### Wall Washing Hints Given by Painters

Chicago - (UPI) - A bride complained that it is more expensive to paint a wall than wash it, but at least the results can be predicted from painting.

For just such persons, an association of paint manufacturers offers the following tips to make the washing chore easier and the results more certain.

Read and follow instructions on a package of paint cleaner. Some synthetic detergents can remove the paint if used in too strong solutions.

Use warm, not hot, water. Begin cleaning at the bottom of the wall and work up, using a sponge or cloth.

Rinse with clean water, if the instructions indicate this is necessary.

Use two pails of water, one for the cleaning solution and the other to rinse the dirty sponge or cloth.

When the window sills are clean and dry, wax them for an easy-to-care-for surface.

### Aerated Cream Standards Asked

Washington, D.C. - Standards for two aerated dairy products - a "whipped cream" and a "whipped table cream" - have been proposed by industry and published by the Food and Drug administration.

These toppings for desserts are packed under pressure of harmless gas and are fluffed and aerated as they are dispensed from the can, FDA explained. Standards are needed, because there are many variations in the composition and label names of market products sold for the same general purpose, the agency said.

"Whipped cream" under today's proposals, would have to contain at least 30 per cent of milk fat, by weight. This is the minimum requirement in the existing standard for "whipped cream." Not more than one-half of one per cent of the contents of a can would consist of one or more of the following emulsifying ingredients added to aid the whipping process: Extract of Irish moss, locust bean gum, karaya gum, alginate (sodium alginate), gelatin, monoglycerides or diglycerides (or both) of fat-forming fatty acids except lauric acid.

"Whipped table cream" would have to contain at least 18 per cent of milk fat and not more than six-tenths of one per cent of the emulsifying ingredients. The existing standard for "table cream" requires a minimum of 18 per cent milk fat.

Nitrous oxide or a mixture of nitrous oxide and carbon dioxide would be permitted or optional ingredients in both products as whipping and propelling agents, according to the proposals.

Under industry proposals for both products, if sweetener or flavors are used the labels would so indicate.
