Homemakers To Go North For Convention

A group of Jackson county homemakers will attend a National Home Demonstration council meeting October 11-14 in Portland.

Miss Mary Pat Lucy, Jackson county home demonstration agent, says about a dozen women from this area will attend the national meeting in its first visit to the West in 23 years.

They'll listen and learn from several speakers, among them Governor Mark Hatfield, Congresswoman Edith Green, Dr. Paul Wright, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, C. M. Ferguson, administrator, federal extension service, Washington, D. C., and Dr. Frank Miles, office of Civil Defense mobilization, Des Moines, Iowa.

The conference is not limited to extension officers or members, says Miss Lucy. Any woman in the county who would like to attend is invited, but must pay the \$2 registration fee. Total attendance is estimated to reach 2500, with homemakers coming all the way from Alaska, Maine, and the far South.

"Oregon Night," October 14, will probably highlight the meeting for the local delegation. The Bohemians, a group of 13 Portland businessmen, will entertain with favorite folk songs. This summer the Bohemians toured Europe at the invitation of the State Department and USO. One of the group spent three years as a teacher in the Tyrolean Alps and many of the group's songs reflect his yodeling skill, it is reported.

Most of the program will be divided into special work sessions built around projects that Jackson county homemakers use in local unit programs.

Supply Of Meats Plentiful

Washington (AP) — Shoppers can find excellent buys in pork, beef, lamb and poultry this week end as a variety of foods continue to flow to market in good volume.

Eggs, cheeses, and other dairy products also continue choice values. Vegetable bins offer a fairly good assortment of items, the best values being potatoes, sweet potatoes, onions, squash, tomatoes, carrots, cabbage, snap beans, cucumbers, celery, cauliflower and green peppers.

In the fruit line, plentiful representing good values include apples of many varieties, avocados, pears, grapefruit, lemons, and Valencia oranges.

Fish in excellent supply include canned tuna, shrimp, and fish sticks. These are the week end's best values, nationally. Now, here's a closer look at plentiful foods in the West (Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming):

Consumers will find ample supplies of meats, eggs and poultry in the markets this week. Some items are priced slightly lower than a week ago. Pork supplies are plentiful in all markets, and supplies of beef range from moderate to ample.

Some cuts of pork and beef are priced 1 to 2 cents a pound lower. Lamb is in ample supply in California markets, and prices are down about 1 cent a pound. All classes of poultry continue in ample supply, and fryer chickens are down 1 to 2 cents a pound in California markets.

Egg prices have declined 1 to 2 cents a dozen in the San Francisco area, and top quality large eggs are slightly weaker in price in the Los Angeles area. Egg supplies continued plentiful in most Pacific Coast markets.

Fresh fruits and vegetables still in plentiful supply, including apples, avocados, lemons, Bartlett pears, bunched vegetables, cauliflower, celery, dry onions, bell peppers, sweet potatoes, tomatoes and squash. In good supply are casaba and Persian melons, grapefruit, Italia and Tokay grapes, Valencia oranges, cabbage, cucumbers, lettuce and potatoes.
