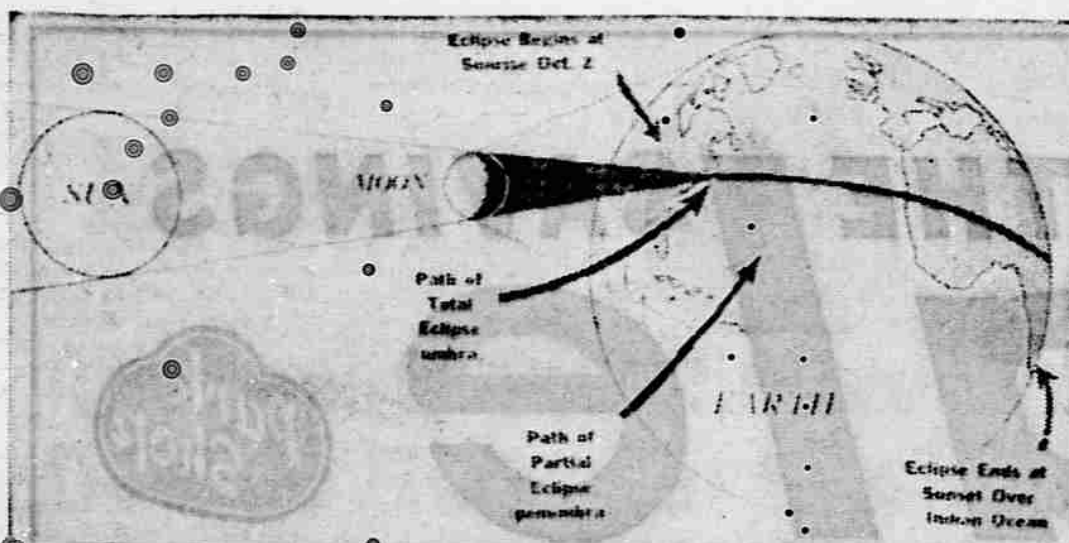

Scientists Take To Air in Study Of Sun Eclipse

Scientists flew above the clouds today to view a total eclipse of the sun obscured from most American ground watches by clouds.

Most important study of the phenomenon is believed to have been made from a camera-equipped Air Force jet fighter in the vicinity of the Canary Islands.

Clouds obscured the view for scientists of six nations who had gathered on the islands where the best available view of the eclipse had been expected.

Weather Disappoints

Observers in the New England states, where the eclipse was total over a narrow area at sunrise, also were disappointed by heavy clouds and the rain aftermath of hurricane Grace.

But the Air Force plane reported its cameras were in working order and its view clear as it raced the solar blackout — which lasted less than three minutes — across the sky.

Like Sparkling Jewel

Other photographers flew above the hazy clouds of Massachusetts to record the event.

"It looked like fire shooting out from behind a black mass — like a sparkling jewel," reported UPI New England newspaper manager David Wurzel after the flight.

Some U.S. observers saw a partial eclipse. At Portland, Maine, a hole opened in the clouds, giving early risers a look. At New York, clouds obscured the sun despite a generally clear sky as the eclipse began. They cleared to permit viewing of the later stages of the partial eclipse.
