The Family Council

Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Barbara B. — Mother won't let us help her.
Mrs. L. B. — I want to be left alone.

Barbara B. — My sister and I are very much concerned about our mother who was widowed two years ago and can't seem to snap out of her grief.

The strange part of it is that when my father was alive they didn't get along well at all. My father gambled and made life miserable for all of us. Mother had to go to work and he didn't even appreciate what she did. Frankly, my sister and I couldn't feel any love for him and we haven't been able to mourn him.

Now our mother goes around crying half the time. She won't listen to reason, won't try to help herself. We would do anything, take her any place to help her get over this. She is making herself sick, but nothing we say or do helps.

Mrs. L. B. — All I ask is to be left alone. Why do people think they have to keep giving you pep talks about "you must go on living" when you just don't feel like living? I know well enough I have to go on, but I can't help feeling the way I do right now.

It's true my husband gave me a hard time, but in many ways he was a very good man. He was ashamed of himself about the gambling, but he just couldn't help it. He used to tell me to leave him so I could find a better man. I never wanted to because at that time I thought he needed me. Now I see I was the one who needed him.

The girls just can't understand what it's like.

The Council: We don't think anyone ought to try to talk another person out of grief. We can give mourners comfort, sympathy, the assurance of our company and our concern, but we have no right to dictate a formula for their mourning.

Grief is as personal as love or anger. We all react in different ways because multitudes of private associations go into the creation of the emotion.

The daughters in this case judge the situation from the outside, as seen through their biased eyes. Their parents fought, their father was at fault, they felt no love for him — therefore their mother should not mourn.

Yet the mother has realized how much she depended upon this man — with all his faults. Possibly she feels guilty at

having given him a hard time and for having at times wished she didn't have such a difficult husband. Undoubtedly, she also feels guilty that she wasn't able to communicate her loving feelings so her daughters could have learned to love their father.

In her own mind, Mrs. L.B. may also feel the need to do some of the mourning for her daughters who are not capable of grief. In a sense, perhaps she wants to give them a belated lesson in the meaning of love.

Accused Robber To Face Charges

Seattle — (UPI) — An order removing Charles H. Marvin, 33, from Seattle to Portland, to stand trial on bank robbery charges was signed here Friday.

U. S. District Judge John C. Bowen signed the papers which will send Marvin to Portland to face charges of robbing the Pittcock Branch of the Portland Trust Co. of \$2,600 Aug. 25.

Marvin was arrested here Aug. 30.

FBI Agent Urges Naming Juveniles

Bellingham, Wash. — (UPI) — FBI Agent Earl Milnes, Seattle, said here Friday that juveniles committing crimes should be identified.

Milnes said the younger generation increasingly is committing a larger percentage of crime.

"You don't hide sin in a closet, so therefore, you can't hide names of those committing crimes," he said.

He called for publicity identifying persons who commit crimes no matter what their ages.

Springfield Pair Injured in Crackup

Rickreall — (UPI) — Two Springfield youths were injured here Friday night when their car skidded 237 feet, crashing into Rickreall creek bridge. The car then rolled down a 20-foot bank and caught fire.

Police identified the injured as Darrell Alt Baysinger, 20, and Dean C. Headrick, 19. They escaped serious injury although Headrick was treated for possible arm and ankle fractures.

Both were thrown clear of the car before it caught fire. Officer Russell Carlisle said he had cited Baysinger just before the crash for going 100 miles per hour.

McMillan Scores High In Practical Pistol Firing

Lt. Jack McMillan of the Medford Police department took top honors last week in the practical pistol course and set a record for the course here.

His score of 99.2 topped the previous high score of 98.8 established by Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin in January, 1958.

Other high scores for the course held Tuesday and Wednesday were Partolman Duane Franklin, 96.8; Lt. Orlo McGee, 96.4; Patrolman Frank Elson, 96; Patrolman Berle E. Stephens, 95.6, all Medford Police department, and Deputy Glenn Wright, 95.2, Jackson County sheriff's department.

Participate in Event

More than 60 area law enforcement officers participated in the event. The course is part of the general firearms training program of the local police department. The department schedules six firearms practice sessions during the year for its officers, and twice during the year other law enforcement agencies are invited to participate.

Instructor for the recent session was Special Agent Leonard Kurtz with the federal bureau of investigation office in Portland.

A night session was also held at the range for officers of the Medford Police department who serve as instructors for the patrolmen, Champlin reported. This was the first session for night firing held here.

Participating in the course in addition to the Medford Police department and county sheriff's and sheriff's reserve were members of the Ashland and Central Point Police departments, Oregon state police, Camp White guards, and Crater Lake park rangers.

Training Program Offered by Army

A "choose it yourself" vocational training program is being offered regular army enlistees by the Army recruiting service, according to M/Sgt. Warren M. Long, local recruiter.

More than 50 career groups are being offered, he said, to help those entering the service to satisfy their own desires and aptitudes.

SOC Leads Growth In State Enrollments

Eugene — (UPI) — The state board of higher education said Friday that more than 22,000 students are expected to be enrolled at state-supported institutions of higher learning when registration books close.

Incomplete figures from all state-supported schools indicate an increase of more than 3 per cent over last year, the board said.

R. L. Collins, budget director of the state system of higher education, said all institutions but Oregon State showed decided advances in enrollment over last year in figures as of Sept. 30. The only exception to this was the dental school where enrollment is limited. It had 335 students this year, same number as last year.

Oregon State had a drop of 3.4 per cent from last year with 7,484 students as of Sept. 30 compared to 7,749 on the same date in 1958.

SOC Up Most

Southern Oregon had the biggest increase, 11.9 per cent with a boost in freshmen of 27.2 per cent. The Ashland school had 1,203 students Sept. 30 compared to 1,083 on the same date last year.

Oregon had an increase of 9 per cent with 15 per cent more freshmen than last year. The enrollment here as of Sept. 30 was 6,566 compared to 6,029 last year on the same date.

Other schools, with 1959 figures first and 1958 figures second, included:

Oregon College of Education: 960-950.
Eastern Oregon: 733-700.
Portland State: 3,818-3,590.

Medical school: 637-805 (including nurses).

The board said the predicted additional enrollment included Oregon 170, Oregon State 230, OCE 20, SOC 70, EOC 60, and Portland State 130. This would bring the total to 22,416, an increase of 702 over last year.

Monkey Bite Sidelines Boy
