Duck Hunting Hunts for Extinction

Slowly, over the swampy edge of the lake the mists began to rise. The cattails began to take form and substance. A partly foggy, late dawn faintly lightened the eastern sky. The whistle of wings overhead alerted the two men. They shook themselves, straightened out their cramped arms and moved into a shooting position. The blind had been cold and damp.

Still hidden by the low blanket of the mist, out came the conversational "voices" of wild ducks, alerted by the approaching dawn. The crash of a gunshot across the lake broke the silence. Half a dozen dark forms hurtled out of the mist, their wings beating furiously, coming straight across the lake. Guns blazed from several points. Two ducks came on toward the two waiting men. The men fired. A duck plummeted into the water, flapping wildly,

one wing dragging. The season was open.

Impart Joy

It is doubtful that any game bird imparts more of the "joy of the hunt" in the breast of the sportsman than that of wild duck hunting time. Time was when great flocks of ducks migrated by thousands along the great flyways. They came to rest and feed in ponds, swamps, swales and rivers. Over half a dozen well-traveled flyways the wild-fowl migrated north and south. But, sad as the true facts are, those were "the good old days." For duck hunting, as we have known it, is just about a "lost sport."

There are many reasons, of course, for the decline of the waterfowl population, many of them over which we have little or no control, and some even for which we are blameless. Probably the greatest factor in the duck decline is the encroachments of civilization. Progress, we call it, in which we see the filling up of the ponds, swales and wetlands. Migrating ducks - and ducks will continue to migrate even though only half a dozen comprise the flock - must come to rest occasionally. They can neither feed nor rest on a pavement or a parking lot.

Developed Land

Where countless generations of wildfowl came to rest in bygone years is now "developed" land. Arriving at places where last year they rested, they find the wetlands have become "drylands." The same superhighway that eliminated the swamps and bogslands also affords better transportation for an ever increasing number of hunters. The gun-pressure becomes increasingly heavy as the flocks diminish.

The thinking man views the future a little sadly. If he has a son the chances of that boy enjoying the sport of duck hunting are pretty slim. The fog and mists of future mornings may rise over some lonely and neglected lake or pond, but the duck "voices" will be sadly absent; the high-flying wildfowl will have flown in to oblivion. In some respects civilization and progress exacts a pathetic price.
