

Trojans, Buckeyes Kick Off Week End College Football

 Southern California and Ohio State, a pair of top-ranked college football powers, will kick off another week end of major intercollegiate football Friday night when they collide at the Los Angeles coliseum.

The sixth-ranked Trojans, who trounced Oregon State and Pittsburgh in their first two games, are narrow two-point favorites over the Big Ten conference invaders.

Ohio State shared 10th place with Notre Dame in this week's UPI ratings and hopes to move up a couple of notches by defeating USC.

The Buckeyes opened their season last Saturday by edging Duke, 14-13.

It will mark the first night game ever played by an Ohio State team.

West Virginia is a six-point favorite over George Washington and Kentucky is a seven-point choice over Detroit in other major Friday night games.

The biggest attractions on Saturday's card are North-western vs. Iowa and Notre Dame vs. Purdue.

Northwestern was ranked second in the nation following its 45-13 victory over one-mighty Oklahoma last Saturday but is a one-point underdog against Iowa, which opened its season by clobbering California, 42-12.

Purdue, although unranked among the top ten, is a three-point favorite to hand Notre Dame its first defeat under new coach Joe Kuharich. The

Irish romped to a 28-8 triumph over North Carolina last Saturday while Purdue battled UCLA to a scoreless tie in its opener.

Top-ranked Louisiana State is a 21-point favorite over Baylor.

Fourth-ranked Army is a 10-point choice over Illinois

but seventh-ranked Clemson is a one-point underdog for its meeting with Georgia Tech.

In other games, fifth-ranked Mississippi is an "out" favorite against Memphis State, eighth-ranked Texas is a 10-point choice over California and ninth-ranked Wisconsin is picked to defeat Marquette.

Lema First Round Centennial Leader

Portland, Ore. — Nearly 100 golf professionals set out on the second round of the \$20,000 Portland Centennial Open today in pursuit of a young ex-marine.

Tony Lema, 25, of San Leandro, Calif., broke out of a summer long slump Thursday to show the field his heels with a seven-under-par 65 on the velvety fairways and greens of the Portland Golf club.

He had a two-stroke lead over the field in his quest for \$2,000 first money, and \$100 already in his pocket in first-day lap money.

Sponsors of the tournament, 20 young Portland business men who hope to make Portland a regular stop on the Professional Golfers association schedule, posted the daily purse—unique this year among PGA tournaments.

They also offered \$50 for holes in one, and a hometown hero, Harvey Hixon, promptly earned it with the first ace of his life on the 139-yard fourth hole.

Lema, who made his first pro tour last year and won more than \$15,000 slumped badly this year after a winter operation and has won little more than \$5,000. His highest

finish was a tie for 10th in the Texas Open.

He suffered two bogeys Thursday with three-putt greens, but countered them with a five-foot putt for an eagle on the 523-yard fifth hole, and fashioned seven birdies. His finest shot was a chip on the 18th which stopped two inches from the cup.

"You have to be lucky on a round like this," Lema said. "Of course this layout is a treat for us and rewards good shots. And some of mine worked out fine."

Closest to Lema at 67 were Jay Hebert, Sanford, Fla., and Jim Ferree, Crystal River, Fla. Seven were tied for fourth with 68s—Al Bessellink, Grossinger, N.Y., Ray Honsberger, Seattle; Bob Duden, Oswego, Ore.; Bill Maxwell, Odessa, Tex.; Smiley Quick, Los Angeles; Dick Knight, San Diego; and Frank Stranahan, Crystal River, Fla.

U.S. Open champion Billy Casper Jr., of Apple Valley, Calif., and PGA champion Bob Rosburg, Palo Alto, Calif., were in contention with a 69 and a 70, respectively. Don January, Denver, and Marty Furgol, Cog Hill, Ill., also shot 69s.

Also on the crippled list is Elvin Hawkins with a foot injury.

Rod Snyder may start at fullback and Bob Unger at tackle to replace the hobbled regulars. Other likely starters on offense are Ken Jorde and Mike Palm, ends; Paul Evers, tackle; Mac Lemmon and Gary Snyder, guards; Max Hawk, center; Tom Perdue, quarterback; Bob Berryman, left half and Steve Geren, right half.

Possible starters for Phoenix against Henley on offense are Les Baker, center; Jack Hoffhuhr and Ron Baker, guards; Jim Martin and Joe Colfax, tackles; Raymond Thompson and Othar Richey, ends; Gerald Sloper, quarterback; Leon Small, left half; Dan Lumley, right half; and Mike Cornsbruck, fullback. UCLA Plays Pittsburgh Saturday

 Southern California, with two big names sidelined, aims for its second intercollegiate win in a row tonight when the Trojans face Ohio State at the Coliseum.

Quarterback Willie Wood definitely is out of the lineup because of a shoulder separation he incurred last week while sixth-ranked USC was drubbing Pitt, 23-0. Also scratched is tackle Dan Ficca, Troy's big nominee for All-American honors. He has a sprained ankle.

One-Two Punch
 UCLA, in the meantime, will be out to show the Panthers that Los Angeles can deliver a good one-two punch in football. The Bruins invade Pitt Stadium Saturday for a game rated even by the odds.

UCLA was idle last Saturday after fighting to a scoreless draw with Purdue. Coach Bill Barnes of the Bruins has been concentrating on muzzling the passing attack of Ivan Tomic, Pitt's sharp quarterback.

California, sporting a shuffled lineup, has the rather dubious pleasure of facing Texas at sweltering Austin in Saturday's nationally televised game. The Longhorns, undefeated and unscored upon in their first two contests, are 10-point favorites. That was the same spread which was afforded Iowa last week before the Hawkeyes bashed the Bears 42-12.

Wayne Crow will be the starting quarterback instead of Larry Parque for California which meets a team well steeped in veterans and is tough stop on the ground.

Another cross-country tilt finds winless Oregon State at Nebraska where the Beavers have been further-jolted by the loss of tailback Grimm Mason for the season. Coach Tommy Prothro is looking to sophomores Earl Harbin and Don Kasso to hold down that vital spot now.

Norman Leads Stanford

Dick Norman, the nation's top passer, leads Stanford against College of the Pacific and Dick Bass. The latter suffered a pulled leg muscle against the Colorado Aggies two weeks ago but is set to run again.

The Indians, two -point losers to heavily-favored Wisconsin last Saturday, are favored by 10 over the Tigers.

Washington State meets Oregon in a game that Cougar coach Jim Sutherland has called "The turning point."

Len Casanova, the Ducks' smooth mentor, is gearing his offense to stop the WSU passing combination of Keith Lincoln and Gail Cogdill. Cas also has promised to unveil several offensive surprises in keeping with his policy of "Something new every week."

Huskies Favored Over Utes
 Washington has shown well scrimmaging against Utah plays and is expected to hand the Utes their second loss without a win.

Hawaii, surprise conquerors of San Jose State last year, takes on the Spartans Saturday night in the third and last game of a stateside junket that to date has been victorious. But San Jose is expected to be a lot tougher than Southern Oregon and Idaho State were.

Idaho, which has failed to score while losing its first two games, plays Arizona at Tucson, Arizona State shoots for its third win in a row when it takes on Montana State in a night game at Tempe.
