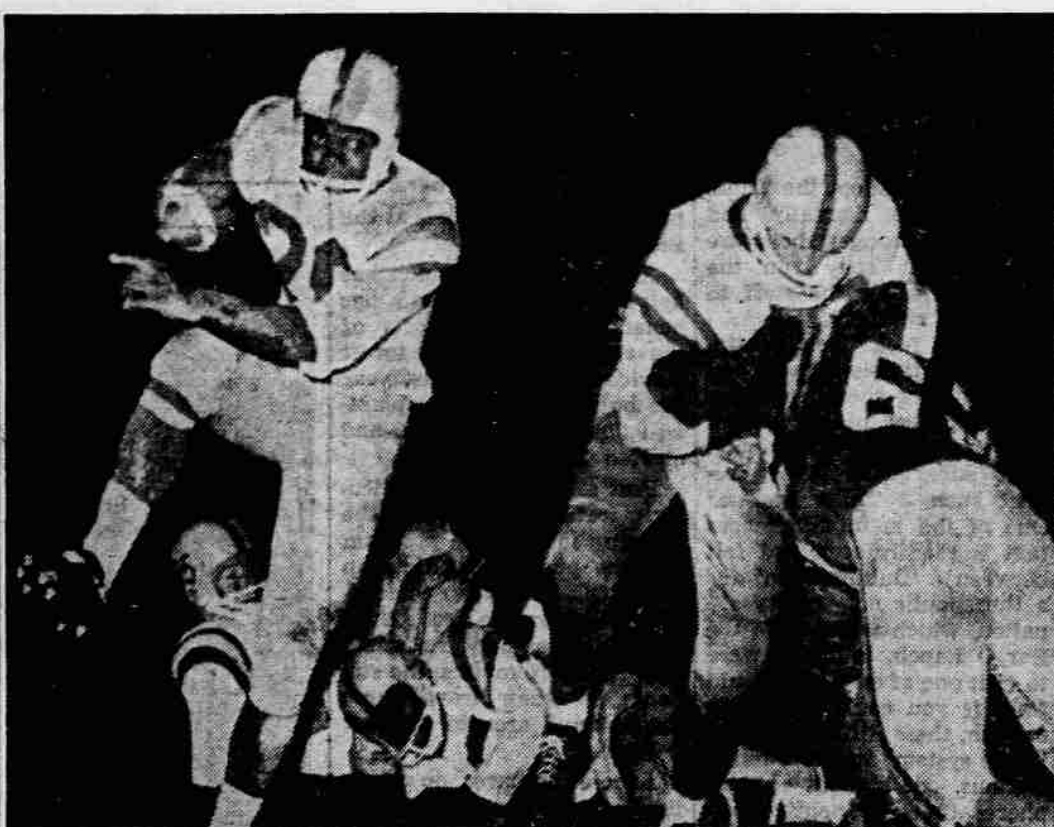

Green Bay Picked Over SF Eleven

 Green Bay's attempt to extend the National Football League's "miracle of 1959" and Cleveland's bid for revenge feature Sunday's six-game professional program.

The Packers, who won only one game in 1958, already have won two this season and are four-point choices to make it three at the expense of the San Francisco Forty-Niners, the league's only other unbeaten team. A capacity crowd of 32,150 will watch the Western Division leaders clash at Green Bay.

About 60,000 will swarm into Cleveland's lake-front stadium to watch coach Paul Brown's Browns tackle the New York Giants in a renewal of the Eastern Division's most bitter and most lucrative rivalry. Brown won't have to give any pep talks this week. The Giants cost each Browns about \$3,000 last December by blanketing Cleveland in a playoff for the Eastern Division crown.

Despite that 10-0 whitewash and two other defeats suffered at the hands of the Giants in 1958, the Browns are 3½ point favorites. The Baltimore Colts, defending league champions, are seven-point favorites to whip the Lions at Detroit. In the other games, the Bears are favored over the Los Angeles Rams by 7½ points at Chicago, the Redskins are one-point choices to beat the Chicago Cardinals at Washington, and the Eagles are picked over the Pittsburgh Steelers by two points at Philadelphia.

Dodgers Sit Atop World; Plan Future

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The Dodgers sit atop the baseball world today, and there is every indication the club's front office already is devising plans for future conquests.

When Dodger manager Walter Alton returned with most of his squad from Chicago Friday night, he told reporters, "It's a little too early to think about next year's team." He was obviously savoring the welcome of 3,500 ardent fans as the world champion Dodgers came home with all the marbles after a dismal 1958 season in which they finished seventh.

Plans Talks
 But Alton said he would "spend a few days talking with club officials" before he returns to his Ohio home. Some of the time may be spent discussing contract terms for next season, since he has not signed for 1960. But the Dodger field leader almost certainly will review the prospects for next season with General Manager E. J. Bavasi and other team officials.

"We're always looking for help," said Buzzie Franke after the Dodgers routed the White Sox Thursday. But he also predicted a bright future for the Dodgers because of the youth of the team—particularly the pitching staff of Don Drysdale, Johnny Podres, Larry Sherry, Sandy Koufax and Stan Williams. All are in their 20s.

Invest In Youth
 The Dodgers also have invested about a million dollars in the past two years in fine young players, including Ron Fairly, Frank Howard and Early Robinson.

Alton and other staff members believe the shortstop situation is improved with the play of Maury Wills, while John Roseboro encouraged the Dodger brass with his play behind the plate late in the year.

Scrappy Irish Slug Out Win

Berkeley, Calif. — (UPI) — Notre Dame's pro-type offense, rolling at a point a minute clip through the first 21 minutes, romped to a penalty-filled, fist-throwing 28-6 victory over hapless California Saturday.

With a throng of 68,500 watching, coach Joe Kuharich's men from South Bend piled up a 21-0 lead over the boys from Cal during the first half and then held the Golden Bears well in check until the final minutes of play.

The Irish were penalized 158 yards during the game and fisticuffs broke out several times. Midway through the fourth period, guard Nick Butroni of Notre Dame and guard Doug Graham of Cal were thrown out of the game after they engaged in a slug-fest match 20 yards from the rest of the team on the field.

Rodriguez-Clay Bout Said Draw

Philadelphia — (UPI) — Kid Sixto Rodriguez shed tears but his manager, Karl Ashley, was philosophical over a "home-town" decision they claimed left them with a draw instead of a victory over light-heavyweight contender Von Clay.

Ashley thought his 3-1 underdog from San Anselmo, Calif., "won big" in his nationally-televised, 10-round bout with Clay, a knockout artist who kept his unbeaten string intact at 12 bouts. The sixth-ranked Clay now has a 10-0-2 log with eight kayos.

Rodriguez, making his eastern debut, said he thought he earned the fight by winning "seven or eight rounds" with slick jabs and quick combinations to the head of baffled Clay, who never got a real chance to unleash his power. Referee Dave Beloff scored the bout in favor of Rodriguez, 48-44, under Pennsylvania's five point must system. Judge Jim Mina gave it to Clay, 46-45, while Judge Jack Sully scored it even at 45-45. United Press International tabbed it 46-43 for Rodriguez.
