

News About Books From the Library

Mrs. Jane R. Baker, Jackson county librarian, said that businessmen of Jackson county do not always remember that the county library is a good source of information on all phases of business operation and management, as well as a storehouse for useful reference facts, statistics, and business addresses.

New books on business administration and office procedures are continually being added to the library's collection.
