Pioneer IV Sets Cosmic Milestone

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Pioneer IV, America's gold-plated artificial satellite around the sun, was to pass a cosmic milestone today.

It will be 107,951,000 miles from the dominant star of our solar system and racing through the heavens at 59,848 miles an hour.

When it reaches its farthest point from the sun today, Pioneer IV - launched on earth March 2 - will be 15 million miles from the earth.

Propane Pipeline Leak Endangers Texas Residents

Austin, Tex. - (UPI) - A propane gas pipeline blew up on the outskirts of Austin early today and quickly spread an explosive and toxic blanket of fumes over a three-mile area.

Police, firemen and air force Base, some wearing gas masks, rushed through the streets, pounding on doors to awaken endangered families.

Four hundred families fled. Although the danger of an explosion was limited to a radius of three miles, the sickening fumes spread over the whole city.

Hundreds of persons reported headaches and nausea. The danger of a widespread explosion lingered for nearly 3 1/2 hours, by which time the bulk of the gas had been diluted by the atmosphere.

Engineers from the Phillips Pipeline Co., which owned the ruptured line, warned, however, that gas was still lying in low places and basements. The nature of propane is such that it could lie in low places and basements for months unless it is found and blown out.

Propane is a gas much used for heating and cooking in rural areas. It can be transported and stored as a liquid but becomes a gas as soon as it touches air. It is both toxic and highly explosive when it gets out of control.

As the policemen, firemen and servicemen warned the families to get out of their homes, they told them not to turn on the lights, lest sparks from light switches set off an explosion.

Warned Not to Smoke - Families in the danger area were warned not to smoke and to turn out pilot lights in stoves and water heaters as soon as they could.

The 10-inch pipeline exploded at 3:40 a.m. two miles southwest of the city limits. The explosion was in an open field.

471 BOATS SINK - Tokyo - (UPI) - A total of 471 boats sank during the rampage of Typhoon Vera which slammed into central Japan two weeks ago, the transportation ministry announced today. Five more are listed as missing.

Heart Attacks Blamed in Three Hunting Deaths

By United Press International - At least two deer hunters died of apparent heart attacks in Oregon Wednesday. The body of a third man missing since Monday was found.

A Portland barber, Wallace Alvin Ruff, about 60, died of a heart seizure Wednesday afternoon in the Bridge Port area 25 miles south of Baker while deer hunting.

Coroner Thad Beatty confirmed the cause of death. Bodies of two hunters were found within a 45 mile radius in Lake county Wednesday. Autopsy Scheduled

Walter R. Alvin, 70, Lebanon area farmer, was found in the Crane Lake area east of Lakeview. He had been missing since Monday on a deer hunting trip. Police said the cause of death was presumably a heart attack but an autopsy was scheduled for today.

Officers said he was dragging a deer out of the woods when he collapsed. His body was found by a search party using bloodhounds Wednesday morning.

Dr. Gilson Ross, 63, Eugene, died early Wednesday; apparently officiate. Chapel Mortuary is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Mrs. Moulton, the daughter of George and Kate Hudson Allen, was born in Joplin, Mo., on March 24, 1897. She was married in Big Timber, Mont., on June 9, 1915, to Allen Moulton, who preceded her in death a number of years ago. Mrs. Moulton had been a resident of the Rogue valley for the past 31 years.

She is survived by one sister, Juanita Allen, of Santa Monica, Calif.

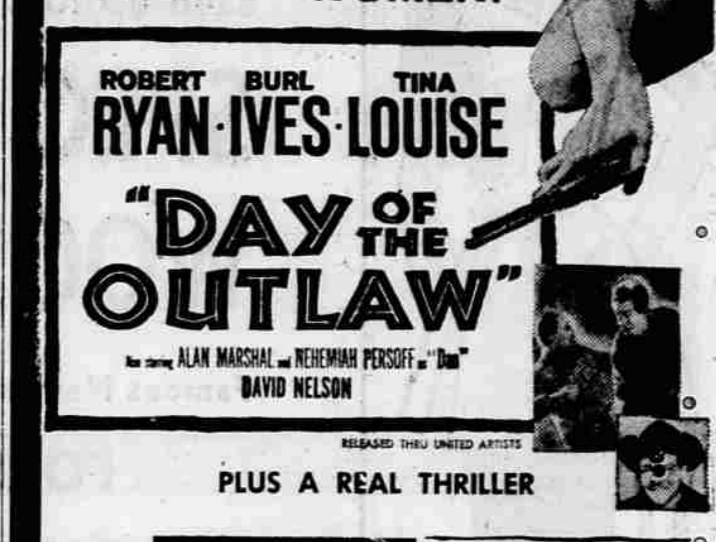
