Oregon's Nurses To Request Laws To Back Demands

Portland — (UP) — Collective bargaining for nurses in Oregon will be an object of legislation sought in the 1961 Legislature, according to a spokesman for the Oregon Nurses association.

Miss Shirley Thompson, chairman of the association's resolutions committee, said Saturday the action was taken during the association's 55th annual convention in Bend.

She said negotiations between the Oregon Association of Hospitals and the nurses broke down Sept. 11. The nurses are requesting a salary boost to \$325 per month. Present salary is \$300. She said the association also seeks recognition as bargaining agent for the nurses and establishment of grievance committees in individual hospitals.

The convention ended with installation of Mrs. Johnnie Schick, Eugene, as new president. Other officers included Mrs. Martha Wooley, Grants Pass, first vice president; Barbara Brown, Portland, second vice president and Evelyn Shattuck of Portland, treasurer.

Eugene Man Dies On Fishing Trip

Florence, Ore. (UP) — Henry Albert Barkley, 54, Eugene painting contractor, died Saturday while fishing on the Siuslaw river near here.

Lane County Coroner Fred Buell said Barkley apparently suffered a heart attack.

What Is The Law?

This column is prepared as a public service by the College of Law, Willamette University, Salem, to explain basic legal principles, not to provide legal advice. The reader is cautioned not to apply these cases to his own problems without an attorney's advice, for differing facts may change the outcome.

What Constitutes Conspiracy?

Sam and Joe met in a tavern one Saturday night. After several drinks they agreed that they would rob the local bank a week later. They shook on it and each went to his own home. At home Sam looked at his innocent, sleeping children and decided that he wanted to have nothing to do with the robbery. He decided right then and there to tell Joe to count him out, that he would go through with it. The next day Sam tried to telephone Joe to let him know about his decision to pull out. No one answered.

Bank Interior Sketched

The following day, Monday, Joe bought two Halloween masks and two revolvers to use in the robbery and made a sketch of the interior of the bank. Sam kept trying to let Joe know he was pulling out, but he could not reach him. Finally, on Friday, Sam went to Joe's house and told Joe to his face that he was withdrawing, that he would not go through with the robbery.

The next day Joe went to the bank but couldn't get up enough courage to pull off the robbery. He dropped the paper sack he was carrying and the revolver he was carrying in it bounced on the floor. He was promptly arrested and then told the police the entire story. Sam maintained that he was guilty of no crime, for the reason that he had done no criminal act. "You can't send a man to prison for what he thinks," said Sam.

Was Sam correct? No, Sam was wrong. Conspiracy was involved. Conspiracy is an agreement between two or more persons to do or achieve an unlawful act or object. According to common law the agreement was all that was required to establish guilt.

Withdrawal Too Late

The federal statute and some state conspiracy statutes require that there can be no conviction for conspiracy without proof that some one of the conspirators has done an overt act to further the conspiracy. Joe's purchase of the revolvers and mask, and his drawing of the sketch of the interior of the bank was enough. Sam would not have been guilty if he had communicated his withdrawal to Joe before Joe had done any overt act to further the conspiracy. But Joe had already bought a revolver, mask and made a sketch. Conspiracy laws are intended to strike at organized crime, at criminal gangs and groups.

Boeing 707 Jet Escapes Disaster

New York — (UP) — A Qantas Airways Boeing 707 jet with 56 persons aboard dumped 40,000 pounds of fuel and made an emergency landing at Idlewild airport Saturday because of landing gear trouble.

The plane made a smooth landing and the airlines reported no one was injured. The jet had taken off 93 minutes earlier for a flight to Sydney, Australia, via San Francisco. But the landing gear would not retract automatically, and the crew could not retract it manually.

Pilot John Shields, of San Francisco, said 40,000 pounds of fuel was dumped over the Atlantic from the right wing tanks. The left wing tanks, 40,000 pounds of fuel could not be released because of a malfunction, he said.

Court in Tunisia Condemns Fifteen

Tunis, Tunisia (UP) — Tunisia's supreme court has sentenced 15 persons to die and 100 others to prison terms ranging from five years to life for their part in an alleged plot to assassinate President Habib Bourguiba.

The prosecution had charged that several murders were committed in connection with the plot before it was uncovered. The court studied the case several weeks before handing down the sentences.

Among those facing execution was Wae Salah Nadjar, described as head of the plot and the "right arm" of anti-government leader Salah Ben Youssef who fled to Cairo some time ago.

Five defendants were acquitted.

Board Approves Fence -- No Funds

Salem — (UP) — The state emergency board has partially reversed itself to allow the intermediate correctional institution here to use surplus fencing from Portland's Centennial Exposition grounds to build a second fence around the institution.

However, no money was provided. Earlier in the day a board of control request for \$21,000 to install the 8-foot fence failed by a 4-4 tie vote. The last vote was 6-2 in favor of the fence.

Institution officials said the available fence would not completely surround the one now up, but would be used in critical areas. They said every effort would be made to find money to install the fence within the institution's budget and using inmate labor.

Ex-Mental Patient Shot at Stayton

Salem (UP) — A man, believed to be a former mental patient, today was in a Salem hospital suffering from gun-shot wounds received in a gun battle with Stayton Police Chief Everett Norfleet Sunday.

Norfleet said the man had been identified as Frank Skott. He refused to give officers his home address. However, Norfleet said papers found on the man indicated he had been an inmate of a Springfield, Iowa, mental hospital.

Skott reportedly disarmed Sgt. Ronald Frey Sunday afternoon, and then fired Frey's .38 caliber service revolver

four times when Chief Norfleet came to his aid.

Norfleet said he "tried to get him to put the gun down, but he fired and ran." The chief followed and after firing a shot over Skott's head in a futile effort to stop him, Norfleet hit him in the right hip with a second rifle shot. The bullet passed through Skott's left leg.

Firefly Rocket Apparent Failure

Elgin AFB, Fla. (UP) — The ninth in the Air Force's Firefly rocket series was fired at dawn today but apparently failed to explode a cloud of sodium as planned.

Ground observers could not see an explosion as the Nike-Cajon rocket disappeared high in the air.

Object of the Firefly series rockets is to create a colored cloud high in the air for scientists to analyze.

Muscovite Jews Observe Holiday

Moscow (UP) — More than five thousand Muscovites flocked to the Soviet capital's one big synagogue Saturday overflowing the interior and standing in crowds outside to celebrate the Jewish New Year.

While the anti-religious Soviet press and radio ignored the holiday, a similar overflow turnout occurred at two small wooden buildings which serve as synagogues in Moscow suburbs, and at Jewish places of worship throughout the Soviet Union.

This country's more than two million Jews are marking the Rosh Hoshanah holiday in virtually the same manner as their counterparts throughout the world, with attendance at synagogues and family gatherings.

PP&L Rate Hike Hearing Recessed

Salem — (UP) — Explanation of Pacific Power & Light company's power supply and contracts by E. Robert de Lucia, vice president and chief engineer, was halted before the public utility commission Friday and a recess was taken until Wednesday.

The hearing is on the company's application for electric rate increases pending before the commission.

Company witnesses were cross-examined last week. Other witnesses to be quizzed include Albert Bauer, assistant chief engineer; K. M. Montgomery, rate engineer, and Charles Bartlett, of the consulting engineering firm of Ford, Bacon & Davis.

The company seeks a 14.5 per cent increase in Oregon.
