Knife and Fork Club Lists Speakers for Coming Season

Speakers for the season have been announced by the Rogue River Valley Knife and Fork club officials.

The first speaker will be Edward Tomlinson, one of America's authorities on inter-American affairs, and author of a number of syndicated articles on Russia's invasion of the Caribbean.

He will speak at the Rogue Valley Country club Tuesday, October 27, at 6:45 p.m. Reservations must be made by October 24, according to Mrs. Richard House, secretary.

Mr. Tomlinson recently returned to the United States from an exhaustive study of conditions in Peru, Puerto Rico, Brazil, Uruguay, Venezuela, Argentina and Panama. He is also a feature writer for the Washington Daily News.

His talk will be entitled "Look Southward, Uncle." Other speakers and dates they will speak here are Willy Ley, "Rockets, Missiles and Space Travel," December 4; Toni Gauer, "An Adventure in Unique Entertainment," January 27; and Glubb Pasha, "Middle East - Storm Center of the World," March 1.

The fifth program of the season will be April 6 with the speaker to be announced. Mr. Levy is a leading authority on rocket research and space travel. The German-born American citizen has been a pioneer in the rocket field since 1920 and was one of the founders of the German Rocket society in 1927.

He came to the United States in 1935 where he has been science editor of the New York newspaper P.M.; research engineer for the Washington Institute of Technology and is consultant to the department of commerce technical service.

Mr. Gauer, from Switzerland, is a yodel teacher, lecturer and plays 18 different musical instruments. He will appear in Swiss costume and sing as well as play the various musical instruments.

Mr. Pasha was born in Britain and has been a soldier since World War I. He was head of the Arab Legion desert patrol for 15 years.
