USW President 'Not Hopeful' Of Early Steel Strike End

Pittsburgh — (UPI) — United Steelworkers President David J. McDonald said today he was "not hopeful" that White House-ordered negotiations could bring a swift end to the marathon steel strike.

The union and the basic steel companies resumed deadlocked negotiations today. Before entering the conference room, McDonald said:

"I am afraid I am not hopeful. The industry bargainers refused to comment."

Both sides also refused to comment after emerging from the morning session, which lasted about 90 minutes. They said they would meet again this afternoon. A source close to the negotiations told United Press International that the two bargaining sessions here Thursday may have resulted in a "change" of thinking.

San Francisco Wins Troop Movements

San Francisco — (UPI) — The Bay Area economy received a "\$15 million shot in the arm" today with the announcement that all future Pacific Army troop movements will be routed through the Bay Area.

The announcement marked the end of a two-year battle between San Francisco and Seattle concerning the location of central troop routing. Approximately 5,000 troops are processed yearly on the West Coast.

Plane Passengers Suffer Poisoning

Honolulu — (UPI) — Fifteen persons were hospitalized for treatment of possible food poisoning when they debarked plane from San Francisco to Honolulu.

Prison Inmates Win Court Victory

Portland — (UPI) — A sweeping federal court victory for seven inmates of the Oregon State prison seeking unrestricted law studies during confinement came today in an opinion by Chief U.S. District Judge Gus J. Solomon.

In his opinion, Judge Solomon invalidated most of the restrictions on convicts who desire to prepare their own court appeals.

The ruling was a setback for the State Board of Control and Warden Clarence Gladden. They contended the controls were reasonable and necessary.

The seven convicts testified before the judge in Salem last November that their federal civil rights were being restricted.

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Khrushchev Said Encouraged by Mission Success

Significance Seen In Speech in China

Moscow — (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev is pleased and encouraged by what the Communist world recognizes as the unqualified success of his American mission, diplomatic observers said today.

Observers here attached considerable significance not only to the mild tone of Khrushchev's speeches in Communist China but also the actual words he used in the presence of Mao Tse-tung and other top leaders of the Communist camp.

Must Understand Situation

Khrushchev, acting very much like the acknowledged elder statesman of international Communism, said in Peking:

"We must reason realistically and correctly understand the present situation. And this does not mean we are so strong we should test the stability of the capitalist system by force. This would be wrong."

"People would not understand and would never support those who took it into their heads to act this way. We have always been against predatory wars."

Danger Spots Unspecified

The implication appeared clear — the Soviet Union certainly would not support any but a defensive war or what is known in Communist parlance as a "war of liberation."

He failed to specify any of the present danger spots in Europe, the Middle East or Asia. He did not mention Laos or the Sino-Indian frontier dispute. On the latter, the Kremlin is on record as urging the dispute be settled by negotiation, and it would not be surprising if the Soviet Union offers to mediate the dispute.

GOP Chairman Arrives in Salem

Salem — (UPI) — Republican National Chairman Thurston Morton arrived here today for a series of meetings with state and regional GOP leaders and an address tonight.

Republicans have gathered for a two-day leadership workshop which includes the first meeting of the GOP State Central Committee since Peter Gunnar, Salem, became chairman.

On hand will be Gov. Mark Hatfield who will speak Saturday night, Congressman Walter Norblad, plus Republican leaders from Washington, California, Arizona, Utah and Idaho.

Jury Clears Ross Lumber

A circuit court jury Thursday cleared Ross Lumber company, the defendant, in the trial of a suit asking damages for the death of Jean Charles Smith, March 11, 1955.

The plaintiffs were Wanda Smith, identified in the complaint as Smith's wife, and two girls identified as his daughters and represented by legal guardians. Asked were \$1,500 for Mrs. Smith, \$27,140 for one girl and \$29,800 for the other.

Smith had been killed according to the complaint in a logging accident on Ross Lumber's property near Prospect.

Attorneys for the defendant were Hugh Collins and James Redden, while Manville Heisel and Ronald Ricketts presented the plaintiff's case. The trial was held in Judge Edward C. Kelly's court.

Failure of Congress Blamed for Decision

Washington — (UPI) — Treasury officials today blamed failure of Congress to abolish interest ceilings on long-term securities for the treasury's decision to offer notes paying 5 percent interest rate. The rate will be the highest in 30 years.

Teamsters in Bid For Political Power

Division Set Up To Mobilize Union Members

Attempt Seen To Make Voice Heard

Washington — (UPI) — The Teamsters Union, in an open bid for greater political power, today set up a political action department.

A spokesman for the huge union, headed by James R. Hoffa, said the move indicated the "probability" that the union would endorse presidential candidates.

The political action department's main goal will be to mobilize the union's 1,633,000 members during political campaigns.

Spokesman Said Creation of the Department Was an Attempt by the Union to Make its Political Voice Heard

It will also "work toward a legislative program in Congress that would be beneficial to the membership," he said.

The new department was created by vote of the international union's 15-man Executive Board

According to the union spokesman, the department would provide teamster regional conferences and state and local organizations with "educational" material on political and economic issues and the voting records of members of Congress. He said the department would report which senators and representatives voted "right and wrong" on legislation.

Complying with Law

Endorsement of candidates for Congress would be pretty much left to teamster officials at local levels, the spokesman said.

The political development came after the union contended it was complying even more than required with provisions of the new labor reform law.

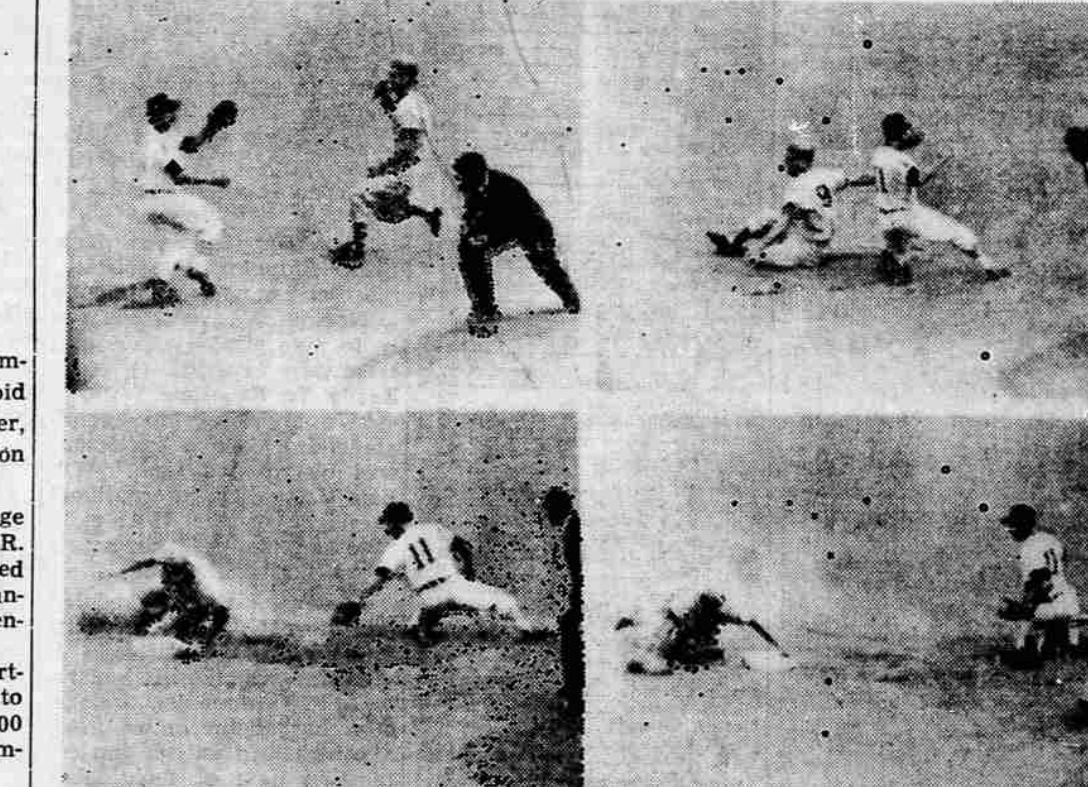

Talent District Takes Petitions

Talent — Talent Irrigation district is accepting petitions for inclusion of new land in its irrigation system, Walter Hoffbuh, district manager, said today.

Hoffbuh said with the addition of Howard Prairie reservoir, the district can take in 5,000 more acres. This, he said, is the maximum new acreage which the district can adequately irrigate. The district now has 10,000 acres under irrigation within its boundaries. Medford and Rogue River Valley irrigation districts contract for water for 9,000 more acres.

"We are anxious to have applications in as soon as possible since considerable processing is involved," Hoffbuh said. "Petitions must be sent to the bureau of reclamation regional office in Boise, Idaho, for approval."

The new acreage allowable involves both old and new water-users, Hoffbuh said. About 75 per cent of them are present water-users, he added.

Talent Irrigation district drew its first water from Howard Prairie reservoir July 21. Water users will pay approximately the same rates for the additional irrigation, he said.

Bids for Jackson Pool Rejected by Medford Council

Bids on the proposed Jackson park swimming pool were rejected by the Medford city council last night.

City Manager Robert Duff said some changes would be made in the specifications by Stevens and Thompson engineering firm and the project would be offered for bid again.

Lowest combined bid of three for the pool was \$101,582 submitted by the National Gunite company, Kalmath Falls. It was \$11,582 more than the engineer's estimate of \$90,000 for the main pool, bath house, mechanical plant and diving tank.

Mayor John W. Snider appointed Councilmen Ed Hall, Al Bradford and Jimmy Dunlevy to a committee to study the recently adopted swimming pool fence ordinance and make recommendations to the city council.

The items: 1, most carefully hidden radio; 2, fastest dictation between innings; 3, wildest rhabarb because subordinates aren't working (either); 4, longest letter typed during change of pitchers; 5, most phone calls completed during commercials; and 6, happiest smile when boss wins office pool.

Federal Approval of Cost-Sharing Plan for Ashland Burn Reported

Federal approval of a special cost-sharing arrangement for re-seeding private land in the Ashland burn was reported here today.

The arrangement was asked by the Jackson County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation committee in a letter Sept. 25. The hope of encouraging property owners to re-seed their land in the burn to help avert a potentially serious erosion problem prompted the request.

Word of the approval in Washington, D. C., was received yesterday, according to Harry Martin, ASC office manager here.

Express Interest

Martin reported that owners of nearly 600 acres of burned land have already expressed interest in the re-seeding program. A total of some 3,000 acres of private land was swept by flames in the fire last August.

Martin said that between 2,500 and 3,000 acres were suitable for re-seeding to grass and legumes under the special arrangement. Some of this land could be re-seeded to trees as well, he said, but a grass and legume cover would not interfere with this.

ASC and forestry officials consider time of the essence, and hope to have as much as possible of the burned-over acreage re-seeded before the rainy season.

Estimates Cost

Winters estimated that seed would cost about \$2.75 per acre and airplane seeding, about \$1.10. Of this total of \$3.85, he stated, the private landowner would pay about 77 cents with the federal government paying the rest.

In its request, the county AGC committee reported that the owners concerned showed no interest in re-seeding if they would have had to bear the cost themselves, and that "just a few" were interested if the cost were to be split 50-50.

"We are now assured," the request stated, "if 80 per cent of cost is offered, 500 acres would be seeded and possibly an additional 500 or more."

Two Homers by Neal Account For Three Runs

Essegian Gets Circuit Clout

Chicago — (UPI) — The Los Angeles Dodgers evened the World Series at one game each today when Charley Neal, who almost threw the game away with his fielding, won it with his bat, knocking in three runs to give the National League pennant winners a 4-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Neal hit two home runs. The first came in the fifth inning to give the Dodgers their first World Series run after being shut out for 22 2/3 innings, going back to their last game against the Yankees in 1956. And his second came in the seventh with the score tied and a teammate on base.

pinch homer by Chuck Essegian did the trick.

Essegian's homer came in the seventh inning, when with two out, he pinch-hit for Johnny Podres, the winning pitcher.

That set the Dodgers on fire, until Gilliam then walked against losing pitcher Bob Shaw, and Neal followed with his tremendous home run into the White Sox' bull pen in deep left centerfield to give the Dodgers a 4-2 margin.

Larry Sherry, one of the Dodger heroes in their National League playoff triumph against Milwaukee, preserved the victory for Podres, although he ran into trouble in the eighth inning.

Big Ted Kuszewski, one of the stars of the White Sox 11-0 victory Thursday started out with a single and went to second when Sherman Lollar singled. Earl Torgeson went in to run for Kuszewski, and a few minutes later Al Smith rifled a double to deep left center.

Torgeson scored, but the slow-footed Lollar was an easy out at the plate as he tried to get home. Smith went to third on the play and that's when Sherry really boted down.

He struck out pinch-hitter Billy Goodman, and then got another pinch-hitter, Jim Rivera, on a foul ball. He finished it out in style when he retired the White Sox in order in the ninth.

Gradual Decline In Lumber Prices

Portland — (UPI) — A gradual decline in lumber prices for the two-week period ending Thursday was reported today by Crow's Lumber Market News Service but the rate of decline was not as sharp as in the preceding week.

Crow's said, according to its index, standard and better grade green fir dimension leveled off in the past week and most of the price loss was confined to lower grade dimension items, and to boards.

Average green fir price at the end of the week was \$65.80 per thousand board feet, a bit higher than one year ago. Douglas fir plywood prices held at \$68, Crow's said.

Second Fence Around Institution Rejected
