Jealously Seen as Motive in Stabbing Of Young Actress

Bracketville, Tex. — (UPI) — County Prosecutor John T. Tobin ordered an immediate trial today for an actor accused of murdering his blonde girl friend, allegedly because motion picture star-producer John Wayne decided to give her a break.

Chester Harvey Smith, 32, was accused of stabbing Lajeane Ethridge, 27, when she tried to move out of a house in which she was living with him and four other men.

Smith and Miss Ethridge were living with members of the "Names-Townsend Players," a troupe hired by Tobin said Miss Ethridge, who used the stage name "Lajeane Guye," was hired to read one line in the movie, but Wayne and casting director Frank Leyva were so impressed with her talent that they changed the part to give her a page of dialogue.

Smith was put on salary and went to the house where she was living with the men to get her clothes and move out. Tobin said Smith was jealous of her break and plunged a butcher knife into her breast. She died on the floor of the house about 2 a.m. Sunday, saying, "I love you."

"We're planning an immediate trial," Tobin said. "He will be indicted by a grand jury in Bracketville within 10 days. Then we have to select a petit jury and he will be given a trial."

"We're not trying to rush this. It's just that several of these witnesses will be gone if we don't hold the trial pretty soon."

Smith was locked up in the county jail at Del Rio. A spokesman said Wayne was "upset" about "the tragedy." He was shooting love scenes with Linda Cristal in a remote area and not expected back in Bracketville before Tuesday night.

Ashland Truckers Hurt in Upset

Oregon City — (UPI) — Two truckers were treated and released at Willamette Falls Community hospital here early Sunday after their truck-trailer, loaded with apples, overturned in the downtown section.

The large commercial trailer belonging to Rogue Transportation, Inc., of Ashland, "strewn apples for blocks," according to police.

Injured were Joseph David Bennett, 22, who was sleeping in the sleeper compartment at the time; and John McKay Lively, 25, both of Ashland.

Officers said Bennett suffered a lacerated head and other injuries and Lively suffered a slight back fracture.

The truck overturned when a pin of the hitching chain sheared off at McLoughlin blvd. and Water st., police said.

Traffic was tied up for some nine hours while police cleared the roadway.

Portland Man Leaps From Bridge

Portland—(UPI)—A man identified as Vernon Jennings Petrik, 45, Portland, leaped to his death from the 175 foot St. Johns bridge here early Sunday.

Officers said it apparently was a suicide. The harbor patrol recovered the body from about eight feet of water under the bridge's east end tower.

Police said Petrik had driven onto the bridge, stopped and flagged down a passing motorist, then jumped to his death before the passing car could be brought to a stop.

Special Donation Attracts Thieves

Ashland — Thieves apparently attracted by mention in a sermon of a special donation of money entered the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter-day Saints at 1086 Iowa st. here Sunday afternoon, city police reported.

The thieves were wasting their talents, however. Nothing was reported missing. Police today said they understood the money hadn't been in the church building anyway.

Deer Hunter Shoots Self in Right Leg

Ashland — A deer hunter who laid aside his 30-30 rifle to shoot at tin cans with a .22 automatic pistol Saturday ended by shooting a calf — the calf of his right leg — Ashland police reported.

Wall Street Chatter

New York — (UPI) — A major ingredient of our capitalistic system is the willingness of the American people to supply the capital necessary to keep the economy on an expanding basis, says Vance, Sanders & Co.

It has been estimated, the firm points out, that by 1965 we will be adding some 1,500,000 people to our work force, and no matter what these people do for a living they will need some kind of equipment to work with.

Vance-Sanders notes that this equipment will require an annual outlay of upwards of \$25 billion. "It should be kept in mind that this is just the capital outlay for the new workers each year," it adds.

Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. says that if Olin Mathieson can hold up its present higher earnings and keeps strengthening its finances, partial restoration of the former dividend rate appears a possibility in the foreseeable future.

Tax selling is expected to continue to affect the oil, aircraft, electronic, copper and possibly the rubber groups, says E. F. Hutton & Co.
