From Pittsburgh: The Steelworkers wage policy met Tuesday to hear a report that union and management are probably farther apart than when the crippling nationwide strike began 84 days ago. A series of meetings Monday ended the companies' "maximum" offer refused as completely inadequate. Both sides professed a desire to continue negotiations but differed on methods. Steelworkers President McDonald says he will report on the impasse to the wage-policy committee.

FROM PALM SPRINGS - Where President Eisenhower is taking a brief vacation:
James Magerty, Presidential press secretary, told newsmen this morning that "the President wants to express his keen disappointment that there has been no meeting of minds to date to settle the steel strike through collective bargaining."

He added: "The President feels the American people want the steel strike, as well as the East Coast dock strikes, settled and settled fast."

SHORTLY AFTER WAR, the President took steps to invoke the Taft-Hartley law in the docks strike, thus opening the way for the government to seek a court order to send the dock workers back to work for 80 days.

As this is written, no action has been taken by the government in the case of the steel strike.

FOR SEVERAL DAYS, the bulk of the American steel industry has been shut down. The workers want a wage increase. There can be little doubt that they need a wage increase. For years, the cost of living has been rising steadily. Fundamentally, it makes little difference that the wage-price spiral has been largely responsible for the steady increase in living costs. The hard fact is that every year it costs more to live than it cost the year before. We're all caught in that tight of the life.

The steel owners want and doubtless need lower operating costs to meet the competition of the rest of the world. For years they have been seeing their costs rise year after year. They are now seeing more and more foreign steel and steel products entering this country. They are seeing foreign steelmakers getting a larger and larger share of the export markets that formerly took American steel and steel products.

What to do about it? Consider this: You own a piece of land that the public wants and needs - for a public road, for a school, for a city hall site. You want - and need - all the money you can get in order to live as you want to live. The public wants your land at a LOWER PRICE in order to keep taxes down. You can't get together on the deal.

What happens? Eventually you GO TO COURT. The courts step in and set a price that as nearly as possible is fair to both sides. Both sides accept it - or else.

Why is it done that way? It's like this: In America, the rights of each individual are governed by the RIGHTS OF OTHERS. The law and the courts are the arbiters of our rights.

IT WILL be too bad if the courts have to step into the steel strike. But... after all... under our American system... when there HAS to be an adjudication of rights, that is the way it has to be done.

Length Measurement Accuracy Certified
Washington (Science Service) - For the first time in history the National Bureau of Standards here has certified the accuracy of its length measurements made on two commercial gauge blocks to be better than one part in 3,000,000.

Steel gauge blocks are used to monitor manufacturing processes in the mass production of interchangeable machined parts. It has been said that an error of one-millionth of an inch in the borehole of a gyro can result in a complete miss during a moon shot. Measuring that millionth of an inch, the Bureau reported, can be compared to an attempt to detect one quarter dollar in a stack of quarters three times as high as the Empire State Building.
