Willamette Rolls 20-6 Against LC

 Willamette University's powerful Bearcats Saturday night gave notice that they are going to be tough to dethrone as the defending Northwest conference champions this year as they rolled to a 20-6 win over Lewis and Clark in Salem.

Freshman quarterback Tommy Lee tossed a 59-yard scoring pass to end Terry Kent on the first play from scrimmage in the contest and then Lee kicked a bare-footed placement to give Willamette a 7-0 lead with only 15 seconds gone in the game.

Lee added a second-period scoring toss of 24 yards to Doug Chan. Letterman Kevin Nagel paced the Bearcat ground attack with 117 yards in 20 carries. He scored the final Willamette touchdown on a 2-yard jaunt.

Lewis and Clark didn't get into the contest until the final period when Royce McDaniel sparked a 25-yard drive.

A tremendous fourth-quarter performance by quarterback Charlie Alvaro pulled College of Idaho into a 14-14 tie with Linfield at Caldwell, Idaho.

Linfield took a 14-7 lead in the third period on the passing of Bill Parrish. Parrish threw scoring passes of 14 and 19 yards. Alvaro capped a 93-yard drive by sneaking over from the one with only 19 seconds left. He then kicked the extra point.

Tim Smith led Whitman to an easy 26-6 non-conference win over Oregon College at Walla Walla. Smith scored on a one-yard plunge and snagged a 15-yard pass for his other score. The lone OCE score was a 24-yard dash with a recovered fumble by Warren Slayton in the second quarter.

Pacific university and Pacific Lutheran college slithered to a 6-6 tie in the mud at Forest Grove. Bob Burnside racked up 118 yards on the ground in the non-conference affair.

Phil Hill Champ in Grand Prix

Riverside, Calif. (UPI)—Phil Hill, Santa Monica, Calif., won the \$25,000 U.S. Grand Prix Sports Car race Sunday before more than 70,000 fans. Hill averaged 89.05 miles an hour in his 3-liter Ferrari during the 203.05-mile race to set a new record. Chuck Daigh averaged 88 miles an hour in the first annual event last year.

Hill completed the distance in 2 hours, 16 minutes and 45 seconds to finish more than a lap ahead of an international field over the nearly four-mile track. Lloyd Ruby, Houston, Tex., was second followed by Kent Miles, Hollywood. Ruby piloted a 4.5 Maserati and Miles a 2-liter Porsche RSK Spyder.

Three of the 33 starting autos were involved in a pile-up when the green flag went down, delaying the start for 40 minutes. Two of the drivers were injured.
