## Brooklyn Local Revolt Fails To Materialize

New York—(UPI)—Material shortages that could lead to layoffs of factory and building workers spread today as result of a dock workers strike that has stopped cargo handling in ports from Maine to Texas.

The strike by 85,000 longshoremen on the Atlantic and Gulf coasts was consolidated today with the quelling of a back to work revolt by Brooklyn locals of the International Longshoremen's Union.

A cut in construction work in Florida was threatened by the tie-up of steel and cement. Manufacturing in New England began to feel the pinch of raw material shortages. Layoffs of industrial workers were anticipated if the strike continues.

The ILA and the New York Shipping Association, representing ports from Maine to Norfolk, Va., met separately to map strategy. No joint talks were in sight.

"We are ready to negotiate and I hope a settlement will be reached soon," William V. Bradley, international president of the ILA, said. "We can meet with an hour's notice."

The association scheduled an afternoon meeting of its Labor Policy Committee to review the situation. It had refused to continue negotiations, and charged the union broke a contract to extend the expiration date of their labor agreement.

Bradley had beaten down a move by Brooklyn dock leader Anthony (Tony) Anastasia to put the Brooklyn longshoremen back to work.

A few longshoremen reported for work at 8 p.m. but there was not enough manpower to form work gangs.

Anastasia, touring the piers at the morning shapeup, passed the word at 8:35 a.m. for the men to go home.

"This (the strike) is effective from Maine to Brownsville, Tex., including Brooklyn," Bradley said.

Anastasia had ordered his men, members of the only ILA local with a sizeable treasury, back to work in the face of a \$1 million damage suit threatened by the New York Shipping Association. The association claimed the ILA broke an agreement to extend its labor contract to Oct. 15.

## Drivers Escape Injury in Mishap

Two drivers escaped injury in a logging truck and pickup truck accident at the intersection of Highway 62 and Little Butte rd. yesterday, state police said. Extensive damage resulted to both vehicles.

A loaded logging truck driven by William Kenneth Stogdell, 27, of route 3, box 186B, Medford, attempted to pass a pickup truck driven by George Lang, 51, of Red Bluff mill when the accident occurred. The pickup truck attempted to make a left turn in front of the logging truck toward Eagle Point, police said. The impact forced both vehicles off the east side of the highway into a ditch where the logs spilled and the trailer turned upside down. The pickup truck landed on its wheels, officers said.

Police said Lang was cited for failure to signal and Stogdell for violation of basic rule. Lorena Agnes Klenner, 18, of 916 West Fourth st., Medford, and a Consolidated Freightways truck driven by James Wooton, 1309 Fortune dr., were involved in an accident yesterday morning, police said. Lorena Klenner was cited for making an improper turn.

The accident occurred at Coleman creek rd. and Highway 99 near Phoenix. Neither driver was injured, police said.

## Harney Jail Escapees Captured in Wyoming

Green River, Wyo.—(UPI)—Two of three men who escaped from the Harney county jail in Burns, Ore., Monday were in jail here today. Police identified them as Larry McMurphy, 20, and Clyde Patterson, 35. Still being sought is Alan J. Johnson, 18.

## British Election Campaign Explodes Into Name-Calling Free-For-All

London—(UPI)—Britain's very proper general election battle exploded into a name-calling free-for-all between the Conservatives and the Laborites today.

The angry exchange was ignited by a Labor promise to slash taxes if the party is returned to power in next Thursday's Parliamentary elections. It brought charges of "vote buying" from Conservatives.

In another development in the bitter campaign, Defense Minister Duncan Sandys hopped aboard the Khrushchev bandwagon and pledged the Conservative party to total disarmament. In a speech at Grimsby, Sandys said "Nothing short of total disarmament is good enough today."

Domestic Issues Important

But the main battle was over domestic issues. Labor Party secretary Morgan Phillips started things off by saying that if Labor wins it will scrap the unpopular sales tax on furniture, clothes and many household goods.

This followed a Laborite

pledge to boost old-age pensions by \$1.40 a week without any additional cost to the British taxpayer.

Conservative spokesmen shouted "foul ball" and charged Labor with "vote buying" of the worst sort.

Macmillan made a blistering speech at Nottingham Thursday night.

"Promises like this could never have been made by a party which had any serious hope of attaining office," he said. "Labor's turning the election into a mock auction." Macmillan Lashes Opponent

Macmillan also took a swipe at Labor party chairman Hugh Gaitskell, who would become prime minister if the Conservatives lose the election.

"By putting forward these specious plans, he is not only insulting the intelligence of the British public but fatally undermining his own ability to act responsibly should he find himself again in high office," Macmillan said.

The Conservatives remained slight favorites to recapture control of Parliament. But all signs pointed to a photo-fin

ish in which the Laborites might possibly squeak through.

Blast Damages Portland Plant

Portland—(UPI)—An explosion at Precision Test Parts Company here today injured one employee and caused about \$2,000 damage.

The injured person, Margie A. Benson, 33, Gresham, was taken to a Portland hospital and treated for right arm and body burns. She was released.

Firemen said the blast apparently was caused by alcohol exploding in wax during a dye-casting process. Windows were blown out, light fixtures destroyed and water damage was extensive. One wall also was damaged.

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## Clara Bow's Father Dies in Sanitarium

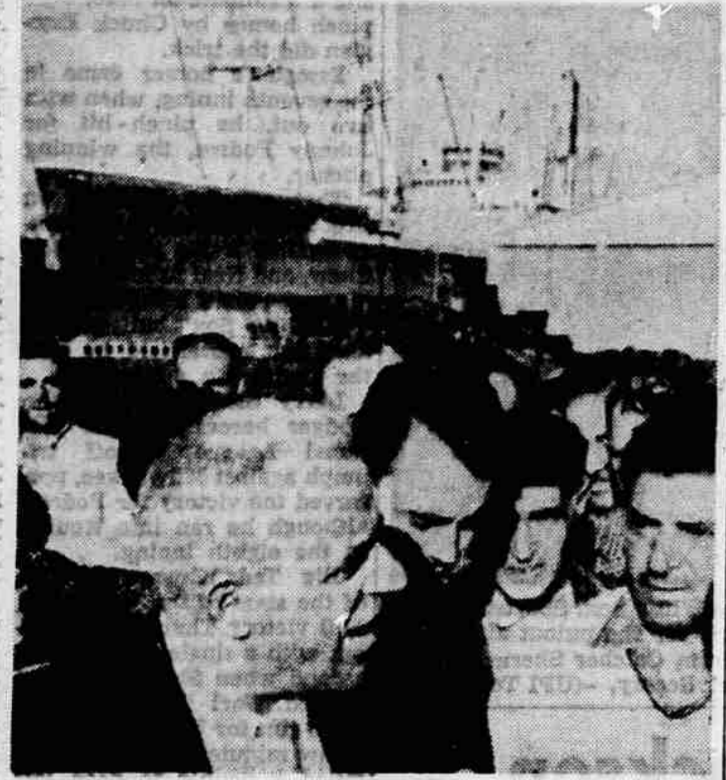

## Nike-Zeus Research Contract Awarded

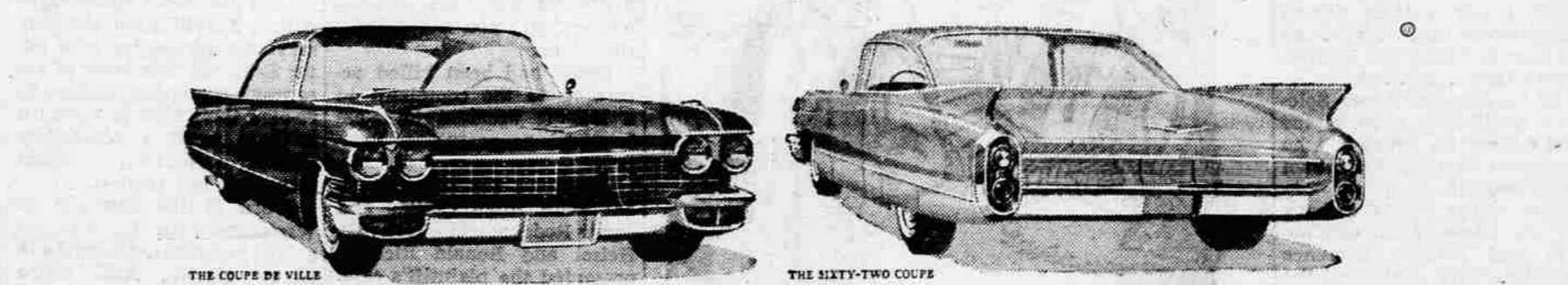
Washington—(UPI)—The Army has awarded a \$188,402,095 contract for continued research and development on the Nike-Zeus anti-missile missile. The contract, which went to Western Electric Co., brought the total invested in the missile and associated equipment to more than \$332 million.

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
