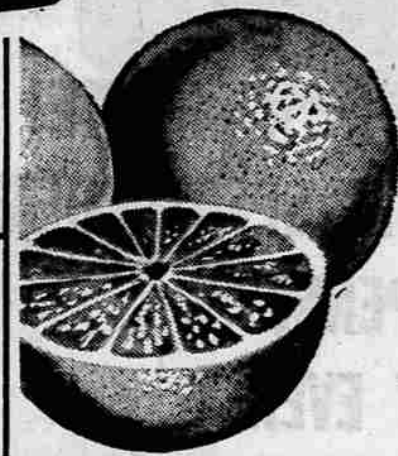

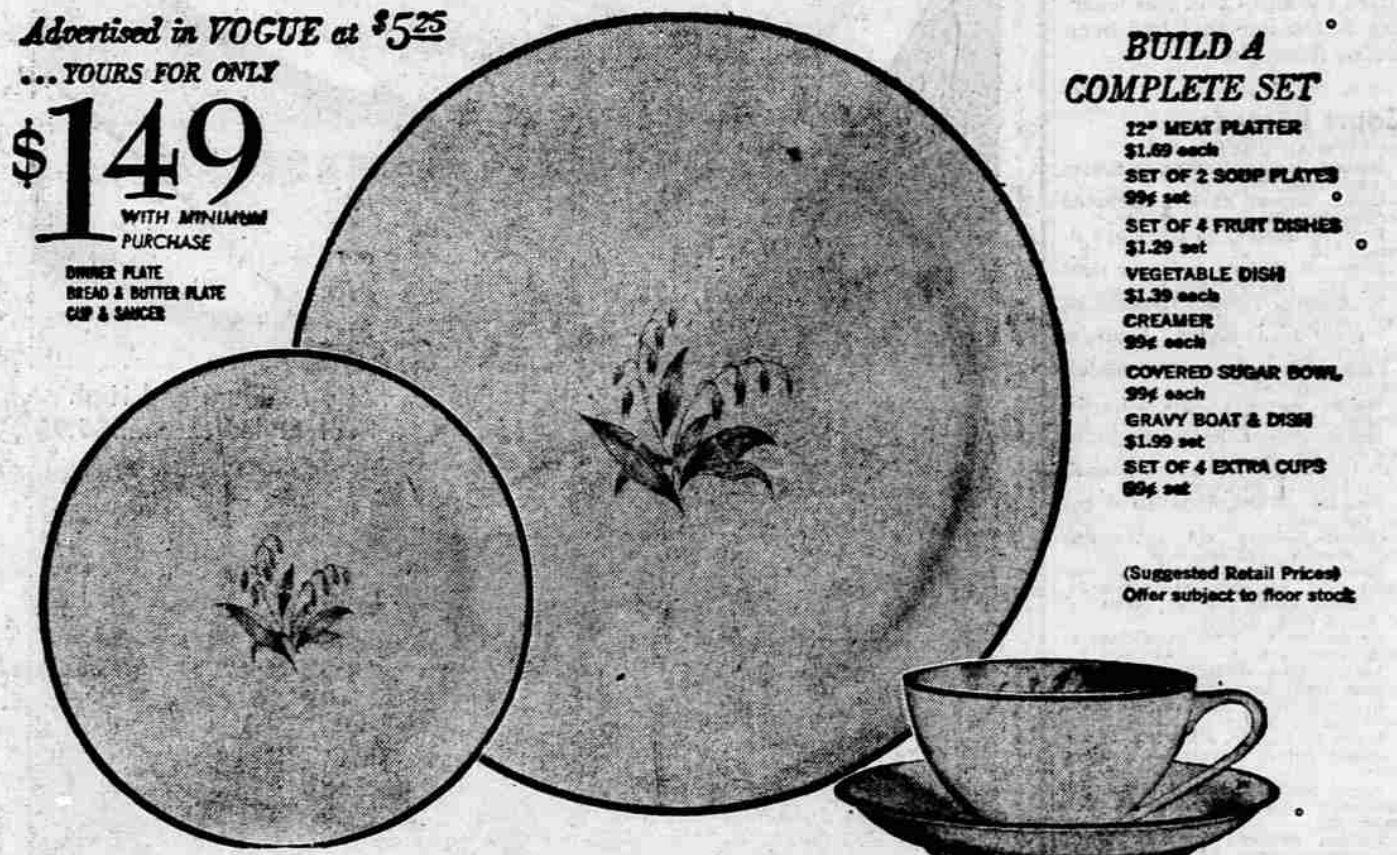

Math Teachers To Meet at SOC

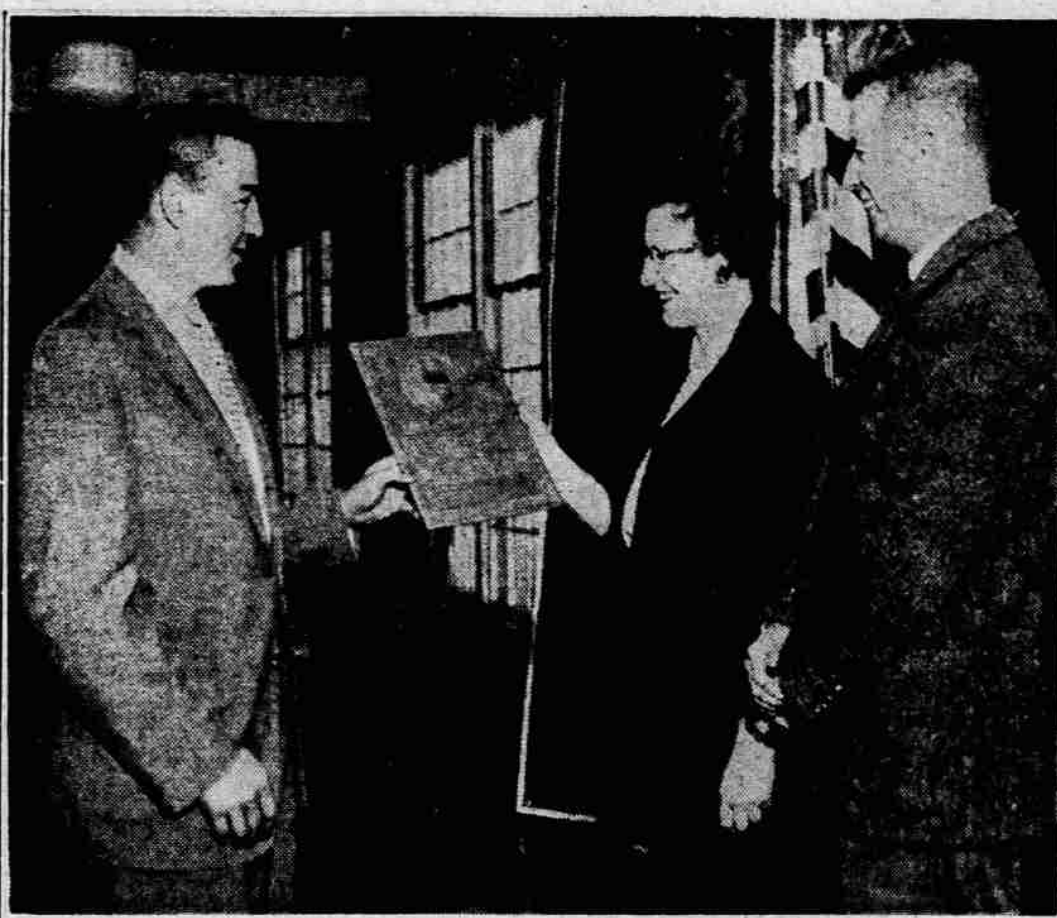
Ashland—The first fall meeting of the Oregon Council of Teachers of Mathematics will be held Saturday, Oct. 10, from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m., at Southern Oregon college.

Miss Lesta Hoel, retired mathematics supervisor for Portland public schools, will speak on "Problem Solving." Dr. Oscar Schaaf of the University of Oregon and South Eugene High school will talk to elementary and junior high teachers on "Basic Principles of Mathematics."

Miss Dana Small of Franklin high school, Portland, will report to secondary teachers on the "content of second course," a report from the University of Illinois committee on school mathematics.

Dr. Elmo Stevenson, SOC president, will welcome the teachers and Wendall Hall, North Eugene High school, president of OCTM, will open the regular meeting.

The meeting is aimed at acquainting teachers with techniques and trends in the field of mathematics. Those wishing to attend the luncheon should send reservations to Dr. Eugene Bowman, Southern Oregon college.

Gasoline Storage Explosion Kills 2

Columbus, Ga. —(UPI)—Two men were burned to death and three more persons critically injured Wednesday in a gasoline storage area explosion and fire.

Flames from the Gulf Oil Co. storage area here threatened an adjacent industrial area for more than an hour before firemen were able to contain the blaze.

The victims were identified as G. W. Dubose, 31, and Otis A. Robinson, 39.

In critical condition today was Mrs. Louise Harper, 34, an office worker for the Gulf Oil Co., Fred B. Mitchell, 53, office manager, and Ivan Garrett, 38, a truck driver.

Cause of the fire has not officially been determined.
