London — (UP) — You can laugh at an English schoolboy if you like, but it isn't cricket to keep it up forever.

Sunday a pack of "teddy boys" (British slang for juvenile delinquents), taunted a group of students marching from their school, Fortescue House, to church in their neat blue jackets, neckties and grey trousers.

The "teddy boys" jeered with such taunts as "issies" and "milkops," and the schoolboys ignored it for awhile, Fortescue headmaster George Ollerenshaw disclosed. Then it got tiresome.

One of the student monitors stepped smartly out of line, knocked out three teddy boys and resumed his place in the procession.

Guns Dropped To Castro Opposition

Havana — (UP) — An unidentified light plane parachuted machine guns, rifles and ammunition Saturday night into Pinar Del Rio Province, a center of opposition to Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime.

Maj. Dermidio Escalona, military chief of the province, said rural police captured all or most of the air-dropped supplies — including a recent copy of the Miami Daily News.

Authorities here suspect the plane may have been the same that bombed a sugar mill in Pinar del Rio Friday night, blowing up a boiler but injuring no one.

Mamie Eisenhower Has Sore Throat

Washington — (UP) — Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower had a slight sore throat Sunday night and was unable to attend a Mexican Embassy dinner in honor of her and the President.

Mrs. Mary Jane McCaffree, the First Lady's personal secretary, said Mrs. Eisenhower's condition was not serious but that her physician had advised her to skip the dinner. It was given by visiting Mexican President and Mrs. Adolfo Lopez Mateos.

Rainier, Grace Paying State Visit

Paris — (UP) — Monaco's Prince Rainier squires his American wife, Princess Grace, today into a three-day state visit to Paris which starts with a formal call on President Charles de Gaulle.

Rainier and Grace, as the reigning sovereigns of their tiny Riviera principality, were to have lunch with the French president in his Elysee Palace residence.

The lunch was the first big occasion in a ceremony-studded visit which will last through Thursday.

Rainier and Grace, together with their children Caroline, 2½, and Albert, 1½, have been in Paris over the week end getting ready for all the official doings.

The last state visit Grace and Rainier paid to Paris was in 1956 when they were received by President Rene Coty.

Brasschaat, Belgium—Group Capt. Peter Townsend, former suitor of Britain's Princess Margaret, after being asked by newsmen where his forthcoming marriage to Belgian heiress Marie-Luce Jaminet would take place:

"We would like to marry as discreetly as possible, but I realize it will be difficult with you guys around."

Chicago—Capt. Cy Thomson, 39, of Toronto, pilot of the Trans-Canada Airlines Viscount that circled Chicago for two hours with a faulty landing gear, then landed safely, describing his decision to try for a belly-landing:

"I had ample time to make a decision. It was a normal emergency."

Rome—Pope John XXIII, stating in his first speech in English that he believed the Roman Catholic church would soon beatify Mother Elizabeth Seton, American convert-founder of the U.S. parochial school system:

"And now, repeating the thoughts expressed in Latin, we wish to tell you in your own language of the pleasure it gives us to be able to share with you this happy occasion."
