

Nurses Seek Legislation On Collective Bargaining

Registered nurses from the Rogue valley who attended the annual meeting of Oregon Nurses' association in Bend last week returned home to report that the most important work of the session was a resolution designed to promote the economic security of the nursing profession.

The resolution pointed out that since there are no effective federal or Oregon laws which require employers of nurses to recognize bona fide representatives of professional nurses for the purpose of negotiating improved employment practices and standards, the nurses will propose such laws at the next session of the legislature.

The legislation will "be designed to facilitate collective bargaining for nurses" the resolution states. The nurses suggested two clauses for the laws. One would require that, in the case of an impasse in negotiations between employers of nurses and the legal representative of nurses, that the governor of the state appoint a fact-finding board to conduct an investigation, and the other to require that such findings of fact be published to the general public.

Coconut chocolate refrigerator dessert is easy to make and serve. Use 1/4 cup butter, 1/2 cup sugar, a dash of salt, 1 egg yolk, 1/2 cup drained pineapple, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, 1 egg white, stiffly beaten, 28 (one 8-ounce box) thin, chocolate cookies, 2 inches in diameter; 1 cup whipping cream, 1 can (about 1 1/3 cups) of flake coconut.

Cream butter. Add sugar and salt gradually and cream until light and fluffy. Add egg yolk and mix well. Then add pineapple and nuts. Fold in beaten egg white. Spread mixture on cookies, putting together in stacks of four or five. Lay stacks on edge on a flat, rectangular plate to make one long roll. Press ends together gently to make roll firm. Whip cream. Frost outside of roll. Sprinkle coconut over top, sides, and ends of roll. Chill about 3 hours. To serve, cut roll diagonally, at a 45 degree angle, into slices. Makes 8 servings.

Variation: Substitute 24 to 30 large vanilla cookies for the chocolate cookies. Then spread mixture between cookies, stacking 3 to a serving. Chill several hours in refrigerator. About an hour before serving, whip cream and frost top and sides of each stack; sprinkle with coconut. Chill again. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

Teen-Agers Said the Same Regardless of Nationality

Frankfurt, Germany - (UPI) - The children of post-Hitler Germany have their own "New Order" - jive, rock 'n' roll and pony tails.

West Germany's six million teen-agers don't know too much about Hitler and, surveys have shown, aren't particularly interested in him or what he did to their country.

The goose step has given way to jazz. Hitler youth clubs have been replaced by James Dean fan clubs. West German teens still think there's something about a soldier, but not Erwin Rommel or Gerd Von Rundstedt. Their soldier boy is Elvis Presley.

Hitler frowned on cosmetics, but modern German teen-age girls display painted, pouting lips and sport Brigitte Bardot hair styles. Their boy friends model themselves in the adolescent beatnik manner first popularized by the late James Dean.

Teen-agers in West Germany spend nearly \$2.4 billion a year, a fourth of it on clothes, candy and drink - both beer and pop.

The era of the teen-ager is as marked in West Germany as in the United States, England, Japan and France. Two million-or one out of every three - West German teen-agers own a motorcycle. Every 14th drives his or her own automobile.

Records Popular

Record industry officials report 60 per cent of their annual production of 56 million disks is bought by teen-agers.

An art-conscious West Berlin film executive complained recently, "If I produce a film that doesn't fit in with the teen-age outlook, it's a loss three times out of four."

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
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
