboard showed a 28-0 bulge for the home team.

Eldon Francis tightrope-walked down the right sideline for 21 yards and the Raiders only score minutes later. The series of downs started on the SOC 48 and a first down penalty kept the drive going.

Scheffing Replaced By Grimm

Chicago - (UPI) - Bob Scheffing resigned today as manager of the Chicago Cubs and Charley Grimm was named to replace him.

Grimm, who two years ago rejoined the Cubs as a vice president after his ouster as manager of the Milwaukee Braves, will be managing the Cubs for the fourth time.

Club President Philip K. Wrigley said that he felt Scheffing "is a valuable asset to our organization; therefore, he has been offered and accepted a position in the baseball department."

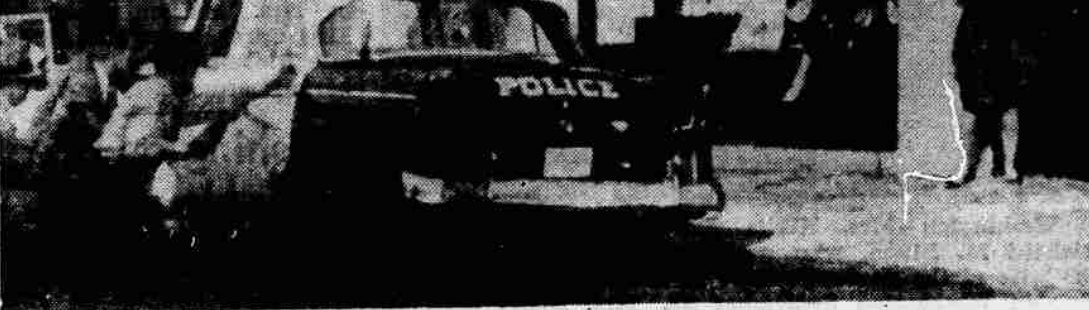

Summerall Field Goal Tops Rams

Los Angeles - (UPI) - The condition of quarterback Bill Wade's injured knee worried Los Angeles Ram officials today more than the opening loss to the New York Giants.

Wade, top passer in the National Football league last year, was injured in the final quarter of Saturday night's 23 to 21 Giant victory, on a 15-yard run.

The ligaments in Wade's right knee were torn during the rough and tumble play. The overenthusiastic camaraderie resulted in several players being ejected.

Pat Summerall gave the Giants their come-from-behind win with a field goal from 18-yards out with less than two minutes to play. It was the third field goal for the golden-toed Summerall and brought the Giants back to victory when it looked as if the Rams might overcome a 17-point deficit to win it.

Los Angeles did have a last ditch chance to pull it out but missed when Jack Morris' 42-yard field goal was three feet wide to the right.

Long Runs

The contest was replete with long runs and sensational passing, but it was the line play that stood out. The Giant defensive unit, bulwarked by linebacker Sam Huff, contained the breakaway Ram runners, while the Ram defensive unit kept the pressure on Giant quarterback Chuck Conerly. Gene Brito and Lou Michaels led the Los Angeles defenders.

Completed 21 of 31 Passes

The Giant signal caller, however, managed to complete 21 out of 31 pass attempts for one touchdown and 321 yards.

Ram passer Bill Wade thrilled a crowd of 71,297 with almost as effective aerials until he was hurt and left the game. He completed 14 of 20 passes for 204 yards and two touchdowns.

Going into the fourth quarter, Los Angeles led 21-17, but New York closed the margin to a single point when Summerall kicked his second field goal-good for 14 yards. His first boot was good for 21 yards.
