

Cash Awards Are Offered by Farm To Fair Showmen

Grants Pass - Two cash awards have been offered 4-H Angus showmen in both Josephine and Jackson county fairs for 1960, according to a prominent Grants Pass Angus breeder.

Harold and Thelma Hoots, owners of the Hoots Angus farm on Lower River rd., Grants Pass, have offered \$100 cash prize to 4-H showmen in the two fairs having champion 4-H steers of the Angus breed and \$50 for the Angus showmen who have reserve champion steers.

"Hoots Angus farm is making the cash awards to encourage future young cattle men to make their start with the Black Angus," Hoots said. At this year's Josephine county fair, Angus steers in the 4-H division won both grand champion and reserve champion awards. Angus exhibitors won first and second place in beef showmanship and during the auction topped the market over comparative breeds by an unusually high margin.

Grand Champion
The grand champion 4-H Angus steer sold at auction at 87 cents a pound to the Redwood Hotel, Grants Pass, and the reserve champion steer at 73 cents a pound to the U.S. National Bank of Portland. Of the total of 16 4-H steers sold, the six Angus averaged 56 cents a pound, the eight Herefords at 47 cents a pound average, and two shorthorns at 38½ cents per pound average.

In Jackson county's fair, two Herefords won the grand champion steer and reserve champion steer awards. However, a registered Angus, senior heifer calf, won junior champion and grand champion awards in its division. A registered Angus cow and calf in the production class, won the senior champion award in its class.

Tough-To-Choose Week End On Collegiate Grid Scene

Southern Methodist leads unpredictable Missouri in the feature game of a Friday night program that opens a tough-to-pick week end of college football.

West Virginia, Wichita, Tulane, and Oregon are favorites in other Friday night battles, and then Saturday will see five of the nation's top-ranked teams—Texas, Georgia Tech, Tennessee, Purdue and Wisconsin—fighting in games where they are rated no better than even money.

West Virginia Favored
West Virginia, with a 2-1

mark, is favored over winless Boston University. Wichita, 2-0, is a narrow pick over George Washington, 1-3. Tulane is a very slight pick over Detroit, 2-1. And Oregon, rolling in high with a 3-0 mark, is a solid favorite over San Jose State, 1-2.

Texas, ranked No. 4 nationally, is even money Saturday against Oklahoma. Fifth-ranked Georgia Tech and sixth-ranked Tennessee are a toss-up in what could be the Southeastern Conference's biggest game of the season.

Eighth-ranked Purdue and ninth-ranked Wisconsin risk their Big Ten title hopes in their opening league game

with much depending on the fitness of Purdue Ace Ross Fichtner.

The high-ranked teams figure to have an easier time. National leader Louisiana State is a 21-point pick to make Miami, Fla., its 16th straight victim. Second-ranked Northwestern is a 14-point favorite over Minnesota. Third-ranked Southern California is idle, but 7th-ranked Mississippi is a 13-point choice over Vanderbilt, and 10th-Iowa is favored by 8 over Michigan State.

Princeton Over Penn

Princeton is a six-point Ivy League favorite over Pennsylvania, Ohio State is the choice by six over Illinois in the Big Ten, Auburn is picked by seven over Kentucky in the Southeastern Conference, and Wake Forest by one over Maryland.

In leading intersectionals, Rice and Florida are even, as are Pittsburgh and Duke, while Michigan is a six-point choice over Oregon State, and Notre Dame is favored by 14 over California.

In other top games, Navy and Syracuse are rated even, Army is a six-point pick over Penn State in a game that could decide top Eastern honors, Arkansas is seven over Baylor, Washington St. eight over College of Pacific, Clemson 10 over North Carolina State, Dartmouth 13 over Brown, and the Air Force Academy 21 over Idaho.

Cressman, head of the department of anthropology, University of Oregon; a number of descendants of pioneer families from both states, and Dr. Taylor.

Notre Dame Picked Over California

California is expected to fall back into the meat grinder Saturday when it takes on Notre Dame in an intersectional clash that may pack 80,000 spectators into the Berkeley stadium.

The Irish, to the surprise of nobody, have been posted 14 point favorites although they took a 28-7 blasting from Purdue last Saturday. All of which figures as Cal was laced, 33-0, by Texas after getting bounced, 42-12, by Iowa on the previous week end.

Coach Joe Kuharich of the South Benders insists that the game is a tossup but Pete Elliott, the Bears' boy mentor, fears the worst.

The undefeated Ducks of Oregon seek to win their fourth straight tonight at San Jose where the Spartans are 13-point underdogs. Dave Powell, Oregon's explosive fullback, is back in action after being sidelined during last week's 14-6 triumph over Washington State.

Oregon State, oh-for-three so far this season, is expected to make it oh-for-four after a Saturday contest at Michigan. Coach Tommy Prothro of the Beavers, who have dropped their last two games by one point, says he expects to get a good defensive effort out of his charges. Due to injuries, he may have to go with sophomore Bob Lea at center against the Wolverines, who also are in the market for their first victory.

Idaho's wandering Vandals—they're only playing two of their games in Moscow this year—shape up as the customary underdogs for a tilt at the Air Force Academy. The Vandals are also winless in three games and only have scored in one. The Air Force has won both of its contests, besting Wyoming and Trinity of Texas without undue strain.

Cougars Given Edge
College of the Pacific, a 21-6 loser to Stanford last Saturday, seeks to bounce back on its home grounds when it takes on Washington State in a night game. The Cougars, eight point favorites, lost a 14-6 tangle to Oregon while COP was bowing to the Indians.

Third-ranked Southern California and UCLA's Bruins, the only teams who have been able to shore up the Coast's declining intersectional prestige, both have Saturday off. Then the Trojans have a date with Washington Oct. 17 while the Bruins go to Berkeley in a pair of Big Five scraps.

U.S. Planning Several Space Launchings Soon

Cape Canaveral, Fla. - (UPI) - The U.S. is planning to launch one and possibly two moon rockets, a deep-space probe, and at least four earth satellites before the end of 1959, United Press International has learned.

One moon rocket will be targeted for a firing date sometime in November, early in the month if possible, but more likely in the last week. If all goes well, a second moonshot will be tentatively planned for late December or January.

The deep-space probe, equipped with a new long-range transmitter, will try for an orbit around the sun in December.

Details Unavailable
Two of the four earth moonshots will be of the Project Transit navigational satellite series—one in November and the second a month later. A third will be another of the Discoverer satellites. Details about the fourth were unavailable.

In addition, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration will launch in December a test version of its Scout, a four-stage satellite launcher scheduled to become operational next spring.

All the launchings will be at Cape Canaveral, with exception of the Discoverer, which will be fired from the Pacific Missile Range at Vandenberg Air Force Base in California.

UO Ducks Favored By 13 Over Sparts

San Jose, Calif. - (UPI) - Oregon's Ducks, aiming to run up a better record than the one that carried them into the Rose Bowl two years ago, were 13-point favorites to knock off San Jose State tonight and remain undefeated.

It marked the fourth meeting between the teams with San Jose still looking for its first victory of the series.

Oregon went into the game with Dave Powell, its hard-hitting fullback, in working order again after he had sustained a pinched shoulder nerve while helping the Ducks

trim Washington State, 14-6 last Saturday.

With Powell in the lineup, Coach Len Casanova was assured of fielding a solid quartet of ball handlers which included Quarterback Dave Gosz, and Halfbacks Willie West and Dave Grayson.

The Ducks also were as tough as usual on defense, having limited Utah and the Cougars to six points each after outlasting Stanford, 28-27, in the season opener.

Coach Bob Titchenal of the Spartans looked for a free-scoring game but was banking on substitute fullback Joe Paris to help deliver the goods now that Kent Rockholt, had to remain sidelined because of a blood infection.

San Jose's strength greatly lay in the passing combination of Quarterback Emmett Lee and Halfback Oneal Cutler.

OTI Owls Face Eastern Oregon

Portland - (UPI) - Eastern Oregon increased its lead in team rushing and Oregon Tech continued to maintain its total offense lead after the third week of football action in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

This Saturday's schedule brings the offensive leaders together at Klamath Falls when Oregon Tech hosts Eastern Oregon college. Southern Oregon college opens its conference schedule in Portland against Portland State at the Roosevelt High field and Oregon College of Education goes outside the conference for a game with Whitman at Walla Walla.

Washington - (UPI) - More working time was lost from strikes in August than in any month since June, 1952.

The Labor Department said Thursday the steel strike accounted for 80 per cent of the 13 million man-days of idleness recorded in August. About 425 walkouts involving 170,000 workers began in the month.

Braves Seeking Gil McDougald

Chicago - (UPI) - The Milwaukee Braves are dickering for infielder Gil McDougald of the New York Yankees and also are considering Lou Boudreau as successor to retiring manager Fred Haney. United Press International learned today.

Negotiations with the Yankees centered around an offer of Pitcher Bob Buhl plus cash or other players for McDougald, the versatile infielder who experienced a subpar season during 1959.

The Braves were understood to be after McDougald to play second base, which was a problem for Milwaukee throughout the 1958 season with 1957-58 regular Ted Schoendienst sidelined by beriberi. Apparently the Braves wish to protect themselves at second in the event 36-year-old Schoendienst will not be able to make a full comeback next year.
