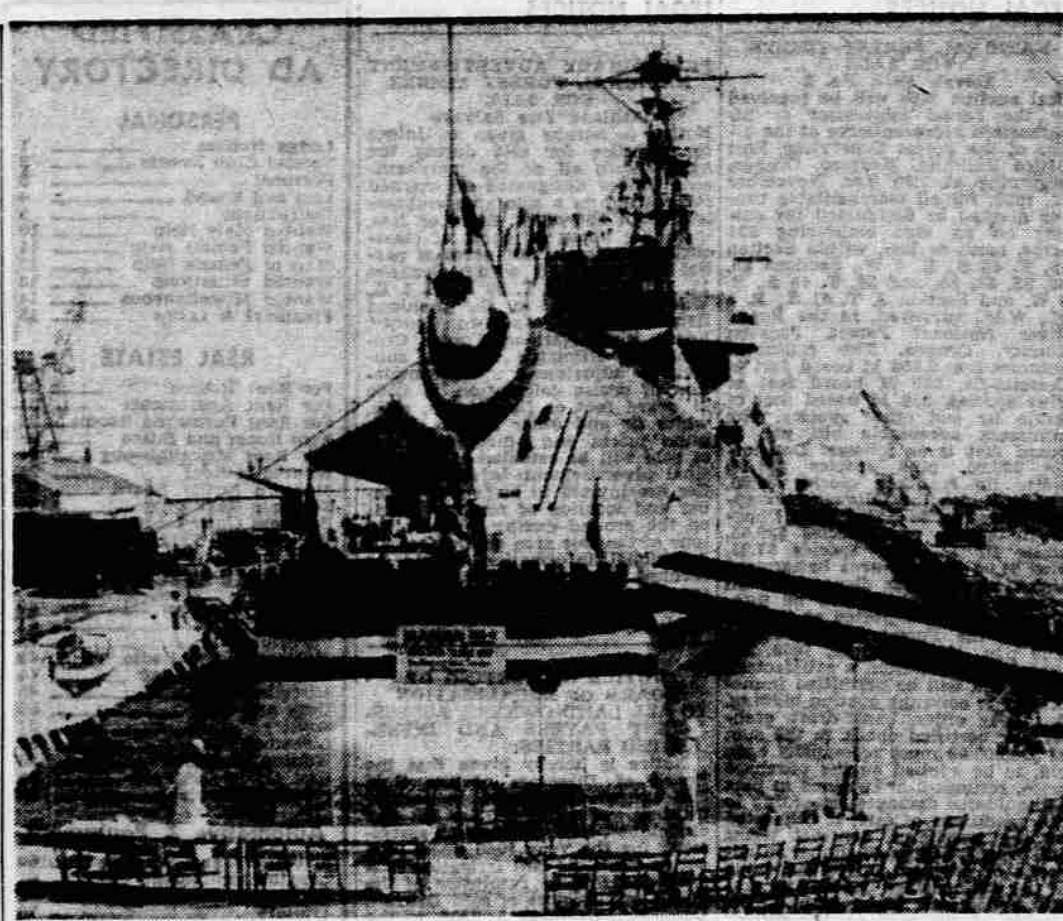

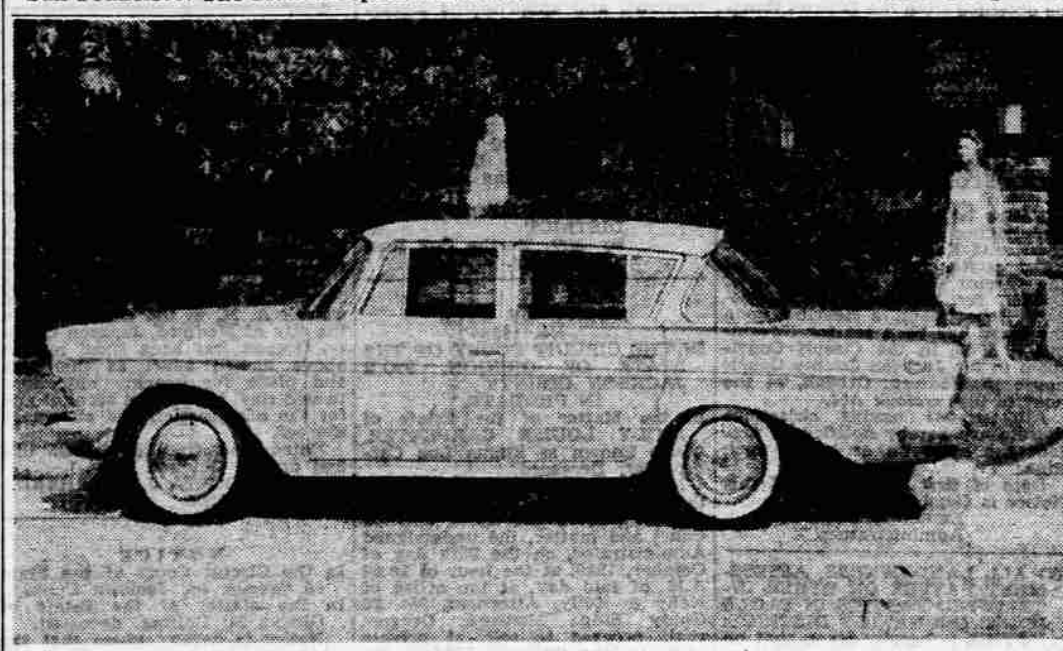

Dotto Contestant Tells of Orders To 'Take Dive'

Washington —UPI— A former contestant testified Thursday that the now-defunct television quiz show, "Dotto," was rigged to permit him to win \$11,600 but he then was ordered to "take a dive."

David Hushle, young manager of a New York City restaurant, gave the testimony to a House subcommittee investigating the operations of the once popular TV quiz shows. The House group previously has heard testimony from former contestants and publicity agents that NBC's old "21" quiz show was rigged by giving contestants questions and answers in advance.

Taken Off Air
"Dotto" was the first of a number of TV quiz shows to be taken off the air in the wake of charges that they were "fixed."

Another "Dotto" contestant, Mrs. Du Barry Hillman, New York City, said that before she went on the air she was asked warm-up questions that tipped her off to answers which enabled her to win \$1,400 in five appearances. She said she got a stern "shh!" when she publicly thanked program aide Stan Green for the help she received on the first show.

No Thought of Fraud
Hushle said he never associated the tip-off activities with fraud. He said "a show must be interesting" and he considered himself a "paid entertainer."

Hushle, who earlier this year testified in a New York County Grand Jury investigation into TV shows, said he won the \$11,600 by appearing as a contestant on three "Dotto" shows in June, 1958, when the show was carried at night on the NBC network.

He said he previously had won \$3,700 on the show when it was carried on the daytime CBS network. In those performances in February, 1958, he said he was given some help but was not supplied in advance with all of the questions and answers.

Limit on Winnings
Hushle said, however, that on the evening shows, Gil Cates, assistant producer, supplied him in advance with answers to all questions and also told him the identity of the person he was required to identify to win at "Dotto."

Hushle testified that Cates contended it was necessary for him to lose after amassing winnings of \$11,600 because the show had a budget allowance limited to \$10,000 a week for prizes.

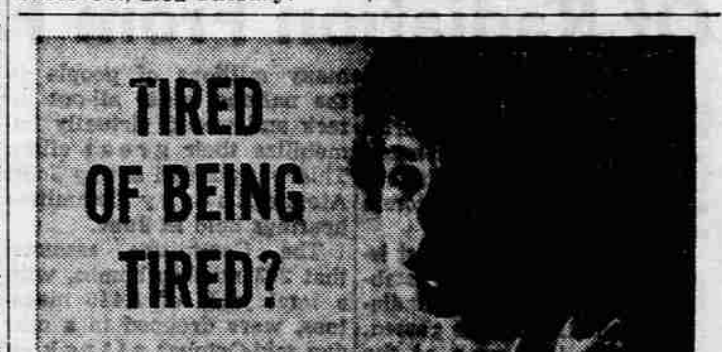
B47 Crashes, Burns At Nebraska Airport

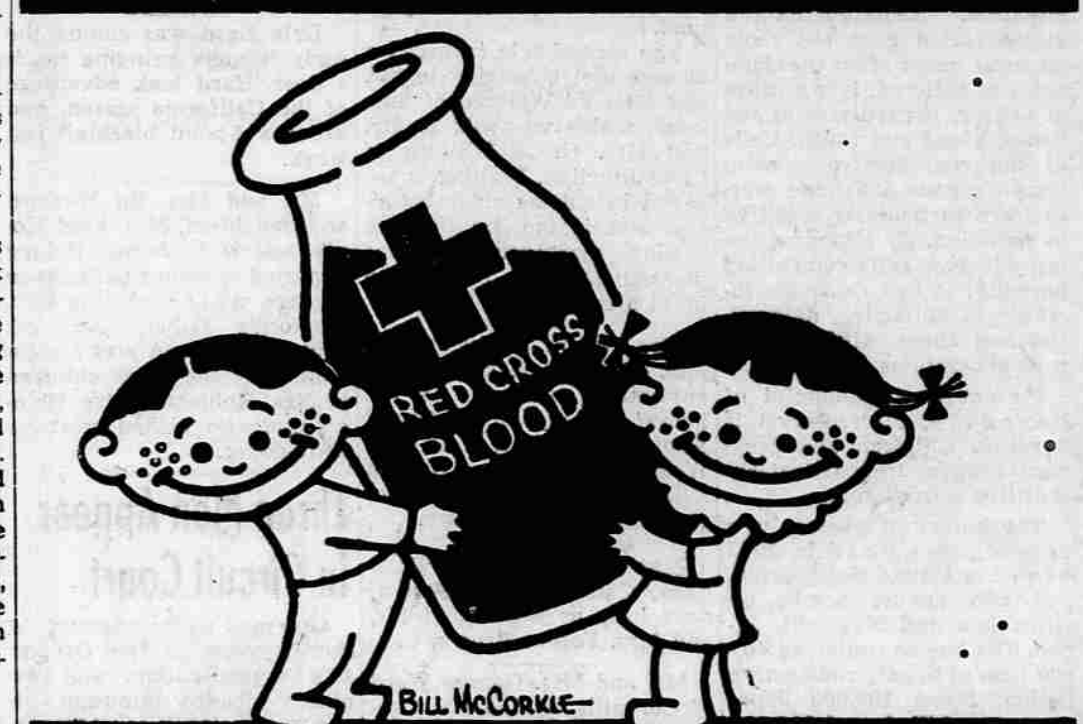
