Reason for Three Deaths in Medford Home Remains Mystery, Police Report

Funeral services were held here today for Danny Lee Walton, 12, his father, Douglas Walton Jr., 34, and his sister, Pamela, 8.

Investigation has left little if any doubt as to the causes of the three deaths last Saturday evening in the Walton home at 1699 Grand ave., Medford.

But the reason for these deaths—the motive that apparently led Danny to slay his father, his sister and finally himself with a .30-06 rifle—remained a mystery.

Nor was there any real hope today that the mystery would ever be dispelled. Neighbors said they had heard shots, but there were no eye-witnesses.

Mrs. Mary Lou Walton, the thrice-bereaved widow who had been working as a telephone operator downtown when the shootings occurred, gave Medford police a lengthy

recorded statement after she left Rogue Valley hospital Monday.

Little Information
But what Mrs. Walton had to say offered little if any information that might explain the tragic episode.

She said she had had no knowledge or intimation of any trouble when she left for work after supper Saturday evening. She knew of no differences between her husband and son-in fact, they shared many common interests.

The family got along well, according to her statement. "We made a special point of doing things together," she said.

As for Danny himself, she described him as normal, active, intelligent.

Activities
He played football. He played the cornet and wanted to take up the tuba in the Hedrick-Junior High school band. He watched television, and seemed to prefer the comedy shows like "I Love Lucy."

He had a BB gun. His father let him shoot a rifle once at targets in a sandpit. Danny had watched his father cleaning his firearms when hunting season rolled around. But the boy was not obsessed with guns, and was not in the habit of pretending to shoot them.

Her husband kept all his firearms—and ammunition—in their bedroom. Furthermore, she said, he never left any of the weapons loaded.

Noticed Nothing
Asked whether Danny had been unhappy about moving here last June from Bellingham, Wash., Mrs. Walton said she had noticed nothing out of the ordinary. "As far as friends go," she said of their moving to Medford where her husband became head of shipping and receiving for the new Sears Roebuck and company

store, "I don't think any of us have lacked friends and everyone has been awfully nice to us."

She talked further of Danny, of his past illnesses and injuries and interests. But she could think of no reason for the sudden, fatal violence.

Troutdale Grower Gets Big N.Y. Order

Troutdale, Ore.—UPI—If you're in New York and you want carrots, come here. That's what Troutdale vegetable grower Peter Binn says.

Binn had an order Tuesday from a New York restaurant. The order was for 10 crates of his carrots each week as far as the carrots go. Just to be on the safe side, he phoned the restaurant, and the order was confirmed.

It seems the restaurant wants a special carrot that Binn grows from imported French seed on only a few acres. The restaurant's purchasing chief told the grower, "We want what we want..."

Binn's variety, considered a delicacy in France, is not more than three inches long and is known as sweet coreless.

The restaurant also wants them expressed daily. Binn said the mailing charges are almost three times as much as the price of the carrots.

Safeway Accused Of False Claims

Washington—UPI—The Federal Trade Commission has accused Safeway Stores, Inc., a major supermarket chain, of falsely advertising its "Slender-Way" bread.

The commission said Safeway's radio, television and newspaper advertisements picture "Slender-Way" bread as a low calorie food with fewer calories than ordinary bread.

Actually, the agency said Tuesday, eating the bread will "neither cause weight reduction or prevent its gain."

Suspect Arrested In Rape-Slaying

Long Beach, Calif.—UPI—Kenneth Schilling, 29, a pipefitter, was booked on suspicion of murder Tuesday night in connection with the rape-slaying of a Centralia, Wash., girl.

The body of Sherry Edgell, 9, was found Friday near an airport in the vicinity of her home and Lewis county sheriff's issued an all-points bulletin for Schilling.

Officers Robert Tison and J. E. Rodda said they found Schilling while tracking down the driver of a stolen car parked near the Alibi cafe. When they walked up to the suspect in the cafe and asked him if he was Schilling, he replied:

"No, you've got the wrong man."

The officers said Schilling, Olympia, Wash., offered no resistance when taken into custody and when he was being booked he offered, "I know what it must be, it's Al Weber's wife, Betty, who's causing this."

Questioned about Betty, Schilling would elaborate no further than "She's the mother of a girl 4 years old, a boy 6, and a girl, 9."

UO Enrollment Over Last Year

More students went to classes at the University of Oregon this week than last year, 549 more. This year's total enrollment thus far was 5,893 at the Eugene school.

At Corvallis, Oregon State College officials reported that enrollment was down about 240 for the comparable period in 1958. This year's total was 7,208.

At both schools the figures are expected to change in the next two weeks as late students register.

Organizing Y Program Talked

David Wilson, fraternal secretary of the Young Men's Christian association, discussed his work in organizing a Y program in Lahore, capital of West Pakistan, at a southern Oregon "YMCA World Service" conference here Monday.

Wilson spent 5½ years in Lahore, in northern India, where he recruited and trained residents to manage a YMCA program to train others as staff members and to finance their own program.

Wilson organized the first Y Men's club, camping program, and a youth hostel program for transients. One of the most important aspects of the Y in India, he said, was in helping students learn trades and skills from which they could earn a livelihood.

"World Service and Buildings for Brotherhood" was the theme of the conference, and Wilson noted that national campaign headquarters look on "buildings for brotherhood" as one of the most significant items the movement has undertaken.

Wilson noted that in many countries, the YMCA is the only recreational and social facility, and in some cases the only community service.

Jack Douglass of Klamath Falls, chairman of the district, introduced Wilson. Delegates to the conference came from Ashland and Klamath Falls YMCAs.
