Los Angeles—UPI—The Los Angeles Dodgers, leading two games to one, figured they faced their biggest obstacle today—Early Wynn—in their hope of winning the World Series in five games.

Now 17-10 favorites to win the series, the Dodger players believed if they could beat Wynn they would wrap the series up on Tuesday. But they agreed that beating Wynn, who shut them out, 11-0, in the first game, was a big job.

"But we're rolling now," said Manager Walter Alston, after admitting the Dodgers were lucky to win Sunday's second game, 3-1, before the largest World Series crowd ever—92,294 fans who jammed Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

He named Roger Craig, who took that first game trouncing to oppose the White Sox ace who won 22 games and lost 10 during the regular season. Craig was a tower of strength for the Dodgers, after being recalled from Seattle, winning 11 games while losing five.

Today's game was a 11-10 pick 'em affair with another record-breaking throng anticipated.

Lack Key Hits In naming Wynn, Manager Al Lopez of the White Sox bemoaned the lack of key hits in Sunday's game.

"I can't recall when we ever got to a pitcher for 11 hits and five walks in six innings like we did to Don Drysdale and not score," he declared. "That's the way it goes sometimes—you outpitch 'em. That's the way it was."

Alston, who has been confident all along, would not go beyond his pitching plans after naming Craig to face Wynn again. Neither would Lopez disclose whom he had in mind for Tuesday's fifth game.

Alston did say that his relief ace, Larry Sherry, a hero in the Dodgers' pennant playoff victory and in Sunday's game, would be back in the bullpen.

The game was scoreless going into the bottom of the seventh inning, although the White Sox had runners on base in every inning.

Allowed One Hit Big Dick Donovan had allowed only one hit—a harmless second inning single by Gil Hodges—and hadn't walked a man going into the seventh. He got the first man in that inning and then came apart at the seams.

Charlie Neal, who with Furillo was one of the pennant playoff hitting stars for the Dodgers, began it with a single off that left field screen which the White Sox had been battering. On a hit-and-run play, Wally Moon grounded out, Neal going to second. It probably would have been

Bill Casper Champ In Centennial Golf

Portland, Ore.—UPI—Billy Casper Jr. came back to the scene of his first money-winning effort as a professional golfer—a tiny \$33—and walked off Sunday with a check for \$2,800.

He shot four great rounds of sub-par golf in the \$20,000 Portland Centennial Open tournament to finish three strokes ahead of the field and win his first event since the U.S. Open at Mamaroneck, N.Y., last June.

It was a demonstration of master putting by the 28-year-old pro from Apple Valley, Calif. He three-putted only one green in 72 holes and

Alston sent up Carl Furillo, who won the second and final playoff game for the Dodgers, to hit for Don Demeter who had been playing center field.

Ball Takes Hop Furillo looked at Staley's first pitch, a strike, and then rifled a Staley sinker just to the left of second base, Luis Aparicio cut over for it, but it took a bad hop and went over his glove and on into center field as Neal and Larker scored.

Staley closed the door then, but it was too late. Chicago came back in the eighth and finally routed Drysdale when Ted Kluszewski singled and Sherm Lollar got a gift single as right fielder Moon lost his fly ball in the sun.

That's where Sherry went in to pitch. He hit Billy Goodman on the right leg with a pitch to fill the bases and it looked as if the White Sox finally were rolling.

Sherry had different ideas, though. He got Al Smith to ground into a double play, Kluszewski scoring, and retired Jim Rivera on a pop.

The Dodgers made it 3-1 in the eighth when Maury Willis singled and scored on Neal's double.

Old Guard Player Hits Key Single

EDITOR'S NOTE: Carl Furillo, one of the Dodgers' old guard, delivered the pinch two-run single that helped beat the White Sox, 3-1, Sunday and gave them a two game to one lead in the World Series. He gives his impressions in the following dispatch.

Los Angeles—UPI—I didn't stop, look or listen—I just hit the ball and took off.

On my way down the line, though, I did get a peek at the ball and I felt it would get through the infield for a base hit.

I was surprised when Walt Alston picked me to pinch hit for Don Demeter with the bases full and two out in the seventh inning. I thought he was going to go with Duke Snider and then send Duke out to play center field.

Took Strike Purposely Gerry Staley had just relieved Dick Donovan and the skipper told me "this guy isn't throwing as hard (as Donovan). Just go up there and meet the ball."

I took the first strike purposely and then hit a sinker. That's all there was to it.

Actually, though, that ball I hit in the 12th inning against the Braves last week gave me a bigger kick. That won the pennant for us, this one just put us ahead in the series. Not that I'm kidding, though. I liked this one a lot, too.

Been Peculiar Year I'd honestly have to say this one today was the biggest hit I ever got in a World Series. At least it ties the homer I hit against the Yankees in the 1955 series, I think it was.

This has been a real peculiar year for me. I've had bruised ribs, torn muscles and what not. Right now, I even have my left leg taped up.

But you know something, after that base hit Sunday, it doesn't hurt so much any more.

Bearcats Edge Past Badgers

Willamette University's Bearcats got a scare Saturday as they opened defense of their Northwest conference football crown, but managed to hold on to a slim 14-12 win over Pacific university.

The stubborn Badgers spotted the host Willamette a 14-0 halftime lead and then came roaring back to score in both the third and fourth periods to pull within two points of the Bearcats.

Two more Pacific drives in the final minutes were stopped short and a desperation field goal attempt from the Willamette 39 fell short for Paul Stagg's Badgers.

In a high-scoring affair, quarterback Charley Alvaro sparked a come-from-behind College of Idaho attack to down Lewis and Clark in Portland, 32-31.

Alvaro scored two touchdowns, passed for another and kicked two conversions. He talked 202 yards passing and chalked up another 65 yards in 10 carries on the ground.

Forty Niner Gridsters Drub Rams

San Francisco—UPI—The next time Coach Red Hickey of the San Francisco Forty Niners makes a prediction—it's a sure bet people are going to listen.

Hickey became a happy football prophet Sunday and the Forty Niners became one of the National Football league's two unbeaten elevens by blasting the favored Los Angeles Rams, 34-0.

The game marked the first time in 115 games that the stunned Rams had been held scoreless, their last shutout coming in 1949.

More than 56,000 fans at Kezar stadium cheered the Forty Niners to a top-heavy 24-0 halftime lead as they capitalized on two Ram fumbles to lead to scores.

Red Saw It Coming Coach Red Hickey called the shot all the way. After last week's opening game win over Philadelphia, Hickey predicted "we'll beat the Rams... We'll rip 'em up. Print it so they can put it on their bulletin board."

And rip 'em up they did, out-gaining them 235 to 87, in rushing and chalking up 19 first downs to 12 for Los Angeles.

The San Franciscans battle Green Bay's surprising Packers next Sunday for the NFL Western Division lead. Both are undefeated with 2-0 marks. Los Angeles, now 0-2, travels to Chicago for a tiff with the tough Chicago Bears.

Quarterback Y. A. Tittle, J. D. Smith and Joe Perry led the Forty Niner offense Sunday, with outstanding defensive work coming from tackle Leo Nomellini and safety men Dave Baker and Abe Woodson.

OSC Gridders Tighten Belts

Corvallis—UPI—Oregon State College's win-starved Beavers today tightened their belts and looked hungrily for a win next weekend against Michigan, their third consecutive intersectional foe.

The Beavers dropped their third game of the season Saturday to the Nebraska Cornhuskers, 7-6, on a one-point conversion off the toe of Nebraska sophomore Ron Meade.

"We play to win, not to tie, and unfortunately we didn't quite make it," Prothro explained in disappointment after the game.

"Playing for a tie isn't in keeping with what any football coach teaches," the Beaver mentor added.

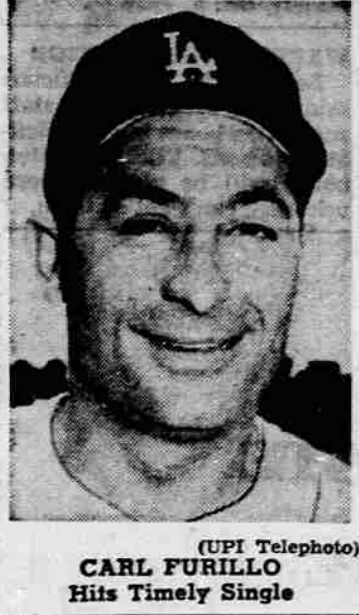

Alston Says Los Angeles Lucky Club

Los Angeles—UPI—"We were lucky to win."

That was Manager Walter Alston's admission after Sunday's 3-1 win over the Chicago White Sox in the third game of the World Series but he and his players appeared to be quietly confident that they can continue to be "lucky."

Even with a 2-1 lead in the series, the Dodgers took it slow and easy in their dressing room. There was little horse-play and little shouting.

"That's the way it's been all year with us," explained first baseman Gil Hodges. "We've never whooped it up too much. You might hear a lot more yelling, though, after we win the series."

No one would make any predictions about the number of games the series might go.

"Nope," said Alston, "I'm not going to make any predictions on how many games it will take us to win. A lot of things can happen yet."

"Yes, we were lucky to win this one," he added. "What else can you say when they get 12 hits and so many walks and we get only five hits?"

In the White Sox dressing room, Manager Al Lopez tried to take the loss in stride, saying, "the Dodgers hit when it counted and we didn't."

Pro Football Has Great Upset Wave

Talk about 12-horse parleys: Who would have picked the San Francisco Forty-Niners and the Green Bay Packers to wind up as the only unbeaten teams in the National Football league after the first two weeks of head-knocking?

However, that was the situation today after one of the greatest waves of upsets in the 40-year history of the NFL.

It all started Saturday night when the Chicago Bears (6 1/2-point underdogs) rolled to a 26-21 victory over the Baltimore Colts, defending world champions.

Hours for Bird Hunts Clarified

Portland—Upland game bird and waterfowl hunters are reminded by the game commission that the shooting time for both upland birds and waterfowl is the same throughout the seasons.

The game commission has been plagued with calls on conflicting rumors of various shooting time for taking upland birds and waterfowl. These rumors are being circulated on a hearsay basis, mostly of the "Joe told me" kind.

All bird gunners are urged to consult their upland game and waterfowl regulations for the rules governing the shooting time. A synopsis of these rules is available at all license agencies.

In brief, the shooting time throughout the season for both upland game birds and waterfowl is from sunrise to sunset. Exceptions to this rule are on the opening date of waterfowl season Oct. 7, which will begin at noon, and the Oct. 10 opening on upland game birds when shooting time is set at 9 a.m. This 9 a.m. ruling applies to waterfowl hunters on that date as well as upland bird gunners.

In the upland bird and waterfowl synopsis, hunters will find a complete shooting time table that begins on Oct. 7 and extends through the seasons. For the convenience of the hunters, the first shooting time has been rounded out to the nearest five minutes.

Grouse and mountain quail hunters who hunt during the limited season on the west side of the Cascades, Oct. 3 through 11, may begin shooting one-half hour before sunrise each day until Oct. 8. On Oct. 8, 9, 10, and 11, the shooting time will correspond with the regular upland game bird and waterfowl season.

Deer Hunting In This Area Proves Spotty

Deer hunting was excellent in eastern Oregon but spotty in Jackson county over the opening week end of the general buck season, a quick survey of sporting goods firms and deer processing establishments indicated this morning.

Despite the spotty nature of the hunting, there were still a good number of kills reported in this area. Good luck was reported in the Butte Falls district. Some nimrods did well in the Green Springs but others had no luck at all. Some parts of the Applegate region produced deer.

Those who had poor hunting in this area generally blamed the dry condition of the woods, saying they were satisfied that there were deer but that they were not concentrated.

Deer taken were about average in size, it was said.

LAKE TREATMENT SET

Portland—Chickahaminy reservoir, located about 80 miles west of Burns, is scheduled for rotenone treatment this fall to remove heavy populations of roach and shiners, according to the game commission. Bob Borovick, head of lake rehabilitation for the commission, said that treatment would take place as late as possible, probably in November, to allow anglers to take as many trout as possible from the impoundment.

Weight Lifting Yank Runner-Up

Warsaw—UPI—James Bradford, Washington, D. C., had nothing to be ashamed of today for his performance in the world weight lifting championships.

The American muscleman finished second Sunday to Russian Jurij Vlasov in the heavyweight division, hoisting a total of 1,093 1/2 pounds. Just 16 1/2 less than his rival.

Vlasov gained his margin of victory when he jerked 423 1/2 pounds compared to Bradford's 390 1/2 as the 1959 championships drew to a close.

David Ashman, Santa Monica, Calif., wound up sixth in the same division with a total lift of 957 pounds.
