

## First Families Move Into SAGE Near Corvallis

Corvallis—UPI—The first families have been moved onto the SAGE base of the Portland Air Defense Sector north of here.

First tests of the SAGE-Semi-Automatic Ground Environment—defense equipment in the huge windowless block-house will be made in October, according to Col. Robert H. Jones, commanding officer.

Tests will include the radar equipment of stations around the Northwest.

The Air Force has accepted the first 44 houses for the contractor and Col. Jones said the rest of the 150 on the base are expected to be ready in mid-October.

Some support facilities have been accepted and others are expected to come under Air Force jurisdiction by Dec. 1, Col. Jones said.

**Big Monthly Payroll**  
When in full operation, the sector will have 1,098 Air Force personnel and 190 civilians, Col. Jones said. The Air Force payroll alone will be about \$330,000 a month. The Bomarc missile base, which is included in the sector and is near the SAGE installation, has 60 persons employed in construction work. The Boeing Airplane company will bring in another 150 to 200 employees by the first of the year.

## Eugene Television Channel Awarded

Washington—UPI—A Federal Communications Commission examiner recommended Monday the grant of TV channel 9 at Eugene, Ore., to Liberty Television, Inc.

Examiner Thomas H. Donahue recommended Liberty over a competing bid by KEED, Inc., which operates stations KEED-AM-FM at Springfield, Ore.

Liberty is headed by Donald McDonald of Eugene and is composed mostly of Eugene area stockholders.

## Loyalist Forces Moving Against Enemy in Laos

Vientiane, Laos—UPI—Loyal forces were reported advancing across the Nam Ma Valley today in hopes of driving the Communists out of strategic outposts the government wants United Nations investigators to see.

Acting Foreign Minister Sisouk Na Champassak said government forces in the northern province of Samneua recaptured Muong Het Sunday and are now advancing toward So Phao and the Ma River Valley.

**No Resistance Reported**  
There was no report of Red resistance to the government advance, which official sources said was intended to retake as much as possible of the territory the Communists seized in their Aug. 30 attack so U.N. fact-finders can make an on-the-spot survey of the area.

Communist harassment was reported at Muong Heua, a town in Samneua outside the area of today's government attack, and some enemy arms were said to have been seized.

**Weapons Examined**  
Meanwhile, the U.N. investigating team was examining weapons captured from Communist prisoners, offered by the government to support its claim of North Viet Namese intervention in Laos.

The investigators plans to fly to Samneua Thursday. They will return here Saturday and fly to Phongsavang Province, the other northern center of Red activity, on Sunday or Monday.

**President Said To Be Healthy Man**  
Memphis, Tenn.—UPI—Dr. Paul Dudley White said here Monday President Eisenhower is a "really healthy man" but has "had enough" of the presidency.

The statement from the President's former chief medical adviser was an answer to a newsman's question about Eisenhower's fitness for a third term if it were legally permitted.

White, who treated the President during his 1955 heart attack, smiled and replied: "I think he's had enough, on general principles. But not because of his health. He's a really healthy man."

**SUCCESSFUL BALL**  
Cave Junction—The Fireman's Ball Saturday night was considered a success, with more than 300 people attending. Hal Moore of Kerby said he believed it to be the largest dance in many years.

# Wedemeyer Report on Red China Similar to Recommendations by UN

Editor's note: Earnest Hoberacht, United Press International vice president and general correspondent for Asia, was the only correspondent to follow Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer throughout his 1947 fact-finding tour of China. In the following dispatch he points out that some of the Wedemeyer mission's recommendations for bringing peace to China were similar to subsequent programs carried out by the United Nations.

Tokyo—UPI—In the summer of 1947, President Truman sent Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer on a fact-finding mission to China.

China was a major worry. The Nationalists had plenty of post-war problems and the Chinese Communists were putting increasing pressure on the recognized regime.

At the conclusion of his two-month trip, Wedemeyer submitted his report. It went to President Truman with a covering letter dated Sept. 19, 1947.

It generally was expected at the time that the report and recommendations were to be made public soon. However, they were not and the results of that mission did not become known until much later when the State Department white paper of 1949 was published.

**Charged Report Suppressed**  
As the 10th anniversary of the establishment of the Chinese Communist regime approaches this week, it is interesting to look back and see what Wedemeyer recommended.

In many ways his recommendations for maintaining peace and supporting the recognized regime are similar to methods used elsewhere in the world in later years.

The key point called for the United Nations to take immediate action to bring an end to hostilities in Manchuria as a prelude to the establishment of a guardianship or trusteeship.

He said if the step was not taken, "Manchuria may be

drawn into the Soviet orbit, despite United States aid, and lost, perhaps permanently, to China."

It turned out that Wedemeyer was not yelling "wolf" and, if anything, was too conservative.

In 1949, the year the report

finally was made public, the Chinese Communists announced the formation of their government.

Wedemeyer has said that he worked to obtain the release of his report but it was buried until dug up by Senate committee investigators who were

alarmed by the imminent loss of China to the Communists.

He has said he wanted the report made public as soon as possible because he knew that any delay in implementing his recommendations was serving the purpose of the Communists.

## PARISH CONGESTION

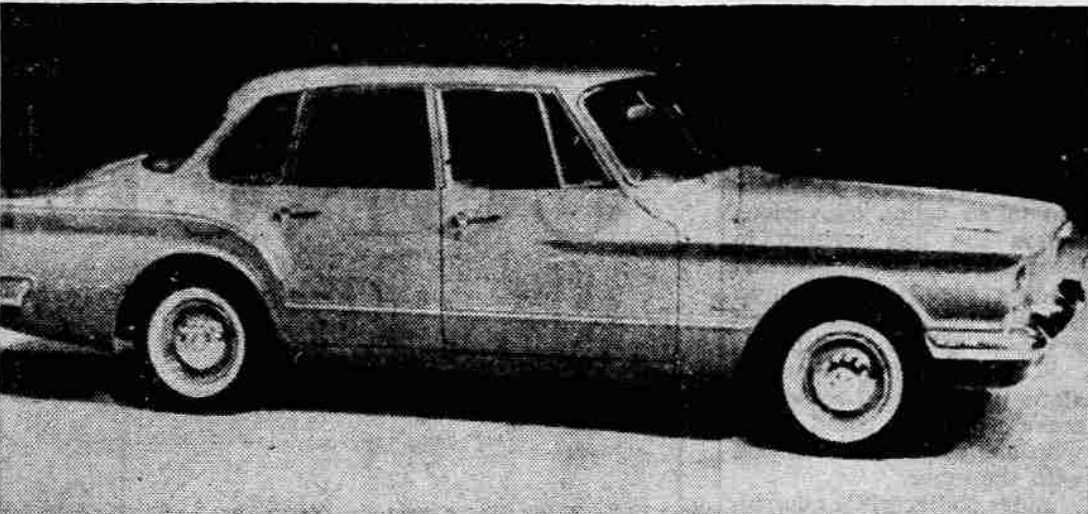
London—UPI—The Bishop of Southwark complained today that too many cars are parked in front of parish churches.

## Munford Funeral Will Be Private

Hyannis, Mass.—UPI—Private funeral services will be held Thursday for Walter F. Munford, 59, president of the United States Steel Corp.

Munford died Monday less than a week after suffering what was termed an accidental stab wound at his summer home in nearby Chatham. Last Thursday, the day after the stabbing, Munford suffered a cerebral stroke.

For a time it appeared he would recover but his condition worsened Sunday and the family began a 24-hour vigil at his bedside in Cape Cod hospital.

Hospital officials said a routine autopsy would be performed but added it would be "strictly academic." They listed cause of death as cerebral thrombosis aggravated by complications. They said the stab wound was not responsible for his death.
