Podres, Wynn Carry Pitching Hopes in Sixth Series Tussle

New York —UPI— Broadway oddsmakers continued to list the Dodgers as 13-5 favorites today to win the World Series. The White Sox remained slight 11-10 favorites for today's sixth game.

Chicago —UPI— Early Wynn, a righthander with a sore elbow, and Johnny Podres, a left hander with an ailing back, were to carry the pitching hopes of the Chicago White Sox and the Los Angeles Dodgers into the sixth game of the World Series today.

Although he has had only two days rest, Wynn was called upon by Manager Al Lopez of the White Sox to keep their series hopes alive. They faced sudden death, trailing the Dodgers three games to two in this best four out of seven game series.

Manager Walt Alton went along with Podres, the winner of the second game, confident that he would close it out and bring to the West Coast its first world's baseball championship.

"He tells me his back feels okay," Alton said, "so there isn't any reason why he shouldn't beat them again." Wynn's Elbow Okay
Wynn said his sore right elbow was "okay" and that he was "honored" by being selected to keep the White Sox in the running. The 39-year-old star, who won 22 games

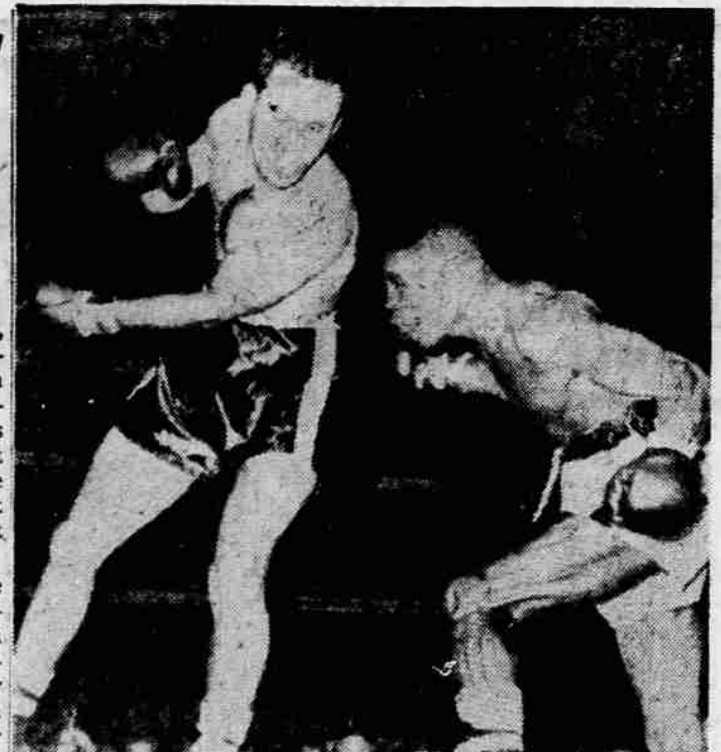
during the regular season, won the first game, 11-0, leaving in the eighth inning when his elbow stiffened. He started the fourth game in Los Angeles and was knocked out in the fourth inning when the Dodgers scored four runs, set up for the most part by inept White Sox fielding.

"There's no reason to save myself, now," Wynn observed. "We have got to win today or there isn't any tomorrow, so it doesn't matter how much rest I've had. I'm honored that the skipper picked me because both Billy Pierce and Dick Donovan are ready to go, too."

With a southpaw going against them, Lopez said he would stick to the lineup which won the fifth game in Los Angeles Tuesday, 1-0. That means Bubba Phillips will play third base with Jim McAnany in left field. Sherman Lollar will be in the cleanup spot in the batting order.

Makes Lineup Change
Alton made one lineup change, putting Duke Snider, who had been out with his chronic ailing knee, in center field. That gives him six left-handed hitters, counting Podres, in his batting order. The Sox, who again will wear the black stockings they wore in the fifth game, were glad to get back to brick-walled Comiskey Park.

"It feels good to be back in a real ball park," said Nellie Fox. "That Coliseum park is for the birds—not baseball." Lopez said he was happy to be back home, too.

Phoenix — Phoenix high is priming this week for the eighth renewal of its annual clash in football with Ashland.

The game will be at 8 p.m. Friday at Ashland. Pirate fans are hoping that the Phoenix team will be "up" for the game. They're certain that the Grizzlies will be Phoenix last year upset Ashland 19 to 13 for the first Pirate triumph in seven seasons of rivalry with the Lithia city.

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Black Tornado Adds To Attack For Crater Tussle On Friday

Gridiron fans may see some "new stuff" in the offensive repertoire of the Medford high Black Tornado when it takes on the Crater Comets here Friday night in the opening Southern Oregon conference football tangle for both schools.

"We've made some additions to the offense. We've added a new formation," head coach Fred Spiegelberg reported in discussing Black Tornado preparations for the 8 p.m. conflict with the Central Point school. Spiegelberg, naturally, declined to elaborate.

Unit and team drills were the main order in yesterday's session on the Medford practice turf. The Tornado gridironers went through about 45 minutes of defensive scrimmage then thumny scrimmaged on offense for about the same period.

Sickness and injury have made inroads this week on one of Medford's big assets, its depth. And, Spiegelberg has indicated that the Tornado may not platoon on offense in the usual fashion or scale with Go and Shock teams against the Comets.

Center Chuck Holt is out of action and end Lowell Dean and guard Reggie Breeze may miss the game. Holt sustained a knee injury against South Salem last Friday and Dean a broken nose. Breeze has missed workouts because of flu. Play by halfback Len Griggs is still uncertain because of shoulder trouble.

Guard John Pierce, second unit defensive man, has been sidelined by a leg bruise. Back with the squad yesterday were guard Keith Berg and halfback Jim Barry, who've had the flu, and guard Bill Hobbs, whose knee was hurt last Friday.

Hood, right halfback, and Dan Sieg, fullback, on defense the others could be Jensen, end; John James and Lynn Knight, tackles; Anderson, Terry Earl, Skip Bennett and Cal Dean, linebackers, and Ragsdale and Ken Durkee, halfbacks and safeties.

Crater, which is paper thin so far as reserves go, has its physical problems, too. End Harold Twidell missed practice Monday and Tuesday and tackle Bryson LaCasse missed Tuesday and Wednesday because of flu. Fullback Don Gillaspie has had a deep arm bruise.

Possible starters on offense for Crater are Tom White and Earl Cooper, ends; Al Minnick and Glen Cote, tackles; John Anhorn and Larry Reyerson, guard; Rick Burns, center; Gary Johnson, quarter; Jim Eldred, left half; Loyal Higinbotham, right half; and Gillaspie, full. White and Derrell Williams may be ends on defense with Minnick and Cote, tackles; Reyers and Anhorn or Ken Wald, guards; Higinbotham and Twidell or John Champ, linebackers; Gillaspie and Johnson or Dean Lamp, halfbacks, and Eldred or Wayne Martin, safety.

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Rain Needed For Hunting

Portland —UPI— The weekly hunting report prepared by the Oregon State Game Commission:

Southwest: Opening end of deer season in Douglas county was the most successful so far recorded. Best results were in the Scott mountain area. The Hubbard crest burn showed considerable increase. Pheasant and quail are in good numbers throughout the Umpqua valley.

In Jackson and Josephine counties, deer hunting prospects are excellent if rain comes. Fair numbers of waterfowl are available. Pheasant and quail are excellent for pheasant and quail.

Central: Deer hunting is fair to good in Wasco and Toad give counties in the Mt. Hood National Forest. Lookout mountain, Grasshopper, and Post camp are good choices. Deer hunting in Central Oregon has slumped up from the opening day, but conditions are expected to improve if predicted storms materialize. Waterfowl numbers in Central Oregon are quite low. Pheasant hunting will be generally light in Deschutes and Crook counties. Quail numbers are good and hunting should be excellent.

Mule deer hunting in the Klamath area is best at higher elevations. Prospects appear good this weekend with Pheasant hunting expected. Blacktail deer hunting is also best at higher elevations. Waterfowl hunting this week end should be fair if storms materialize. Prospects for pheasants and quail appear good.
