Damage Suit Trial In Progress Here

Trial of the civil suit against Ross Lumber company for damages from the death of Jean Charles Smith March 11, 1955, was in progress today in Circuit Judge Edward C. Kelly's court.

Named as plaintiffs are Vanda Smith Harp, identified in the complaint as Smith's wife, and two girls represented by legal guardians identified as his daughters.

The suit asks damages amounting to \$1,500 for Mrs. Harp, \$27,140 for one girl and \$29,600 for the other.

Smith was killed by a log rolling onto him from a truck at a Ross Lumber unloading platform and mill pond near Prospect, according to the complaint. The plaintiff's allege that Ross Lumber was negligent through a safety code violation.
