## New Senatorial Family Adjusts to Small Home

Washington—Space isn't necessarily the most important feature of a home, judging by the experience of Sen. Edmund S. Muskie.

The Senate's Democratic freshman from Maine and his family have just gone through the experience of adjusting from life in a Governor's mansion to that in a private home.

Interviewed on the differences, the former two-term Maine Governor told the National Association of Home Builders that one of the contrasts is the available space.

The 45-year-old Senator explained that the Governor's mansion has 32 rooms—"that's my wife's count, I never actually counted them"—while the new home they have bought in the Washington area has eight rooms and two and one-half baths.

The Muskies had their living and sleeping quarters in 10 rooms on the second floor of the gubernatorial mansion all over the children "played all over the place."

But the Senator said their present home gives them privacy they didn't have in the Governor's mansion.

"We like the privacy-space isn't everything," he said. "In balance, I think we like this manner of living better. Not that the four years as Governor weren't a wonderful experience but we were having a mode of life that was not normal for people of our means."

Another four years there and I am afraid this older children wouldn't have been happy without a millionaire father.

We are glad to get back to a normal home atmosphere for the sake of the children.

The children are Stephen, 10, Ellen, 8, Malinda, 7, and Martha, about 10 months old. She was born after her father won his Senatorial election campaign.

**New Backrest**

## Exercise Declared Necessary Part of Reducing Program

Washington, D. C.—Don't sneer at exercise as a means of reducing. Most authorities agree that a "what's the use" attitude about the beneficial effect of exercise in reducing is quite wrong.

"Exercise," says a committee of the American Medical association, "is one of the important factors contributing to total fitness."

Another authority, Dr. Ancel Keys of the University of Minnesota, says "Careful studies of the habitual diets of fat people show that in most cases the food intake is not really very large. The trouble is often mainly on the energy expenditure side, too little physical activity to burn up a normal or even a subnormal diet."

Dr. Keys also says "You will feel better, emotionally and physically if you get some exercise than if you try to do the whole reducing job by dietary reduction alone."

Obese university students studied by Dr. Keys were given a reducing diet of 1200 calories daily. Some of them were given a program of walking for two hours a day at 3½ miles per hour on a slight incline. The students who had no special exercise program lost an average of three pounds a week. Those who walked averaged a loss of five pounds a week and improved their fitness at the same time.
