Paula B. - What can I do about a husband who requires pampering like a little boy? If he doesn't get it he goes into sulks.

Bert and I are in our mid-20's and have been married less than a year. I am working and I can't be expected to do things the way a woman who stays home all day does. Bert expects me to take care of the house and all his things like a maid. He doesn't think he's supposed to lift a finger.

On top of that, he resents my visiting my family. My father has been ill for the past year and I try to spend as much time as possible with him. Bert doesn't want to come with me, but he doesn't like being left alone either.

Bert B - I don't think asking a woman to cook a decent dinner and to keep the place in good shape is asking for maid service. I am willing to do my share, but any time I ask Paula to do something she reminds me that she works just as hard as I do.

As for being pampered, I have never had that happen to me in my life. My mother was widowed when I was 9 and she went to work. I'm used to shifting for myself.

But I thought married life would be different. It's no fun always walking into a messy house and hustling for your dinner. I'm willing to clean up afterwards, providing Paula stays home a few nights a week. Every night seems to be Daddy's night lately!

The Council: We don't get the impression that Bert is looking for maid service or pampering - only some signs that his wife cares for him and is happy to be with him. One of the ways wives customarily indicate their satisfaction with marriage is by taking an interest in their homes. This is sometimes difficult for a working woman, but it isn't impossible. With a hand from hubby, countless working women manage to maintain beautiful homes.

When lack of concern about the household is coupled with so zealous an interest in Daddy that Bert is left along nearly every night, there is good reason for him to wonder where he fits into the picture. The fact that Paula has an independent income is no help to Bert in his desire to be of importance in his married life.

We get the impression that Paula is running away from both responsibilities and the rewards of marriage. She cannot possibly enjoy being a wife when she realizes that her husband isn't happy and that he expects more of her than she is willing to give.

A woman working to make her home attractive and her husband comfortable can be a drudge and a servant or a queen in possession of her own domain - whichever way she chooses to look at it. It is Paula's misfortune that she has chosen the role of drudge.
