

### Drivers Reminded To Use Lights Early

Now's the time of year when drivers need to be reminded to turn on headlights a little earlier, according to Police Chief Charles Champlin.

Chief Champlin said drivers should make a special effort to turn on lights when dusk approaches as it gives other drivers and pedestrians a better chance to see an approaching car.

The chief also issued the usual fall reminder about driving in fog. He pointed out headlights on low beam are proper for driving in fog day or night.

Parking lights, which many people use when driving in fog during the day are illegal, he said.

In Medford, as in other areas in the state, the highest number of accidents occur from about 3 to 6 p.m. During fall and winter months, a large part of this period comes just at dusk. From a dollars and cents standpoint, he said, operating headlights cost little and could prevent an accident.

## Japanese Typhoon Death Count Soars To 3,625 Persons

Nagoya, Japan—(UPI)—The death toll in the worst typhoon in modern Japanese history rose today to 3,625 persons. Another 1,773 were listed as missing and 9,448 injured.

Even as residents of Nagoya struggled to count the dead left by typhoon Vera and throw up temporary shelter for thousands of homeless, the weather bureau warned another typhoon may be on its way.

The meteorological agency in Tokyo said another devastating storm could hit the Japanese archipelago during the first part of October.

Officials estimated that typhoon Vera left \$150 million in damage. U. S. officials estimated damages to military property at \$2 million, half of it at the huge Tachikawa Air Base outside Tokyo.

Forty helicopters worked continuously to rescue thousands of cold and starving victims of the typhoon.

The choppers plucked survivors from roofs on which they took refuge.

More than 250 cases of dysentery were reported in Nagoya alone and one newspaper estimated there were as many as 2,000 cases in the entire Ise Bay area hit by the rampaging typhoon over the week end.

Officials feared large-scale outbreaks of tetanus, diarrhea and gas gangrene.

U. S. military and Japanese defense forces helicopters today began flying out survivors from Tobishima, Jushiyama and Yatomi villages near Nagoya. An estimated 20,000 persons were trapped on their roofs by a huge lake created when the Kiso river went over its banks.

Pilots reported many survivors were reluctant to leave their roofs despite hunger and privation, preferring to stay and guard what few possessions they salvaged from their homes. Some have had no food or clean water since the storm struck.

### Park Visits Break Record

Washington—(UPI)—Vacationing Americans paid a record-breaking total of 12,100,000 visits to national parks and other national park system areas last August.

The Interior Department said today that visitors poured into the parks at the rate of 390,322 a day. The previous record-high month was last July when visits totalled 11,875,000. Visits in August, 1958, totalled 11,661,000.

The 10 most heavily visited areas in the park system during August were: Blue Ridge Parkway, 970,000 visits; Great Smoky Mountains National Park, 817,000; Rocky Mountain National Park, 483,000; Grand Teton National Park, 468,000; Yellowstone National Park, 412,000; Olympic National Park, 409,000; Lake Mead National Recreation Area, 374,000; Natchez Trace Parkway, 335,000; Mount Rainier National Park, 324,000; and Mount Rushmore National Memorial, 324,000.

Only Yellowstone National Park among the top 10 reported fewer visitors than in August, 1958. The drop was caused by the series of earthquakes which rocked the crowded park area during the last two weeks of August.

### Neuberger Lauds Handling of Termination

Klamath Falls—(UPI)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) today called handling of Klamath Indian reservation termination "a unique example of true democracy at work."

To aid service clubs at a noon luncheon that "the decision of many of those directly involved to set aside partisan politics and business advantages in the interests of our state enabled us to save a forest, a tribe of Indians and a wildlife refuge from certain destruction."

Neuberger had praise for Republican Agricultural Secretary Ezra Taft Benson for his role in insuring the reservation's Ponderosa timber would be cut under sustained yield management.

"Secretary Benson does not fit the mold of a liberal's hero," Neuberger said. "But at the crucial juncture of our efforts to protect this giant forest... when the House of Representatives had eliminated provisions guaranteeing sustained yield, he sent to the conference committee a letter declaring that the Forest Service could not accept responsibility for supervising the timber effectively unless it had the legal authority to prevent it from being cut recklessly."

### Ratio of Doctors To Drop Sharply

Washington—(UPI)—The Public Health Service says the ratio of doctors to the U.S. population will drop sharply by 1975 unless medical schools start graduating substantially more students.

The PHS estimated that there would be only 126 doctors per 100,000 persons by that year if the present trend continues. Based on the 100,000 figure, the ratio has ranged between 131 to 135 for the past 20 years.

In a publication released Wednesday, the service also warned that the ratio of dentists may decline even more sharply by 1975. That ratio was 62 per 100,000 persons in 1940, 57 in 1958 and is expected to decline to about 50.

The ratio of nurses, however, has increased nearly five-fold in the United States since 1910. This ratio, 268 in 1958, is expected to climb to 284 in 1970.

### Body of Salem Woman Located

Salem—(UPI)—The body of Mrs. Virginia Rogers, 38, was found Wednesday in her car some 150 yards off the North Santiam highway about 14 miles east of the community of Idanha, state police reported.

Mrs. Rogers, a diabetic, vanished from her home last Friday.

Identification was made by the Linn county coroner. The woman's husband, Raymond Rogers, Silversand, said his wife had taken no insulin with her when she left home. She needed daily injections. An autopsy was scheduled for today.

### Ex-Representative Frank Farmer Dies

Dallas, Ore.—(UPI)—Funeral services will be held here Friday for former State Rep. Frank M. Farmer, who died in Salem Tuesday. Services will be at the Bollman Funeral Home with interment at Rest Lawn Memory Gardens.

Farmer was a Polk county commissioner for eight years and served two terms in the Legislature as Polk county Republican representative. He was a charter member of Willamette Cherry Growers and a member of the Board of Oregon Farmers Union Cooperative.

Survivors include the widow, Blanche, and a son and daughter.

### Czarist Bonds Said Not Good Buy

Washington—(UPI)—Here's a tip from someone who should know: don't buy those Czarist bonds.

Undersecretary of State Douglas Dillon related to newsmen Wednesday a conversation he overheard at a Washington cocktail party.

He said Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev was asked if the bonds issued by the revolutionary government were a good buy. The Premier, he said, promptly replied, "certainly not."

There was considerable buying activity of Czarist bonds last week during Khrushchev's visit to the United States.

### Washington Anglers Forfeit \$25 Bail

Astoria—(UPI)—Nine more Washington state fishermen have forfeited bail of \$25 each after being charged with fishing in Oregon waters without Oregon licenses. Trials for the nine were scheduled here this week in District court.

Altogether, 10 of the 19 Washington anglers arrested now have forfeited bond. Trial dates have not been set for eight more. The first man to be tried was found guilty Sept. 1 and fined.

### Broken Main Damages Store at Oregon City

Oregon City—(UPI)—A broken main caused undetermined damage to a department store Wednesday. The basement was flooded with more than a foot of water.

Store owners said loss was not expected to run high because most merchandise was not on the floor.

City crews spent three hours in finding and repairing the leak.

### Defensive Driving Is Encouraged by Police

The first responsibility as a driver is to avoid an accident, Medford Police Chief Charles Champlin said today.

Many drivers are so concerned about who has the right-of-way at uncontrolled intersections that they forget their responsibilities, he added. Intersection accidents, one of the leading types of Oregon accidents, could be reduced if drivers would practice a little more defensive driving, Champlin said.

"Everyone knows," he said, "that a driver is expected to yield to the car on his right, but in driving a driver normally should check to his left first. The first opposing traffic will be from his left, and if that car fails to give right-of-way he may be struck from the side."
