Mrs. Frank Ward, worthy matron, will preside.

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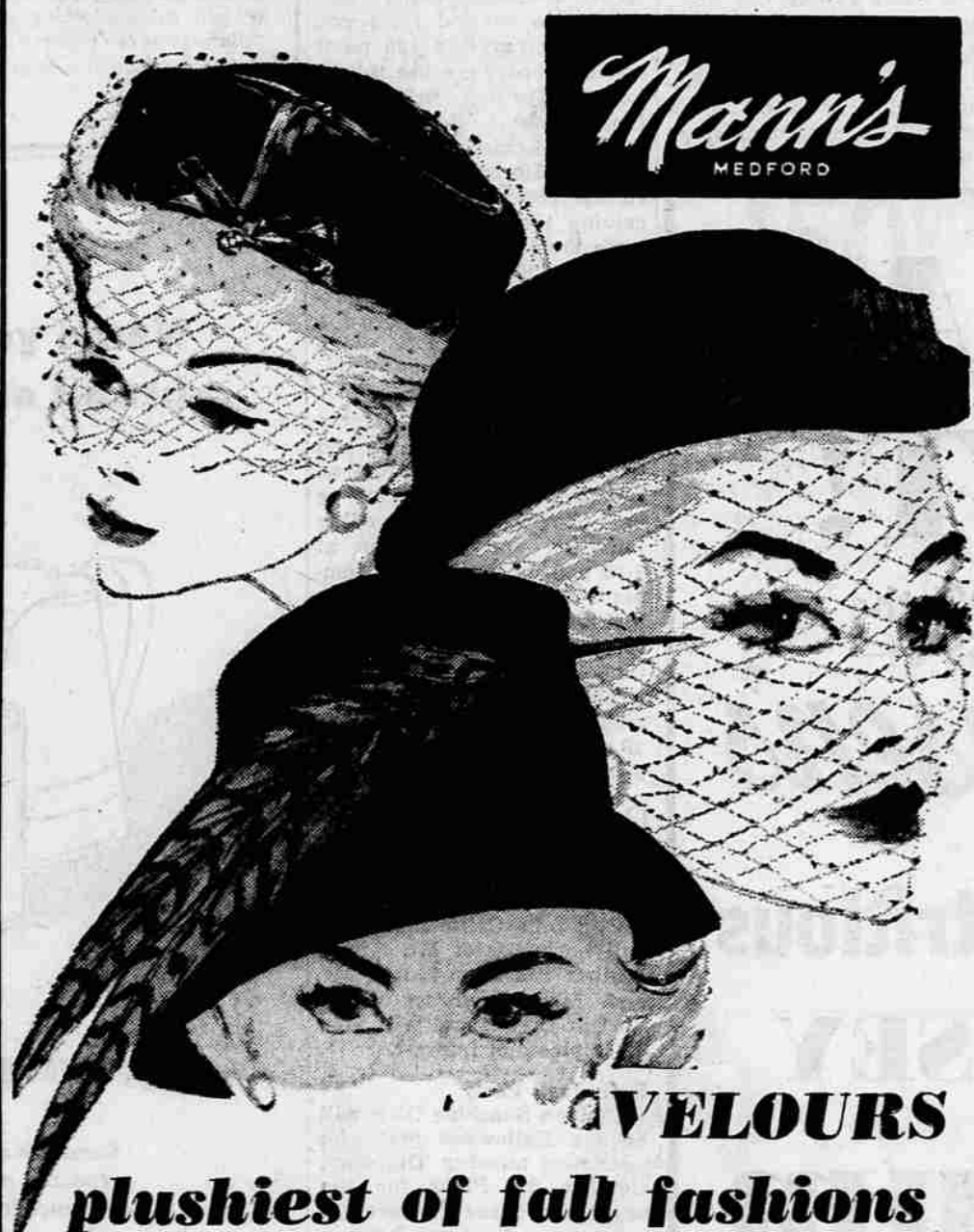
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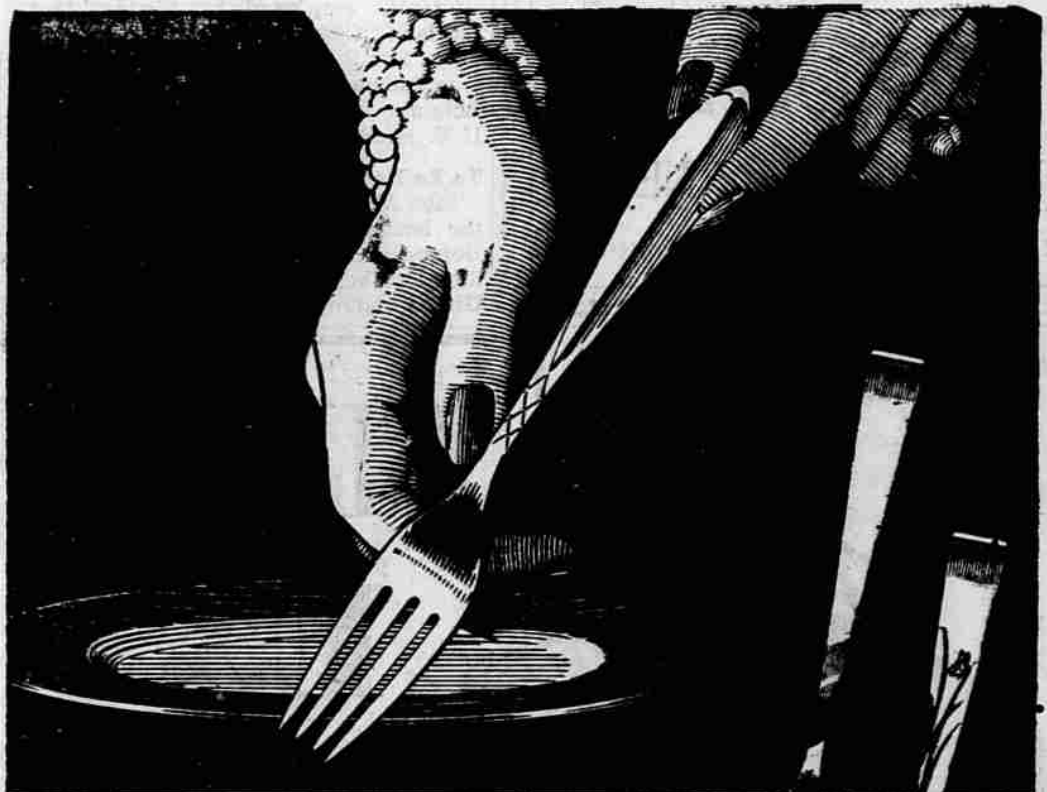
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Left, New Charm, ultra-modern pattern of unclustered line.



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
