

Works of Medford Artist Shown at Salem Museum

Paintings and sculpture by Warren Wolf, Medford High school art teacher, are being shown in a one-man exhibit at Bush house, Salem art museum from October 7 through November 8.

A reception honoring Mr. Wolf will be held at Bush house Sunday, October 18, from 2 until 5 p.m.

Pouring for the event will be Mrs. D. Kirkland West, Medford; Miss Louanne Wolf, Grants Pass, sister of Mr. Wolf, and Mrs. Fred D. Wolf, Salem, Mr. Wolf's mother.

Assisting at the reception will be Miss Judy Wolf, senior at the University of Oregon school of architecture, and Mrs. R. W. Johnson, Salem, sisters of Mr. Wolf. Hostesses will be two former Medford High school art students of Mr. Wolf, Miss Pat Rushon, University of Oregon, and Miss Joan Laurila, Wilamette university.

Zontians Aid Cause Of Refugees

Mrs. Bonnie Wilson, a past president of Medford Zonta club, spoke at the group's luncheon meeting Thursday on "Father Pire's European Villages." Aid to this Belgian Dominican priest in his work for the world's refugees is being given by Zonta International on the basis of a report by the Zellerbach commission.

Mrs. Wilson said that Father Pire, through his organization, "Aid to Displaced Persons," had sponsored the "adoption" of some 15,000 families by people not only in Belgium but also in other European countries. He has been responsible for the establishment of several homes for elderly refugees and has fostered the creation of a series of "European Villages" designed specifically for the rehabilitation of "hard core" refugees.

It is stated that Father Pire believes it essential to remove the children as rapidly as possible from the deadly environments of the camps and barracks. Described as a "fantastic accomplishment," for a private undertaking, Father Pire has built six "villages," one in Belgium, one at Bregenz, Austria, and four in West Germany, the last of which is called "Anne Frank Village."

Plans are underway for construction of several more. The villages are kept at a maximum of 120 persons (about 30 families) so that resident counselors are able to maintain contact with the refugees and give them day-to-day guidance. In every village there are never fewer than four nationalities and two religions.

The report which Mrs. Wilson read states "To anyone who has seen the wretchedness stamped on the faces of the children in refugee camps, the transformation which has come over these children would itself be justification for the project. The children attend nearby schools and there has been an almost miraculous improvement in their general psychological attitude."

It is said the project has the approval of United Nations as well as the Zellerbach commission and the International Rescue committee.

Other reports were given by Mrs. Jean Hart and Mrs. Ilean Grigsby. Later this month the president of Medford Zonta club, Mrs. Eloise Winklebeck and a group of members will go to Vancouver, B.C., to attend a regional meeting.

It would be helpful if celebrities looked like we thought they were going to look. Before we saw Adlai Stevenson, we thought of him as being thin-faced and spare and aesthetic looking. When he was in Medford for a luncheon at the Medford hotel, we found out that he was shorter and heavier than we had supposed, with a friendly and warm personality — not a bit professorial.

Thursday morning during the Democratic breakfast at Pings everyone was waiting for Senator and Mrs. Hubert Humphrey to arrive, and Potpourri was in deep conversation with Jean Brown. A smallish looking man came along on the other side of the table and shook hands with Marion Langley, then with Mrs. Brown and next said good morning to Potpourri.

Wondering who this breezy conversation - interrupter might be, we looked up and said "Good morning. Who are you?" "Oh, I'm just the senator from Minnesota" said the guest of honor. And all along we thought Senator Hubert Humphrey would be six feet tall, much older and have white hair.

The senator might pass unnoticed in a crowd, but not when he braces his feet and starts to talk. Even at 8 a.m. after only four hours sleep, Senator Humphrey can lay down the law with an evangelistic fervor.

Since Potpourri wasn't making notes for a front page story, we just scribbled down a few phrases from time to time. The senator said he didn't want the Democrats to become a "Casper Milquetoast" party or "caretakers of the past." He said if this country doesn't watch out and get on the beam we're going to commit national suicide. The senator also said he was tired of "tranquilizing headlines" in the newspapers and of important official announcements made from locker rooms of golf clubs.

The senator declared that talk of rockets and bombs and such phrases as "over kill" power of destructive forces frightened him and wondered what good it was doing the world to prove that mankind has a "genius for destruction." Senator H. said he didn't think the Communists had changed their goals one bit, but that they wouldn't "blow the world to bits, just pick it up, bit by bit."

Citizens of the United States shouldn't answer Russia's slogan of "peace with Communism" by saying that we want "peace with capitalism" but instead say we want "peace with freedom." was another of the senator's statements. He declared the difference between Communism and capitalism should not be financial, but spiritual and said "what kind of a society do we want — one interested in man or one interested in the state?"

This reporter was particularly interested in his statements about the United Nations. He declared that this country is using the UN as a "dumping ground for hot potatoes instead of an instrument for peace" and said it should be a place to further foreign policy ideals.

Warming up even more toward the end of his short talk, Senator Humphrey said "there isn't any known defense against thermo-nuclear warfare and guided missiles and let's quit kidding ourselves."

The thought of some of the small countries, with governments headed by irrational dictators, having nuclear bombs also frightens the senator, and he said "If a bomb is dropped on this country, who will know where it came from? Who will you shoot back at?" He added then that building underground shelters seemed a bit useless and futile and said "I'm not interested in living in a hole in the ground. That's for some other form of life."

Mrs. Humphrey, who frankly thinks her husband has a lot to offer in the way of public service and doesn't mind saying so (for which we admire her) looked fresh as a daisy and has apparently learned the secret of traveling like mad hither and yon with little rest. She wore a turquoise blue knit suit and her grey hair is cut short and worn close to her head. She said she enjoyed traveling and meeting her fellow citizens, but also loved to be with her family at home.

The Humphrey's daughter, Nancy, is a student nurse in Minneapolis, their older son, Hubert Jr., (known as Skip) is in school in Minnesota and the two younger boys, Bob, 15 and Douglas, 11, are with their parents in Washington. We talked about the Humphrey's home in Minnesota, and she showed us a color picture, along with one of Douglas with four pet ducks — or maybe they were geese. Mrs. H. said the house is planned for easy care and comfort "because we'd rather do our own work than have help around."

Another congressional visitor this week was Mrs. Edith Green, who came down to Medford to make a speech and was honored at a breakfast Friday morning at the Robert Duncan home. Mrs. Green and Evelyn Ousterhout, Tribune reporter and farmer's wife, had an earnest conversation about farm subsidies. Nation's Youth Salt Away Millions by Saving Dimes

New York (UPI)—The nation's small fry, salting away their hard-earned money, last year put more than four million dollars in the bank.

Their mountain of savings, nearing the quarter-billion mark, jumped 19 per cent during the last 12 months.

This small change from young capitalists draws generous gestures of encouragement from poker-faced bankers.

Some banks offer special passbooks—in pink and blue and illustrated with story-book characters—to help turn the march of coins from piggy-banks into a stampede.

After a number of deposits, many bankers pass out coloring books, balloons, candy and other sweets—also grand-fatherly pats on the head or back.

A few banks go all out to help their pint-sized customers retain dignity and independence in fiscal matters. In such places, the little men — and women—climb a raised platform that it seemed strange that the multi-million dollar tobacco industry should enjoy subsidies at taxpayers' expense.

When the question of the Democratic presidential candidates came up, Mrs. Green said she was actively supporting John Kennedy. The congresswoman added that although she had worked hard in the past for Adlai Stevenson, she believed now it would be a "diservice" to push his candidacy in Oregon when he has repeatedly said he is not a candidate. During the coffee at the Duncan home, Mrs. Green held tiny Deirdre Kelly, the Bernard Kelly's daughter. Deirdre and Mrs. Green had a fine time admiring one another, and the baby even nibbled at the orchid corsage on the congresswoman's shoulder. It would have made a wonderful picture to run on the same page with John Wentworth, but sad to say, was never taken.—O.S.
