Planning Commission Denies Request for Changing Zone

The Medford planning commission last night denied a request for a change of zone from Class 1A to Class II multiple family on Crater Lake ave. between Main and Jackson st.

Dr. Ralph Thompson, appearing before the commission, urged action on behalf of the petitioners. He reminded the commission that the matter had been pending for some time.

Commissioner Larry Schaefer denied the petition. He said that the change from Class 1A to Class II would be too broad, he said. He also said that the commission's general opinion of the commission is that the change is not in the best interests of the city.

The commission also denied a petition for change of zone from Class 1A to Class IV light industrial on Bigler st. between Jackson st. and McAndrews rd.

The commission continued the hearing on a request for change of zone from Class 1A to Class II multiple family on the lots in the Highcroft addition.

It also continued the hearing on a request for change of zone from Class III commercial to Class V light industrial on Barnhart rd. The commission is awaiting development of a city zoning ordinance before acting, it was explained.

A request from Harold Stevens to operate a plumbing business in a Class 1B zone at 30 Lincoln st. was referred to City Attorney Joel Fisher.

Not asking for a variance or change of zone, a complaint had been made to Building Inspector O. R. McNeil by a resident of the neighborhood. Stevens is merely seeking to clear the complaint, Nunley explained.

Parking two plumbing trucks in front of the residence does not mean Stevens operates a shop at his home, he added. Nunley said an inspection of the premises re-

vealed no tools, equipment, benches or vises are kept there.

A hearing was called Nov. 12 on a request for a change of zone from Class 1A to Class IIIA limited commercial zone on Table Rock rd.

Calls Hearings
The commission also called for hearings on the same time on requests for variance for house trailer at 515 Park Place No. 5 and for variance in set back from Dan Patch.

The commission tentatively approved the Priceten subdivision providing Crowder dr., the street south of Spring st., can be extended full length. Attorney Edward Branchfield, representing residents of the area, said although the Kittle property is under litigation, he is certain

'Tic-Tac-Dough' Producer Tells Of Contacts

Washington - (UPI) - A television producer fired by the NBC network, testified today that he advised 25 or 30 persons to lie to a New York Grand Jury investigating rigged TV quiz shows.

Howard D. Felsher, discharged a week ago by NBC as producer of the "Tic-Tac-Dough" program, made the statement in testimony before a House investigating subcommittee. He had testified previously that at least three out of four contestants on the night-time version of that program had received question and answer information in advance.

Subcommittee counsel Robert W. Lishman asked Felsher about his contacts with contestants prior to the Grand Jury proceedings. Felsher said he met with four or five individuals but telephoned to 22 or 23 of them.

No Word From Van Doren
The subcommittee waited, meanwhile, for an answer from Charles Van Doren, 33, big money winner on the old "21" show, invited to appear as a witness.

Felsher said he told "Tic-Tac-Dough" contestants that "if I were to testify before the Grand Jury I would deny that I had given them questions and answers in advance."

He also said, in response to a question, that he suggested to contestants also deny that they had received such assistance.

Asked whether Dan Enright, the Barry & Enright production team advised him to make the suggestion, Felsher said no.

Affidavit Refused
NBC fired Felsher as producer after he was subpoenaed by the subcommittee and refused last week to supply NBC with an affidavit that he had not supplied contestants with answers in advance.

Of his Grand Jury advice to contestants, Felsher said: "I was panicked-terrorized-I just did it."

He usually met with contestants in his office to give them the information, Felsher said, but sometimes did so at his home and sometimes in his automobile.

In some instances, he said, he explained to new contestants that they were being brought in to cut down the winnings of highly successful contestants.

Van Doren Suspended
Felsher said that, to the best of his recollection, no one at NBC asked him until last week whether he supplied advanced questions and answers to "Tic-Tac-Dough" contestants.

The National Broadcasting Co. suspended Van Doren from his \$50,000 job which features him in appearances on the early morning "Today" show. The scholar also teaches at Columbia University. A substitute teacher handled his classes today. He was suspended by the network until questions raised by the House subcommittee are resolved.

Churchill Picked For Ninth Term

London - (UPI) - The Conservative member from Woodford will be 85 years old next month. But he is a man with a future.

Sir Winston Churchill was elected to the House of Commons Thursday for the ninth consecutive time. It was an easy victory. No blood, no toil, no sweat. And no tears, either, for even some members of the Labor Party in Woodford admitted they couldn't find it in their hearts to vote against him.

There has been much talk that this would be Sir Winston's last political battle. That talk apparently got back to the old warrior, for the Conservative committeeman from Woodford, Jack Frost, issued this statement:

"The feeling among us is that as long as his body lasts Sir Winston will continue to be a member of Parliament."

SMOKERS' BABIES SMALL
London - (UPI) - Women who smoke have smaller babies than those who don't, a doctor wrote in the authoritative British medical journal Lancet today.

"The reduction in weight is by no means trivial," said Dr. C. R. Lowe. He said a survey of 2,042 women in Birmingham showed babies borne by smoking mothers averaged 6.93 pounds as against 7.33 pounds for non-smokers.

Wilson Recovering From Heart Attack

Detroit - (UPI) - Former Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson was recovering today from a mild heart attack.

Doctors discovered he had suffered a heart attack when he entered the hospital for an examination. He apparently was stricken in Florida last week, Wilson's son, Thomas, said.

Wilson was reported in satisfactory condition but his family said he would remain in the hospital several weeks for further rest and treatment.

Tokyo - (UPI) - Communist Party Chairman Mao Tse-tung and Premier Chou En-lai Thursday received 31 visitors from nine Asian and African countries who came to Peiping for the 10th anniversary celebrations of the Peiping regime, the Communist New China News Agency reported today.

First Vaccine Dose Crucial, Salk Says

Pittsburgh - (UPI) - Dr. Jonas E. Salk, developer of the Salk polio vaccine, said Thursday any failure by the vaccine to provide protection can be blamed on "insufficient" strength of the first dose.

"The idea that there are 5, 10 or 15 per cent of the population who cannot respond to the vaccine is not so," Salk said.

The University of Pittsburgh scientist explained in a speech here that the first dose is "crucial" because it creates a barrier for subsequent inoculations. He said the strength of the first dose also affects the protection level that will be gained by a "booster shot."
