

## Humphrey Sees Need To Design Nation's Destiny

Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) said here Tuesday night that America's challenge to greatness is in "daring to design our own destiny."

Speaking before the East Multnomah County Democratic Forum at Parkrose high school, Humphrey said, "we cannot fly to the moon while our political feet are stuck in the mud." He charged that the Eisenhower administration "reacts" instead of "designs."

"Whether it is on the domestic or international front, we counter attack — we react — rather than design a program that we know to be right and sound, and worthy of our efforts, our tradition and our sacrifice."

He added, "In the second half of this interdependent and explosive century, to continue planless may be to end lifeless."

**Five-Day Oregon Tour**  
The Democratic presidential hopeful, making a five day tour of Oregon, said he was letting our national plant run down.

Said Humphrey, "we need a program that starts with the integration of our schools, and ends with peaceful cooperation of the world."

He declared that the Democratic Party's liberal philosophy best exemplified "an understanding of our interdependence, and of the intermingling of our various policies."

## Steel Strike Cuts Into Production Of Autos; Makers Worry Over Sales

Detroit — (UPI) — The nationwide steel strike cut deeper into the outer layers of the auto industry's production today but the industry was more alarmed over what it was doing to its sales.

General Motors Corp., first of the automakers to feel the pinch of shortages caused by the nationwide walkout, sent 750 workers home at its Tensstedt hardware plant in Flint, Mich., and said 4,400 would ultimately be idled at the plant if the steel walkout continued.

The layoffs at the plant brought to 8,250 the number of workers GM has laid off because of steel shortages in plants which supply parts and accessories to its final assembly lines.

**Chrysler Resumes**  
Chrysler Corp., which returned to full production today after a strike in its key stamping plant at Twinsburg, Ohio, which cost it some production for about a week, expected to be able to continue final assembly of cars until about Nov. 1 before steel shortages forced another shutdown.

Ford Motor Co., which produces about half of its own

steel but not all of the types needed for full production, said last week it expected to be able to continue assembly of cars for at least 45 days without outside steel supplies.

American Motors and Studebaker-Packard both expected to be able to continue producing new cars until December with current steel supplies.

But the steel walkout apparently was hurting the sales of all the auto makers.

**Second Worst September**  
Ward's Automotive Reports, statistical agency for the industry, reported the auto makers recorded their second worst September sales since World War II last month and blamed it largely upon the steel walkout.

Ward's said September sales, averaging 13,958 a day, were 25.3 per cent under August, a decline which it called "more than seasonal." It was the worst September sales record since 1951 except for last year when the recession cut the daily average to only 10,240 car sales.

The drop in sales came just as the auto companies were filling dealer showrooms with the 1960 models they hoped would lead the industry to a sales year second only to the splurge of 1955.

### Washington Deer Hunting Seen Good

Olympia — (UPI) — Excellent hunting for 455,000 Washington nimrods with the second highest deer kill in the state's history was predicted Tuesday by John A. Biggs, state game director.

He forecast that hunters would harvest 17 million pounds of meat this year and give businessmen \$45,500,000 in business for such items as travel, clothing, food and beverages.

The predicted deer kill of 80,000 for the season opening Sunday would be exceeded only by the all-time high of 90,000 in 1955.

### KHRUSH MOSCOW-BOUND

London — (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev left Vladivostok by plane today, Radio Moscow reported. He stopped off in Vladivostok Sunday after attending the 10th anniversary celebrations of the founding of the Communist Chinese regime in Peiping.

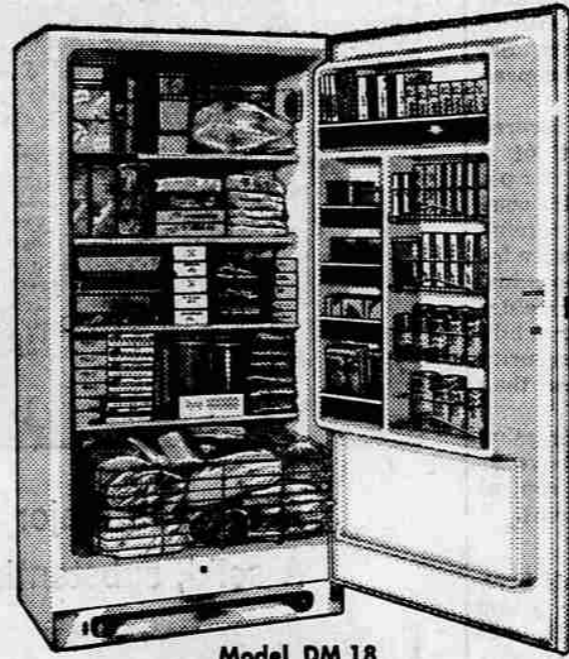
