Oh, how she wants to talk!

A Hiatal Hernia
Many people write me in great anxiety because someone accidentally, while x-raying them, found that if they will lie down and strain, they can push a little of the stomach up into the chest, perhaps an inch or so. Now, a surgeon is keen to operate, but as the man says, "I have no symptoms from it, or at most I can feel it if I eat a big meal and then reach over to take off my shoes. Why then should I be operated on?" My answer is that I, who have an uncomfortable cardia (the place where the gullet joins the stomach) would never think of being operated on and taking the risk. To be sure, I don't like to lace my shoes after a Thanksgiving dinner, but why worry about that? I was just reading an article by Dr. C. C. Craighead and R. G. Reyes of New Orleans, who say that they reviewed the records of 121 persons past 61 years of age—with a diaphragmatic hiatal hernia (or tiny rupture in the midriff) with symptoms bad enough so that the patient was admitted to the Charity hospital in New Orleans.

The doctors found that 82 of these persons were treated without operation. Interesting is the fact that 55 of these people had other troubles with the digestive tract which could have been causing their symptoms. This interest is because commonly, when I see a person with a little hiatal hernia I cannot be sure that the little pain that occasionally he feels is arising in the hernia. It may be due to nervousness, or a little indigestion, or to a gallstone he has, or to a slight angina pectoris which he gets occasionally when he walks fast. Under such circumstances I certainly am not going to have him operated on; if I did, he might not be any better. Often, also, if the person has a stout abdomen, I can work a cure with a reduction diet.

I'll never forget a woman of 55 with a large abdomen whose diaphragmatic hernia was hurting quite a bit whenever she ate too much and then tried to bend over. Unfortunately, she had some gallstones that were bothering her, and also some coronary heart disease. With all her troubles, when she got a pain, it was hard to say where it was coming from. The surgeon said he would not do operation unless she would take off at least 50 pounds of fat. But when she did this, she felt so well that she went home happy.

In closing his discussion, Dr. Craighead said that a while ago he reviewed 250 cases of diaphragmatic hernia in which there were some symptoms, and that he and his group had operated on only five of these persons. I personally have never asked a surgeon to operate for a hiatal hernia because I haven't yet found a patient who thought he was suffering enough to warrant the risk and the expense. I know that some patients with this trouble have to be operated on, but as yet I haven't found one.

Cataracts More Easily Operated On
I have just been talking with a number of my ophthalmological friends who tell me that there is a new digestant drug which, when put into the front of the eye-ball, almost instantly loosens up the tissue around the lens of the eye—the lens which is clouded in the case of a cataract. This loosening-up of the ring which normally holds the lens in place allows it to be pushed easily out of the eye-ball through the little cut that has been made, and this makes the operation much easier. The results are now more likely to be good.
