Kansas City Seeks New Manager

Kansas City, Mo. — (UPI) — The Kansas City Athletics today were looking for a new manager and the big question was, who is it going to be? The A's Monday night announced that the contract of manager Harry Craft would not be renewed next year, but instead offered the 44-year-old ex-Cincinnati outfielder a responsible position in their player development program. "I hope he decides to remain with the A's," General Manager Parke Carroll said. Carroll added that the club would not name a new manager until owner Arnold Johnson returns to Kansas City next month from Europe.

Future Uncertain
Craft's managerial future with the A's had been up in the air since the club nosedived in mid-season and finished seventh for the second year in a row. "We decided we needed a change in managers," Carroll said. "I would be unfair to blame one man for the slump this year. Actually it wasn't a slump, it was a collapse."

Craft was severely criticized by fans here after the A's lost 13 straight games late in the season.

Corvallis, Ore. — (UPI) — Coach Tommy Prothro admitted that the passing game would be stressed at Oregon State. The Beavers have completed only five passes this season in losing their first two contests. Defensively, Texas Tech moved to a 15-14 win over the Beavers last Saturday with a second half aerial barrage.

Pullman, Wash. — (UPI) — Washington State Coach Jim Sutherland scrapped his third and fourth teams Monday while the top two clubs held a light offensive drill.

South Salem Eleven Coming Here Friday

Some of the top basketball prospects included Bob Petersen, 6-5, all-stater from Klamath Falls; Grant Harer, 6-10, second team all stater from North Salem; Dave Hayward, 5-10 guard from Downie, Calif.; Phil Herman, 6-3, from Redondo Beach, Calif., and Paul Hornyaack, six foot all-stater from Henley, Nev.

The top football players included John Thies of Jefferson, Ladd Horn of Pendleton, Mike Youngquist of Salem and Steve Moe of Corvallis. **Baseball Hopes**

Oregon State also got several good prospects from both southern and northern California and from Washington. Baseball prospects enrolled as freshman included Dave Long, Cleveland high of Portland, second baseman; Baker; Cecil Ira, Franklin, a shortstop; Harry Demorest, Jefferson, hard-hitting first baseman, Dave Turnbull, San Carlos, Calif., pitcher who was player of the year in his district; Gary Jones of Bend, a catcher, and Pat O'Connor, Scappoose, also a catcher.

Ring Men To Appear In Court

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The U. S. attorney's office was completing legal steps today to arraign three Eastern boxing figures after two local men were brought into court on charges they tried to take over world welterweight boxing champion Don Jordan.

Paul John Frankie Carbo, reputed underworld king of boxing, was free on \$100,000 bond awaiting action that will require his arraignment on grand jury indictments returned Sept. 22. Cargo was released from a hospital Saturday.

Two others, Frank Blinky Palermo, Philadelphia, and Truman K. Gibson Jr., former president of the International Boxing Club, also were accused of attempting to muscle in on the earnings and career of Jordan by threats of violence. Those arraigned Monday were Joseph Sica and Louis Dragna, both Los Angeles.

Grimm On 3rd Term With Cubs

Chicago — (UPI) — Charlie Grimm begins his third term as manager of the Chicago Cubs today without an idea how to convert a team that has twice finished in a fifth place tie into a 1960 pennant winner. "I don't know what we have to do to make us a contender," he said. "But I do know of five boys in the farm system who might help us. And what else I'll take, we'll have to decide in conferences in the near future."

Grimm, 61, a Cub vice president for the past two years, was named to succeed Bob Scheffing Monday when the latter "resigned" after a negotiation parley with club president Philip K. Wrigley.

Scheffing To Stay
Scheffing will remain with the club with only "a slight cut in pay," but his exact duties have to be determined. He might become a farm team manager, or perhaps work in the farm organization, but Wrigley emphasized it would be a "baseball" job and not in a front office capacity.

Grimm, who previously managed the Cubs from Aug. 4, 1932 through July 20, 1938, and from May 7, 1944 through June 10, 1949, said he took the job again "only because of Mr. Wrigley."

Drug Blamed For Sickness

Norman, Okla. — (UPI) — The University of Oklahoma football team physician said Monday night that he believed 20 Sooner players were poisoned "by some kind of chemical or drug" before their 45-13 loss to Northwestern university Saturday.

Dr. D. G. (Mike) Willard said he hopes to have a complete report within a day or so on investigations made by Chicago and Evanston, Ill., authorities into the sudden sickness of the players Thursday night, about 42 hours before the game.

Several of the Oklahoma players became violently ill after dining at a large Chicago night club. Team officials suspected they had suffered food poisoning as result of a fruit salad they ate, but Chicago health officials ruled this out Friday morning after a quick investigation.

University of Oregon, Eugene-Oregon's coaches greeted one of the outstanding groups of freshmen and transfer athletes in many years here Monday as classes began for the fall term.

The Webfoot freshman football enrollees include some of the top linemen in the west, led by prep All-American Mickey Ordling of Richmond, Calif., all-northern California player of the year Ron Sniid of San Rafael, and guard Dennis Prozninski of Portland's Jefferson high and Jack Swain of North Bend, both standouts in last month's prep Shrine game in Portland.

A partial list of the other top players includes tackle Steve Barnett, a 230-pounder from Fremont, Calif., who is also a heavyweight wrestling champion, Jim Anaya, a 195-pound guard from Sunnyvale, Calif., Don Cadenasso, 195-pound tackle from Martinez, Calif., John Comeau, 225-pound all-star tackle from Los Angeles, Al Cox, 215-pound center from Riverside, Rich Dixon, an end from San Francisco, Jerry Fedrizzi, an all-state end from Glenwood Springs, Colo., Ray Johnson, a 235-pound tackle from Puyallup, Dan Libaric, a center from Petaluma, Calif., and Chuck Starr, a Shrine guard from West Linn.

The backs are led by Duane Cargill of Springfield, one of the top runners in Oregon prep ranks, Jack Shanley, the younger brother of the ex-

In basketball Coach Steve Belko has junior college transfers Bill Simmons (6-4) of San Francisco CC, Jim Grenatta (5-9) of Bakersfield, Artist Gilbert (6-2) of San Diego, Dave Ringe (6-2) of Thornton JC in Harvey, Ill., and Nick Robertson of Boise, younger brother of varsity regular Stu and a former St. Francis of Eugene prep star, to join his varsity immediately.

The freshman list is headed by Gordon Scott of Astoria (6-5), Dave Ross (6-4), younger brother of Jerry, another Duck star, from Portland's Cleveland high, all-state Tom Tuttle (5-11) from Sioux City, Iowa, Everett Jackson of Los Angeles, Bill Turner (6-0) of Myrtle Point, Dick Pollock (6-4) of Munich, Germany, and Ralph Rittenour of Beaverton.

Los Angeles—I was really worried only once—by Bill Bruton in the ninth. Worried isn't even the proper word. I was scared as the devil when the ball he hit took off to deep center field. Fortunately for me and all of us, Don Demeter caught up with it.

I know how much the game meant to all of us, but frankly I didn't feel any of that so-called pressure. Maybe it

was because I was too busy concentrating on the hitters. **Aaron Bothers**
Hank Aaron was the fellow that concerned me most. I made a few mistakes pitching to him, but I got away with it, thank goodness.

I was ready when I came into the game in the first inning even though I threw only about 25 pitches in the bullpen. I threw mostly fast balls. My slider wasn't working too well when I first took over for Danny McDevitt but it started to come around near the end.

I think I was the happiest guy in the ball park when Bob Avila popped up to Jim Gilliam for the final out. Earlier in the game, in the seventh inning, I remember running the count to three and nothing on Avila. I then

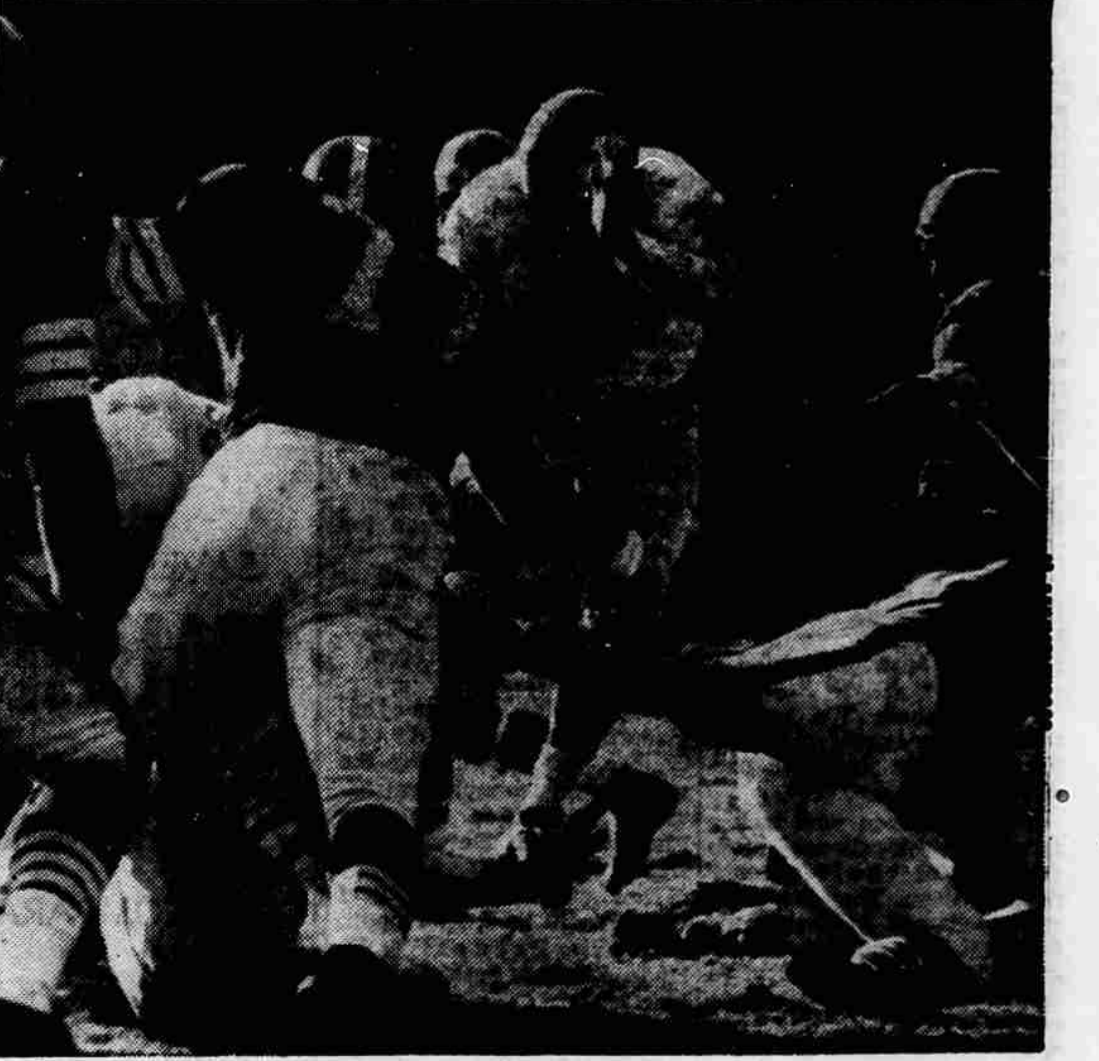
