Better Values Could Check Delinquency, Speaker Says

Kenyon J. Scudder, director of field services for the Osborne Association, Inc., Balboa Island, Calif., told delegates at the Oregon Study Institute for Juvenile Needs here Friday that "delinquency will continue to be a major problem until we establish a better set of values in all our human relations than those prevalent today."

Scudder spoke at the opening session of the second annual conference of the Institute. The conference followed the annual meeting of the Oregon Juvenile Council, which ended Friday.

The Osborne Association, Inc., is an organization interested in improving the correctional standards in the different states. Scudder's topic was "Delinquency and Crime Can Be Checked."

Breeds Delinquency
Scudder said "We are living in a society that breeds delinquency just as swamps breed mosquitoes which carry malaria germs. Malaria was a serious problem until men drained the swamps. Delinquency will continue to be a major problem until we establish a better set of values in all our human relations than those prevalent today."

"Unless we can somehow develop community and family stability, desirable behavior models and firm moral values to which people can have allegiance, there will be new delinquents always replacing those we treat," he added.

He noted that children today are "taught one set of values in the home, school or church, but as soon as they get outside these institutions they face an entirely different world in which all the standards they were taught seem to be contradicted."

Least Regard
"On every side they see and hear of people who do not live up to these ideals, and moreover those who have the most money often seem to have the least regard for ideals," Scudder said.

Scudder said 60 per cent of our delinquents have been classified as "social delinquents." Their troubles, he said, stem "mainly from unfavorable home and community factors." These are the more hopeful cases, he said, and can be handled within the community with the aid of agencies, law-enforcement groups, and citizens working together.

Every community in America, he said, "has some unsatisfactory social conditions with which it struggles or conveniently ignores." These conditions have been brought under control by aroused citizens in some areas.

"These conditions were created by men, and can be corrected by men," he added. "Therefore we must know our community, for delinquency and crime are local problems and must be dealt with in the local setting. We must attack the problems of delinquency at its source—in the early years of childhood when budding anti-social behavior can be spotted and adjusted."

Scudder said the first line of defense must be supported. The first line of defense, he noted, are the "schools, churches, police, social agencies and community resources."

Professional workers and citizen-leaders must be brought together to cooperate in the struggle to find a solution. "Citizen participation," he said, "is our greatest undeveloped and unlimited resource in our fight towards the reduction of delinquency and crime."

Far Reaching
F. Harold Butterfield, superintendent of the Fred C. Nelles school for boys, department of youth authority, state of California, said at the Saturday morning session of the Institute that the appointment of juvenile advisory councils can "and will be far reaching in the development of a stable, constructive, and progressive program for children and youth" in Oregon.

Butterfield discussed "Advisory Councils by Statute," noting that members of such a council "should be outstanding citizens of the community without official connection with the juvenile court or the juvenile department." The council, he said, should represent a broad cross-section of the county including membership from the rural as well as the populous area.

Butterfield said the purpose of the advisory council should be constructive, "even though at times you may be critical." He said council members must depend on the professionals for advice and counsel, but the actions of the "advisory council must be of their own making."

Consider Program
He suggested advisory councils in Oregon, including Jackson county's, give serious "consideration of an open program for some of your boys between 14 and 20 years of age. You cannot make a mistake if your plans are properly prepared."

He mentioned that the forests, streams and rivers provide a natural setting for a program that is best suited to the boy who does not need close custody.

"It is false economy not to develop programs that provide an opportunity to conserve our two great natural resources—your youth and your landscape. Take a close look at California, Minnesota and other states which have developed these open programs; then fit the programs to the state of Oregon."

Not Guilty Plea In Kidnaping Case

Pendleton—(UPI)—Robert Vasco Keller, 28, Washington state prison escapee, has pleaded not guilty here to kidnaping and assault and robbery charges.

Keller was charged with the Sept. 18 abduction of a Milton-Freewater youth after Keller was allegedly cornered by the youth while in possession of a stolen car.

Keller entered the plea before Circuit Judge William Wells. Bail was continued at \$15,000.

Trial date of Oct. 26 was set for the assault charge. No date was set for the kidnaping charge. Keller was represented by a court appointed lawyer.

Prison Inmate's Motion Denied

Portland—(UPI)—Federal District Judge Gus J. Solomon Friday denied a motion by a Leavenworth prison inmate to vacate the prisoner's penalty on a second count of burglary in a post office here.

Robert Kardatzke, 30, was sentenced to eight years imprisonment by Judge Solomon, five on a first count of post office entry with intent to commit larceny and three for theft of government property.
