Civic Music association, a non-profit organization which operates to bring top ranking musicians and other artists to the county, has to its credit a long record of outstanding concerts. The list of world-famous artists and groups seen and heard on stages here includes Joseph Szigeti and Nathan Milstein, violinists; the Don Cossacks, Leora Pennario and Claudio Arrau, pianists; the Viennese Ballet, such vocalists as Dorothy Warrenskjold and Jan Pearce, the Danilova and Markova dance ensembles and the Zurich Little symphony orchestra.

Last year's concerts included one by Blanche Thebom, one of the nation's leading singers, and Goya and Mateo, a dance team of international reputation.

Booked already for this year is one attraction, the outstanding Norway Festival group which gives an annual international festival in Bergen each year. This group includes singers, dancers and instrumentalists.

The concerts are open only to Civic Music members; no single admissions are ever sold.

## Playhouse Filled With Rare Toys

There's no telling what will come of rummaging through an attic. For Mrs. William F. Kredel, it meant setting up "housekeeping" with two dozen dolls and a collection of miniature antique furniture.

Mrs. Kredel has hundreds of toys, tiny dishes, and miniature cooking utensils, all at least 50 years old and many more than 100 years old. The small treasures fill a hexagonal-shaped playhouse, which was Mrs. Kredel's retreat when she was a child. She began fixing up the playhouse when she returned to live in her childhood home after her mother's death a few years ago.

Mrs. Kredel moved the small cookstove where she used to fry her breakfast eggs, several sets of toy dishes, dolls, and other play equipment which she found in the attic to the playhouse in her back yard. They became the nucleus of a display of toy furniture probably unsurpassed outside museums.

There are 11 complete sets of doll dishes, among them dishes depicting the antics of Buster Brown. Other dishes are an English tea set, some French porcelain and a set of brown Stratfordshire. The collector's favorite is a Japanese service for six.

A doll buggy with a fringed top, reported to be more than 100 years old, is filled with dolls of the same vintage.

Many pieces of furniture are miniature reproductions of real furniture made by manufacturers for salesmen to display to dealers.

Prized pieces of this variety include two stoves, one for heating and the other an old-time kitchen range; a tiger-eye maple four poster bed that is one of the most expensive items in her collection; and a 30-inch-high toy organ. Of the pedal variety, the organ still can produce the tunes in the little song book on its rack.

Other items include a pine dresser with tiny twin shelves for lamps flanking its old fashioned mirror, a burl walnut chest of drawers and a tin cupboard with china knobs. Walls hold original Currier and Ives prints of childhood subjects.

Several sets of miniature cutlery are displayed on small tables and cabinets. One set has bone handles marked, "For A Good Girl" and "For A Good Boy."

## Voters' League Program Outlined

A fringed, leather frontier jacket may not be the usual apparel for a luncheon at Rogue Valley Country club, but Mrs. Nat Etzel of Eagle Point wore one last Saturday at the general meeting of the League of Women Voters. Tolerant though leaguers try to be, there were obviously a few "raised eyebrows" before Mrs. Etzel had the opportunity to explain that she was dramatizing the Oregon League's new pioneer study of metropolitan government.

Bursting at the elbows and seams, the jacket represented government outgrowth by increasing population. The fringe depicted the problems of suburban areas — attached to the city, yet somehow not part of the general structure — but still dependent upon the city for support. "The state's role in the problems of metropolitan government" is one study item that will be remembered for its presentation by the chairman, Mrs. Etzel.

Mrs. John Ousterhout explained that the publication and presentation to the citizens of the community of the "Know Your County" booklet early in the year is the "action" item for the local program. A large amount of research material gleaned during the past two years is being condensed into a small usable booklet.

**Water Resources.** A national program topic, will be studied in two parts according to the chairman, Mrs. Kenneth H. Baker. As an appendage to the over-all national water approach a regional study of the Columbia Basin is being undertaken by the Leagues of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana. This phase of the study will be taken up by the Medford League in February. October units, however, will be reviewing materials which have been developed through the past two years in an attempt to make recommendations regarding coordinated administration and equitable financing of water development.

In the absence of the chairman for U.S. foreign policy, Mrs. Fred Burich, Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, president, summarized the proposed study to include the policies of economic aid and technical assistance.

Mrs. Ben Day, chairman of the state study item of the constitution and its revision, gave the background for the League's present stand and its study. As a result of study begun in 1952, the Oregon League recommended that the Constitution of Oregon needs revision and that a convention would be the most desirable method rather than piecemeal, one section at a time.

In the light of a recent development, the Shirley Field Amendment passed by the last legislature which will permit amendment of more than one section at a time, it seemed necessary to re-eval-

ate the League's stand. This will be done by Leagues all over the state in November in order that a position may be established before this Field Amendment appears on the ballot. In addition, the judicial branch of the Constitution will be studied to complete the League's study of all branches of the state government.
